My first official art project, a melted crayon mixed on fabric, was a Christmas gift for my mother in 1939. It was also my first recognition (by my first grade that it was okay to be different.

My education includes: a Bachelor in Art Education, and a Masters in Psychology from the University of Oregon, and postgraduate studies in comparative religions at Summer Academy, University of Kent, Canterbury England, and a Creativity and Madness seminar in New Mexico.

I have studied with many great local instructors and found each experience rewarding. I also have a weekly painting group who are generous about sharing their time and talent.

I taught school at District 13 until I retired. My students ranged from 14 to 19 years of age. My first teaching assignment was working with students with disabilities. I found using images an excellent way to get concepts understood. I then taught art for twelve years. I have found art to be the great equalizer in communicating ideas; an image truly is worth a thousand words.

I enjoy working in multiple media as each medium brings its own message to the work. I like to work in ink and pencil and use both to flesh out my ideas. I've recently discovered water soluble pastels and

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
find them a nice companion to traditional watercolor. Having been born into a family of lifelong learners, I'm continually looking for ways to challenge myself. My present project is teaching myself graphic illustration as a way of telling my grandmother's story. As with most things that look easy, telling a story with images is much more complex than it appears.

The honor that still gives me the most satisfaction was in the fifth grade, when I painted a medieval castle. I won first place, with second and third places going to eighth graders. I felt wonderful and so grown up.

THE ROAD TO REEDSPORT



To her passion for the camera our January presenter, Jean Carter, photographer extraordinaire, has added creating unique art from her photos, altered with the many new digital tools available. She calls her new work, "Imagination Gone Wild!" She will share her life and art and technique with us at CAM on January 16.

Retired from teaching in the public schools, Jean became a full-time photographer. Before that, it was a hobby she enjoyed in order to bond with her son. When his life was tragically taken in an automobile accident, she signed up for a photography class which they had planned to take together.

Four years later the editor of *Outdoor Photographer* selected her photos for publication in their magazine, and calendar. Jean's photos have been sold worldwide in 36 countries with a list of publications including: Hallmark, Easter Seals, Sierra Club, Smith-Western postcards, and Falcon Press. Her photos have been published in *Oregon Coast* magazine, and *Northwest Travel*.

Later, teaming up with professional photographer Darrell Gulin, the two taught workshops all over the West. Two photo stock agencies, Danita Delimont in Seattle, and Agefoto Stock in both Barcelona, Spain and New York, market her works. She has also received many awards, along with monetary prizes.
