I love good paintings of snow scenes. Since moving to Oregon I often find myself inspired to paint them in July. The overall brightness and subtle color variations give depth of field, and I especially love backlighting which leaves sparkles of brilliant light at points of interest.

Looking through art books, and online at the works of painters of renown, I find that winter scenes are somewhat scarce even from artists living in the Northern realms. During this time of year, wildlife provides a great resource for winter art showing animals in their natural habitat. The really inspired open air painters wade through snow and set up their easels, however difficult to paint wearing two pairs of gloves. I only tried it once.

As a young person in Alaska I really admired works by Sydney Lawrence. He had a studio in Anchorage for a few years where he would take a mule into the back-country and paint small sketches for reference in studio work. As he became older he began commuting between Alaska in summer and California in winter.

Even the most intrepid folks enjoy watching snow fall through a cozy studio window with a hot cup of coffee in hand. His works can be seen on Google, in books, and in museums in Alaska, and Washington.

Whether you trudge through the snow to make sketches or stand at the window to watch the snow fall, do the best you can in celebration of your winter.

We BAAA members are going through this festive season in a different way, ever mindful of past celebrations and looking forward to new ones in the near future. In conjunction with such fun meetings, and our annual December Gala, it was easy to remind everyone about our yearly dues. CAM REOPENS !!!

A letter from curator Steven Broocks

Dear BAAA members;

Like the entire global community, Coos Art Museum looks forward to the day when the pandemic is behind us. In the meantime here is an overview of the current situation at the museum. On December 11 we re-opened to viewing on an extremely limited basis - no more than 10 masked visitors in the building at any one time. Oregon has imposed a number of restrictions upon us and we intend to comply to the best of our ability. Unfortunately, Coos County is in a particularly uncertain position – a space hovering between a high risk and extreme risk situation as defined by the number of news cases and other metrics. This means that we will either be open or need to close

on a week-to-week basis as the situation of the County is evaluated.

We began our re-opening with a newly constructed sidewalk in front of our building, and a new ADA (Americans with Disabilities Act) access ramp. I have been quite impressed with the ramp.

On the first floor "Works from the Permanent Collection" is our exhibit. It features selected paintings and sculptures, including many of the larger works in the collection. One highlight of the exhibition is the 17' long *Mary Wilson Triptych* by Oregon artist Mitch Geisert - a tribute to the talents of jazz singer Mary Wilson - which was donated to the Museum in 1993. Other works exhibited include two watercolors, *T-Bird* and *Even* **Damnation Poisoned by Rainbow,** works by popular Portland artist Kirk Lybecker. We want you to know that the Coos Art Museum's Permanent Collection now consists of 620 artworks and is growing through donations and occasional purchases. The collection contains many original works by Pacific Northwest artists and so this exhibition includes many notable Oregon artists.

Also on the first floor is a a solo exhibition by Eugene, Oregon artist M.V. Moran. Entitled *Big Girls*, consisting of larger-than-life charcoal drawings, each piece portraying a monumental female figure. It also includes a second theme: the *Bad Air* series - an examination of all the bad stuff we have been breathing for years. The charcoal drawings are each 80" tall and produce a striking effect. Quoting the artist, "This work is about the trials of 2020."

Upstairs in the Atrium Gallery we have an exhibition of work by twelve area painters who work side-by-side in the Museum's studio under the leadership of artist Pat Snyder. The Coos Art Museum Art Studio Group has been meeting since 2016 and originated to fill a need for local artists to work with others of the community who share

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similar interests. Artists often work alone in their studios or designated areas in their homes. The open studio is a rare opportunity to collaborate, observe, and share experiences with other artists. The participating artists include: Elaine Dunham, Nick Furman, Dana Gronemyer, Geralyn Inokuchi, Susan Lehman, Joan Madden, Ava Richey, Arlene Roblan, Elaine Roemen, Pat Snyder, Liz Spona, and Shawn Tempesta.

The Mabel Hansen Gallery features "Life with a Bang," a retrospective of BAAA member Betty Bangs. On display there is a small sampling of the many paintings produced during the long career of this nonagenarian artist. (She celebrated her 96th birthday on Labor Day 2020).

