IS ART FOR THE BIRDS?

Pigeons can be trained to tell the difference between "good" and "bad" paintings. A Japanese University Professor said his team discovered pigeons use color, texture and pattern cues in order to judge a painting's beauty as defined by humans.

In the study, watercolor and pastel paintings by children were classified by an art teacher and 10 other adults as either "good" or "bad." The paintings were considered "good" when images were clear and discernible. The pigeons were trained by being rewarded with food if they pecked at the "good" pictures, the scientists said. Pecking at "bad" pictures was not rewarded.

The scientists said the pigeons consistently pecked at the "good" paintings more often than the "bad" paintings. "Artistic endeavors have been long thought to be limited to humans," the professor said. "But this experiment shows that, with training, these birds are ... able to acquire the ability to judge beauty similar to that of humans."

VAN GOGH COMES HOME

An important early painting by Vincent Van Gogh, stolen in 2002, was recovered. "View



of the Sea at Scheveningen," was taken from Amsterdam's Van Gogh Museum in a robbery. It was found in Naples, in the home of a suspected drug trafficker.

The painting was found with its frame removed and a small amount of damage to the seascape, but is otherwise in good condition. The theft was regarded as among the most infamous heists in recent history. The thieves entered the museum from the building's roof, and were sentenced to four-year prison terms, but the artwork was not recovered until this year. The FBI regarded the theft as among its "Top 10" art crimes. The painting has a value of \$50 million.

WATCH WHERE YOU PUT THAT PEN!!

An elderly German woman was questioned by police after filling in blank spaces on a crossword puzzle that was being displayed as a work of art at a local museum. The 91-year-old woman used a **ballpoint pen** to write on an avant-garde work entitled "Reading-Work-Piece" during a tour to Nuremberg's Neues Museum.

The crossword puzzle-themed piece of art from 1965 features the phrase "insert words" which the woman understood as instructions. "She had taken the note as an invitation to complete the crossword." The work, which is worth an estimated \$89,000, can be restored, and that the woman was reported only for insurance reasons.

The museum stated that it would place a sign to distinguish the piece from other works of interactive art displayed throughout the museum. They also said "We will let the lady know that the collector took the damage to the work in good humor, so she doesn't have a sleepless night."



ARTIST OF THE MONTH - CLYDE KIRKPATRICK

Clyde Kirkpatrick's passion is depicting the infinitely changing

moods of water and reflections, maritime art, and nature. He is best known for his maritime art; "I am intrigued how reflections on water change and distort the forms of objects. I enjoy the elusive challenge of capturing the endless variety of textures found in subject matter on and around coastal environments."



In the past, Clyde has enjoyed teaching art, drawing and watercolor at Southwestern Oregon Community College in addition to Rogue Comm-

unity College near Grants Pass, Oregon.

For the past three years he has been teaching art in

three schools on two islands off the coast of Belize. He and his wife, Sharon, volunteer for eight months during the school year. Clyde and Sharon have pioneered an organization called Blessing



Belize, to teach art and counsel traumatized and disadvantaged Belizean children. Clyde's captivating images of water and reflection place him right in the main "wheelhouse" of maritime painting. Clyde is a member of ASMA, and many other arts groups.

I remember from that night that, though I am not a watercolorist, playing with the combination of the two new products made me rethink that medium for myself.

No matter what she brings, it will be intriguing. And, with new products one never knows if one of those products might not lead us off in a new direction. The Gallery By The Bay

The Gallery by the Bay was established in 2000 shortly after the Unity Church bought the vintage building at 2100 Union Street in North Bend which had been a Presbyterian church built in 1920. It was the vision of Betty Bangs, artist and church member, to open an art gallery showcasing local artists and giving them another place to engage the community.


In 2001 the first exhibit and reception was held continuing on a bimonthly rotation introducing new artists. Artisans in the community were invited to participate. An old spinning wheel was set up to create the ambiance for weavers to display the beautiful articles of their craft. Jewelry makers and wood carvers proudly showed their skills, along with the colorful hanging quilts from local quilters. Potters and sculptors were also welcomed with open arms.

African drummers Tom Brain and Jan Werts presented their rhythms during events creating a lively atmosphere, while guests perused the art and enjoyed refreshments. Members helped bring about the Thursday night Art Walk, along with merchants in the area who kept their shops open, displaying walls filled with art work and providing tempting snacks and drinks for guests.

