Old Blue Eyes may be right – if those yellow smiley faces were orange, wouldn't they look like they were having one of those fabulous, uncontrollable laughter streaks, where you can barely breathe, and don't ever want to stop laughing? Perky and upbeat, but also steadfast and solid, Orange likes to walk on the sunny side of the street.

I'm passionately in love with Cadmium Orange watercolor pigment. I find it to be just about useless in my paintings, as it is ridiculously domineering, willful, stubborn, opaque and dense, but the glowing intensity of the color sings to my eyes in a way that is unique and glorious.

PHOTOGRAPHING ART IMAGES FOR THE INTERNET


(IMPORTANT – The information below is based on using a <u>camera</u>. It can work if you use your <u>phone</u> for pictures. But, the phone must be held rock steady – to do so try using the phone camera's delay function to give you time to really steady the phone. ANY blurriness will ruin the photo. Also, you will still need to load your pictures to a computer and edit them as you would with a camera. If you want to use a camera and don't own one you can find one that will work on Ebay for under \$50. At the end of the article I have given you important information for finding the right camera at a budget price.)

What will you you will need for an art website? Photos of your artwork. If you have some experience you can follow all the steps below to make usable photos for the internet.

If you don't, and don't have the right equipment, etc.,the best thing is to have someone who has the experience make up the images for you. If you have a friend who will do it for free, that would be great. If not, we suggest keeping it within BAAA by contacting member Hope Sessums at hsessums@charter.net (You may remember she ran some ads in our newsletter back in 2019 and 2020 offering her various photo services.) If you decide that you want to do it yourself, the process is as follows:

- **1** Prepare your artwork. If it's behind glass, somehow you will have to remove the artwork from behind the glass or figure out somehow to keep all the reflections invisible in the photo.
- **2** You will need a camera which can take pictures of at least **10 megapixels** (you can find that in the handbook that came with the camera.) You will also need a tripod. It's really the only way to keep the camera steady enough for a sharp photo.
- **3** Hang the picture on a wall. You can use room light or sunlight. (You should set your camera for AWB (automatic white balance) which will compensate for whatever light is being used.)) Make sure that if the light



is coming from a side window, or overhead, that it isn't making one area brighter than another. Also, if your work is in its frame, make sure no shadows from inside the edges the frame are visible on the artwork.

- **4** Try to get your camera as close as you can to the artwork. Don't use any zoom. Try to make it as square and level and centered as you can by adjusting the height of the camera up or down. Also try to get the camera as parallel as you can to the wall the painting is on, so it will be as square as possible.
- **5** Set your delay timer (most cameras have one) to 10 seconds, then press the button to take the picture. The 10 second delay will make sure the camera is perfectly steady before it takes the picture.
- 6 Some websites want you to show the picture in the frame. In that case, when you look in the viewfinder you will see that the frame doesn't appear straight, but that it's sides are curved. That's because the small lens on most cameras naturally makes the square sides seem curved. The best thing to do is to take a second picture with the art in its frame, but set the camera back far enough from the artwork so that a lot of the curviness is minimized.
- **7** Now you need a way to get those photos to your computer to make them available to a website. To transfer photos to your computer, try downloading the camera into the computer via the cable. Once you do that, it will always recognize the camera. Since some cameras are not supported by Windows 10 take the memory card from the camera and download the images directly to the computer from the card.

A camera listing on Ebay must say that the camera's been tested, and/or that it works fully. Anything else is just for parts and/or unusable. Preferably the seller should accept returns. The camera should include either a CD ROM or the manual, and, if possible, a cable to connect to a computer. Some cameras use their own battery and charger, and these should be included. If not, you will have to buy them separately on Ebay. Some cameras simply use 2 AA batteries. In that case, buy the rechargeable kind with a charger as they go through batteries quickly.

Back in August 2013 Charles Edmunds led the BAAA members in their monthly program which was held at Mingus Park and became a full blown exercise in plein-air painting. Let's revisit...

A VERY SPECIAL PROGRAM

Let's get together & spend time out of doors, in the beautiful Choshi Gardens of Mingus Park.We will learn the history of the gardens, and have the rare opportunity to watch a master of plein air painting as he demonstrates and explains how to paint a stunning scene in less than forty minutes. This program will include two very special presenters: First, we will hear from Beverly Meyers. We owe a great debt to both Beverly and her mother, Gloria Hillstron. Their idea behind the gardens was to create and acknowledge a relationship between the cities of Choshi, Japan and Coos Bay which became "sisters cities" in 1983. Choshi Gardens remains the most visible result of this relationship. Gloria Hillstron, Beverly's mother, was instrumental in getting the gardens set up. When the city refused to take responsibility for keeping the finished product beautiful, Gloria headed a volunteer effort to do so. After her death, her daughter continued this effort. Beverly is married, with many interests. She works full time as a landscaper. Yet every weekend she manages to spend time at Choshi Gardens, keeping up the legacy her mother started. Although often alone, she always appreciates help. Following Beverly's talk, Charles Edmunds (Charles of Charleston) will do a demonstration of plein air painting. Charles spent seven years in art school, always painting in a studio, but he yearned to paint out of doors. He then did so in Mexico, Yosemite National Park, and San Francisco. Next, he painted Canada, before settling in Coos County on our spectacular Oregon coast. Charles says, "By its nature, a plein air painting is finished in one sitting. I will demonstrate a water mixable oil painting approach, and I will give you lots of tips on how to achieve a lovely finished painting out of doors in about forty minutes." Charles has exhibited in many venues, including shows at the Coos Art Museum. He has paintings in the CAM permanent collection and is currently exhibiting at the Fellowship Gallery, next to the Egyptian Theatre. His work can be seen at Coosart.org, and on his website at Charlesof-Charleston.com. Bring a chair if you wish, do bring a sketch book...or just take notes. Also, a cold drink, and a bit of lunch, if you feel like a picnic.
