Home and Community Based Services (HCBS)

All HCBS programs must meet evolving legislation guidelines that range from providing choice to community integration. National conferences like the this one are designed to help leaders, service providers, policymakers and stakeholders meet together exchange ideas and demonstrate how the world can better serve people with disabilities.

The HCBS conference represented an important opportunity to bring the message and mission of Little Red Hen to the world.

The Home and Community Based Services conference was all about finding new ways to support people with disabilities, and include them in a wider world.

A big part of the conference was the opportunity for Little Red Hen to connect with industry professionals and also reach members of an allnew community. We demonstrated to policy-makers, state and federal officials, and industry-leaders how Little Red Hen stands out. We provide important employment based services that help people with disabilities connect with their community.

The conference started the next day and we set up our booth. It was pretty successful. We had the opportunity to tell a multitude of people from all over about Little Red Hen. We arrived at the conference armed with eye-catching Little Red Hen merchandise. We gave away many of the items we had, while connecting with attendees on a personal level.

Clean Teeth & Hands

Thank you to the We Care A Lot Foundation for choosing the Little Red Hen Home annex as the site of their Clean Hands and Teeth presentation. The health and hygiene presentation was led by Cory Smith and his facilitator, Doug Churchill.

To illustrate the importance of clean hands, a special powder was used on participants' hands. After a handshake, ultraviolet light was used, causing germs to glow. The process was repeated, and some still had powder residue. It was a reminder of how quickly germs can spread and how proper hand washing can go a long way toward good hygiene.

Just as important as clean hands are healthy teeth. Cory explained the importance of proper nutrition, diet encouraging а of vegetables, and dairy. He warned that eating foods high in sugar, like candy and soda, can create harmful acid on your teeth when combined bacteria. Unchecked, this with bacteria can lead to loss of tooth enamel, cavities, and gum damage. These cavities can lead to people losing their teeth and having dentures or false teeth.

Teeth health can be managed with regular brushing, at least twice a day.

Smith continued to explain the importance of flossing, giving three possible options to clean between your teeth: regular floss, floss picks, and a waterpik. The first two options are a thread between your teeth, while the latter is a device that uses pressurized water.

Cory Smith concluded by reinforcing the importance of regular dental visits, including getting x-rays when needed. With some simple, regular care, your teeth will be clean and healthy for a long time to come.

The Watering Can

Autumn is here, and with it comes the harvest season! Apples are an autumn staple, and with California's mild winters, it also happens to be a great time to plant them! The Little Red Hen Plant Nursery offers many apple varieties such as Pink Lady, Fuji, Honey Crisp, and Granny Smith. Apple trees may be tricky to grow, but with the proper care and attention, they will bring out a delicious bounty year after year.



Apple Bushels

They require full sun, well-draining soil, partner trees for cross-fertilization, and good air circulation to thrive. If you decide to plant one, it's important to take these needs into consideration when you decide where to plant it. When planted, remember to water it regularly and watch out for pests.

Apple trees are vulnerable to pest problems, which makes it important to know which ones to look out for. This changes depending on which variety of apple you have as well as the regional area you live in, so double check just in case! Usually, dealing with pests on apple trees requires heavy pesticide usage; however, there are some alternatives.



Jonagold Apples

Some apple tree varieties, like Jonagolds, are naturally pest-resistant. Their pest resistance isn't 100 percent, though, so it's important to still use pest control methods, no matter which variety you choose! Another alternative to pesticides, though tedious, is to place paper bags around each apple as it starts to grow to protect them.



Apple Trees at the Nursery

As heavy fruiting plants, apple trees need careful annual pruning to ensure branches don't weaken and break off. Pruning should be kept to the minimum required for the tree's health and should only be done while the tree is dormant to prevent harm to the tree's growth. Aside from that, thinning the fruit during harvest season can help create a healthier tree with larger and better-tasting fruit. As much work as it is, apple trees can be highly rewarding, much like the work we do here at Little Red Hen!

Recently, with harvest season coming in, Park & Garden hosted a plant sale with the help of the nursery. The sale, which occurred on September 30th, was a way to connect with the community and get more people to know about us at Little Red Hen while sharing our love of plants.

The sale included plants vegetables grown at Park & Garden, as well as a variety of succulents and houseplants. Robert T, who helped work the sale, said that he loved working the sale. "It allowed me to work on my customer service skills," Robert shared. Some of the duties held by those working the event included cleaning the area in preparation, clearing out pests, providing customer service, and helping carry plants out to cars when required. 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

It's been said that humans are, by nature, social beings. 1 in 4 people in the United States are diagnosed with some sort of a disability, according to a report by the Center for Disease Control, published in 2023. These people deserve to be as engaged in their community as anyone else. Chico, California, the home of Little Red Hen, has a number of inclusion programs that are designed to allow people to connect, regardless of disability status.

Chico Resources

There are many resources people with disabilities can take advantage of right here in Chico. Organizations such as Friendship Circle allow adults with disabilities to connect with like-minded people in fun social settings. Ability First is another recreation program that offers inclusion. Ability First provides a wide range of indoor and outdoor activities for people, regardless of disability status.

There are also several programs that are in place to help connect people with needed resources. People in need can go to the South Chico Community Center for free food on the fourth Saturday of every month. The South Chico Community Center holds a number of other programs that you can learn more about on the center's Facebook page.



Clients of Far Northern Regional Center can go to the Chico chapter of People First to learn about peer advocacy. People First is an advocacy group for developmental people with disabilities that meets the first Thursday of every month. Peer and self advocacy groups like this one give people with disabilities the opportunity to make friends, contribute to their community, and speak up for themselves.

For readers there's always the Chico Branch of the Butte County Library. The library is open for all to use, and in addition to a wide selection of books, the Library offers access to DVDs, the internet, and other resources.

Little Red Hen's Lifespan Center has a resource library designed to educate people about developmental disabilities. The library is supported by a resource director to guide active parents and their families.

These resources offer individuals with disabilities and their families and caregivers help or support when they need it the most.

Little Red Hen Programs

For more than 20 years Little Red Hen has served children and adults with developmental disabilities.

Each week more than 120 children with autism connect with peers of all abilities in our after-school program that provides a positive, play based environment. We are excited to announce that our Children's and Teen Programs are now available Monday-Saturday.

Little Red Hen's supportive employment program has employed upwards of 175 adults with developmental disabilities in community based businesses. All of our programs are designed to foster inclusion and dignity.

Little Red Hen's commitment to this mission is strong and growing. As we move to the future we are planning more community integration opportunities that will enrich Chico.

Keep an eye out for an exciting number of workshops designed to foster creativity, teach useful skills, and facilitate inclusion.

Together we can build a world where 4 in 4 people feel included, engaged, and accepted.
