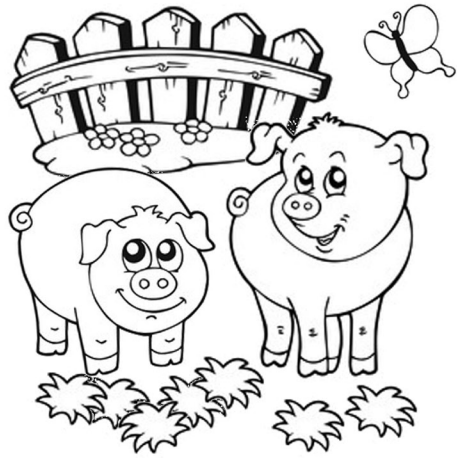

Served with choice of French fries or steamed vegetables.

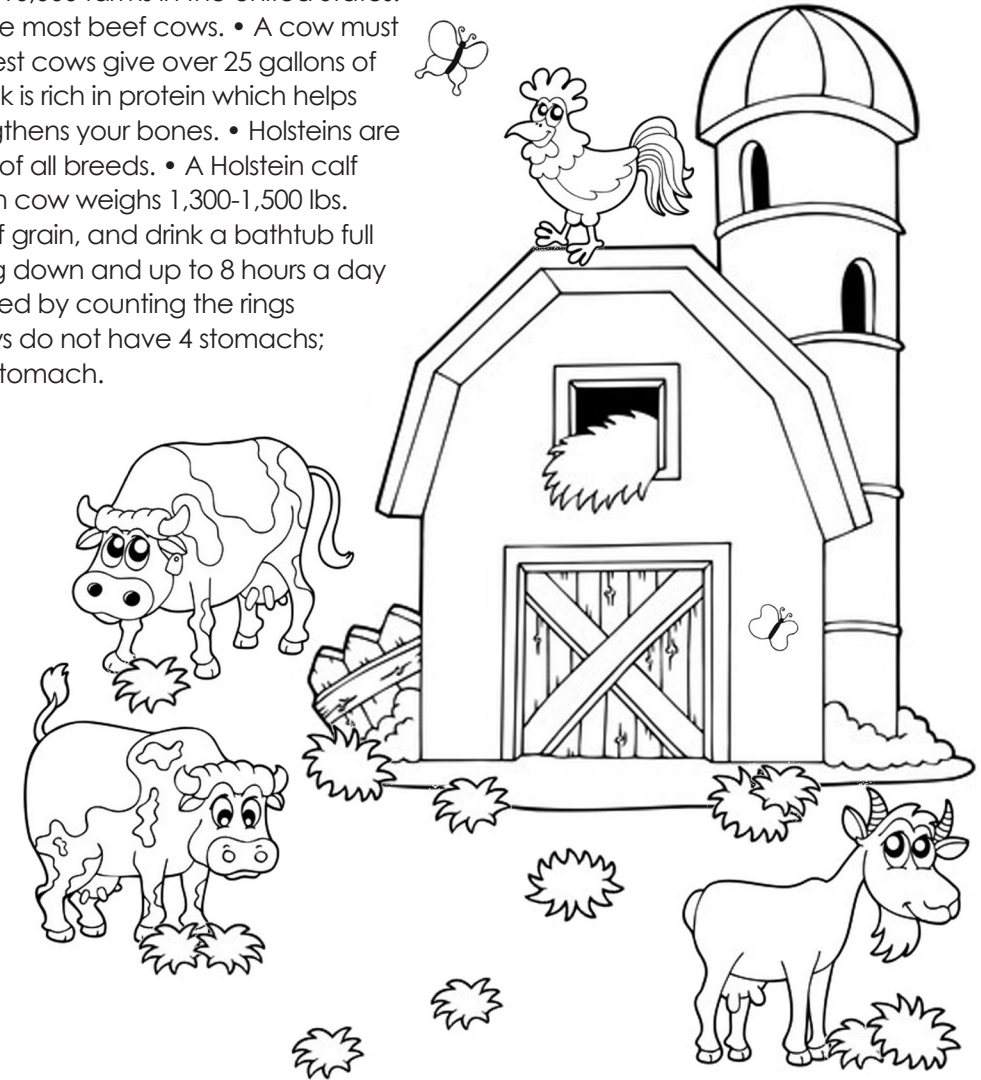

Pigs are very social animals. They form close bonds with each other and other species. • Pigs use their grunts to communicate with each other. • A male pig is called a boar. • A female pig is called a gilt if she hasn't had piglets yet and a sow if she has. • Groups of pigs are called herds or sounders. • Pigs are very intelligent and learn quickly. They pick up tricks faster than dogs. • Piglets learn their names by two to three weeks of age and respond when called. • Pigs have four toes on each hoof, but only walk on two toes per foot. • A pig can run a 7 minute mile. • Pigs are the only mammal found all around the world. • Pigs are also fantastic swimmers. • A pig's squeal can be as loud as 115 decibels, 3 decibels higher than the sound of a supersonic airliner. • The largest pig on record was a Poland-China hog named Big Bill, who weighed 2,552 lbs in Jackson, Tennessee, in 1933.

Around 10 million cows are being milked on 110,000 farms in the United States. • Wisconsin has the most dairy cows, Texas the most beef cows. • A cow must have a calf in order to produce milk. • The best cows give over 25 gallons of milk each day. That's 400 glasses of milk! • Milk is rich in protein which helps build your muscles, and calcium which strengthens your bones. • Holsteins are black and white, and produce the most milk of all breeds. • A Holstein calf weighs 80-110 lbs. at birth. • A mature Holstein cow weighs 1,300-1,500 lbs. • Each day, cows eat 100 lb. of feed, 20 lb. of grain, and drink a bathtub full of water. • A cow spends 13 hours a day lying down and up to 8 hours a day eating. • The age of a cow can be determined by counting the rings on its horns. • Contrary to popular belief, cows do not have 4 stomachs; they have 4 digestive compartments in one stomach.



There are about 1 billion sheep on the planet. • There are about 900 different breeds of sheep. • Sheep make a bleating sound. A baby lamb can identify its mother by her bleat. • One pound of wool can make ten miles of yarn. • There are 150 yards (450 feet) of wool yarn in a baseball. • Sheep prefer running water when they drink. • Sheep have poor eyesight but an excellent sense of hearing. • If you see a sheep on its back, lend a hand! A sheep can't get up from that position. If left on its back too long, it will eventually die. • Ewes typically give birth to twins. • Sheep grow two teeth a year until they have eight. • Sheep only have lower teeth that press against an upper palette. • A one-year old sheep is called a hogget. • A two-year old sheep is called a two-tooth. • A group of sheep is a flock or a mob. • Lucky, the world's oldest sheep, died in November 2009 at the age of 23, twice the life expectancy of a sheep.