A multi-talented individual, Betty has been a singer, dancer, actor, and owner of a charm school as well as a visual artist. During her years she has lived in Boise, Idaho; San Jose, California; Anchorage, Alaska, Fairbanks, Alaska, British Columbia, and Oahu, Hawaii before moving to Coos Bay in the late 1990s. And here in Coos Bay she recognized the extensive artistic community active in the area and has said, "I was duly impressed with the beauty of the trees, ocean, and beach ... which had been so ably captured by the many fine artists here."

She also felt a desire to capture the image of fine handmade lace and antique china which she had long seen in people's homes. "I never learned how to do those things and in my appreciation of their incredible gifts of art and knowing that the lace fabric would wear out, the fine china would break, and the silver would tarnish ... it was my intent to record those works on in my paintings."

Finally, in the Claire Wehrle Gallery are ten collage works by Susan Lehman of Bandon. The exhibition titled, "A Delicate Balance" is a reflection on the perilous times in which we find ourselves.

Overall, the Museum goes forward with the under-

standing that we are indeed in a delicate balance with the pandemic. Valerie Flynn, our Education Director, has been active with on-line programs and workshops. Please take time to view our Facebook page and see if any of these programs are of interest.

Coos Art Museum staff remain healthy and we all look forward to a new year in which we can become more active again in the community.

ARTIST OF THE MONTH -

BETH WEGNER

I have long been an art fan. One of the few benefits of living in Dallas, Texas, for twelve years was the great art museums. It was at the Kimbell Art Museum in Ft. Worth, some time in the 1980's, that I was first dazzled by Winslow Homer's watercolor paintings. I also had the good fortune to live in Germany for eight years and visit many of the famous art museums of Europe.



We moved to this area in 1997, after my husband retired. I finally started taking watercolor classes twelve years ago at SWOCC where I was teaching writing classes at the time. In 2005 the needs of aging parents sidelined me from both career and painting for three years. Instead of resuming my job in 2008, I started volunteering at CAM where I have had

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the pleasure of meeting the many talented members of the art community. I also resumed painting classes, this time at CAM, and joined BAAA, and the Tuesday plein air group.

Painting is equally fascinating and frustrating to me, but I love the process of learning. I still consider myself an art student rather than an artist. I paint primarily in watercolor but, frustrated with battling the wind with watercolors, I started using pastel several years ago when painting plein air. My favorite subject matter is nature, and I am continually grateful to live in such beautiful, stimulating surroundings.

I am indebted to my painting instructors, especially Liv Drahos, for sharing their talent. I also appreciate many fellow students and artists for sharing their knowledge and for their friendship.



A "FORGOTTEN" FRENCH IMPRESSIONIST

When we think of the stars of French impressionism, we almost immediately think "Claude Monet," or "Renoir." Have you heard of Alfred Sisley? He was a founding member and contributor of the group right along side Monet and Renoir (and Pissarro, and Morisot,) during the lean days as they fought to find a new direction for art in France.



Sisley was born in France of English parents though he kept his British citizenship. He came from a middle class family and, until his father's business failed in 1870 (the year of the Franco-Prussian war,) he did not have to sell his paintings to earn a living. After that, through support from patrons, sales to art galleries, and obliging friends, he was able to barely support himself and his companion Marie Lescouezec.



He never achieved more than a middling existence, and the public never took to his art as they did for Monet and Renoir. He also began to cut himself off from the other artists, being less outgoing and forceful as the others. Yet he was an important member of the impressionists. He fully believed in his art and his style. But even after his death his paintings did not increase greatly in value. Today, his works bring millions, but not the millions of Monet's work.

Most outstanding about his work, is that while the others over the years began to drift apart and find new styles, or advance their personal styles, Sisley stuck to the original impressionist formula. His work is very strong and visionary, though it did no change greatly through his lifetime. As landscape artists we can learn a great deal from his work.


THE PLEIN AIR GROUP SEES FALL COLORS