Some of those who took on the responsibility of keeping the Gallery by the Bay active through the years were: Emily Ashworth, Jean Boynton, Vanessa Jorgensen (now Murphy), Ina Christensen, Jean Adamson, Sarita Southgate, Sally Rolicheck and others. When Judy Caldwell joined the gallery in 2016, along with Sandy Maghan and Betty Bangs, the whole endeavor became re-energized, and the Art Gallery's re-opening in January 2017 featured Caldwell's pastel and acrylic work, and Meadowlark Molyneaux's painting with threads, known as crossstitch.

This year, the gallery is joining with North Bend merchants for the "Sip and Stroll Night." The Gallery by the Bay will proudly exhibit their artists and offer a Coffee Bar complete with barista, as well as food and entertainment from locals like guitarist/harpist Robin O'Neill. Currently Emily Ashworth is featured at the Gallery with her signature brilliant and whimsical paintings; the exhibit can be seen Wednesday through Sunday, 10 am to 2 pm.

SUSAN LEHMAN AT PACIFIC PARK GALLERY

THE RETROSPECT PAINTINGS - 12 YEARS ON THE OREGON COAST

Susan is a treasure. Her exhibit, now being shown on both floors of the medical center cum gallery, is full of treasures. She received very high marks for her fiber work during her education at California College of Arts. Founded in 1907, CC of A has a very strong history of practical art studies. After her graduation Susan taught art and for years was involved in wonderful fabric artwork, both woven and stitched. But then she became enamored with **acrylic collages** in what she describes as "abstract expression" (different from "abstract expressionism," as you will see.) It is these that make up the current show.

The area over the fireplace is taken up with a wonderful eye filling work "The Secret Tunnel," part of her "Between Here and There" series. The room gives ample space to **stand back and appreciate the fullness of the work**.



Her larger works, on the ground floor, offer several themes tied in with coastal life. Of course, we think of waves and water (and there are works on those themes) but the Oregon coast is the home of forests, and these are well represented in a number of similarly themed works by Lehman. Among these are "Alder Woods," and a powerful collage on linen "Enchanted Forest" done in earth colors, and "Stories They Could Tell: Twilight," (seen at left.)

There are many themed works under the aegis of "waves," both water waves and earth waves as seen in the work here, the dyptich "Mountain Wave."

In addition, there are floral abstracts and works on other themes. On the landing, as you

head upstairs, you will find some wonderful black and white works, such as the "Terrible Beauty," series approaching a **Sumi-e black ink experience**. There is also the "Doom and Gloom" series, in the black and white mode, on the landing.

On the second floor you will find a large collection of Susan's smaller works. In addition to a couple of assemblages, there are works from more series including the "Pond Series," and the "Tsunami Series." Lehman is an obviously highly talented and serious artist whose use of color, form and contrast has created works of undeniable originality and integrity.





ZZWEI AT CAM

Many of us already know his work and his style from seeing the video "At One in the Landscape" which was shown a BAAA meeting many months ago. (Here's the link...https://www.seattlechannel.org/videos?videoid=x60664)

It is a real treat to see his 17 of his works up close at CAM. There were surprises for me. His layering is ultra thin with no impasto. You can easily see the canvas matrix. The only drawback is that so many of his canvases are so large that even the Atrium, as wonderful as it is, is too small to really get back far enough to take it all in.

A number of his signature works are there including "Roadside" (below left.)



What strikes me about his work recalls the works done by what are called the "Regionalists." Painters such as Thomas Hart Benton and Grant Wood who fell out of fashion during the onslaught of "Abstract Expressionism." Today, we realize these artists were genuine, and that their work was highly stylized, meaningful, and often had a sense or unease and foreboding. They were NOT picture postcards. I get the same sense from Wei's work. What IS around the next corner? What IS in that barn and what stories does the rusting car have to tell? The mystery beckons us, as it does with so many of the "American

Scene Painters" (another limiting label) of the 1930's and 1940's. Below, compare one of Wei's works "Tree Farm" in the show (shown at left) with a similar view in Benton's "Martha's Vineyard." Both use wonderful stylization and both paintings raise unanswered questions.



Both artists are totally enamored of the American landscape and their styles derive from that love. It is their stylizations, shapes and strong lighting contrasts that lend the mystery and draw us into those scenes.

Another of Wei's eye-grabbing works is "Afternoon Shadows." (seen on the left.) The tracery of shadows yields not only fascinating high contrasting patterns cast by the unseen trees, but completes a profound primary color scheme.

Among other terrific images by Wei are "View Through the Trestle," and "Dusk" Among his works is even a collection of boat paintings. His world may be highway travel, and the landscape of a dry agricultural region but, as with all great painters, there is a much larger story built into each work. If you want a postcard, buy one. If you want a larger truth, ZZ Wei is your man.
