A reminder of our categories: Oil; Acrylic; Watercolor; Mixed Media & Collage; Pastel (traditional & oil); Drawing; and Photography. This is our biggest annual fund raiser so your support by entering really helps out BAAA, and makes a vibrant show! Entry fee is \$7.00 for the first entry and \$5.00 each for the second and third. ula and various gooey and multicolored galactic hatchlings? No. Instead, members are warmly invited to a Monster (as in BIG) Show and Tell at our regular monthly meeting in APRIL. What does that mean for you? That you have to bring a monster sized painting or sculpture or a depiction of a monster to the meeting? Not unless you want to. Please read on.

In the past we've had short, spur of the moment "show and tells" at our meetings, but THIS time we want everyone who wants to attend to bring a work or two you are willing to share with other members, regardless of size or medium. Takes a little courage maybe, but, what-the-hay, it will be fun! We will devote the entire presentation time, - yes, the WHOLE meeting will be devoted to show-and-tell! If 20 people (as usual) show up with their works each one will only have to do a 2-3 minute tell. How hard is that? Maybe 30 members will show up and some won't have to say anything. ARTIST OF THE MONTH -SHARON LEAHY

With my first toys, I was given

the ability to create colors. Crayons, colored pencils, and watercolors have been my favorite toys/tools since I was a child. You can tell from the watercolors in my display that I like to play with controlled

washes, and defined edges. However, when I began to hand dye fabric for art quilting, I fell in love with soft edges and wet-in-wet techniques for coloring. You can see that in the fabric art quilt in my display.

whole-cloth, free motion, guilted art guilt.

I created the "Invisible Garden of fabric, and then hand-dyed it on a sunny day, outside on my driveway, using heliographic (sun reactive) fabric paints. I drew the image of Ho Tai in the style of traditional Buddhist iconography, and free motion quilted the piece with heavy cotton thread, drawing in the shapes of the leaves and flowers, bricks and Ho Tai, by hand as I moved the cloth under the needle of my home sewing machine. In the parlance of the fabrics arts world, this is known as a hand-dyed,

I hope the display of my artwork gives you pleasure, and I trust the image of Ho Tai's happiness, and the concept that we both live in and can be mindfully present in, an invisible garden of joy have stimulated interesting musings for you.





Susanne Weston, well known area artist, and former member of the Artist Loft Gallery, will share some of her secrets used in making her signature stone and wood with metal, fabrications. Beautiful tree shapes in copper or other metals are melted on to stone or wood substrates into compositions that let both the metal and the background determine the final look.

Her aim is to share how she constructs the tree shapes with alternative media, and to inspire artists to add dimension to their art, whether painting, trapunto, felting, or even home décor - tile, glass, mirrors and furniture. Susanne will demonstrate different ways to do this on various pieces and, if there is time, will let a few members try to make an image.

Susanne wants artists to think outside the box. Not to just DO a watercolor, say, but add depth and dimension to any medium they are comfortable with. Or use a line of texture to enhance light in a painting, or make a custom tile for a kitchen or bath. She feels that there are so many things an artist can do with 3dimensional media that the list is never ending.

Her demonstration will work to the point of at least a half-finished product. If any member has something they would like to try their materials on (cloth, small canvas, tile, wood, glass, etc.,) feel free to bring them and she will give it a try.




And you can go representational: or you can be completely experimental: *"Green Sky with Red Sun"*


1 **KIDS@CAM: Art Express**—these are 16 standalone session/programs that occur from 10 to noon on selected Saturdays, Jan 14 – June 24. The program could use help in the classroom during the session, or even leading a class.

2 **CAM Community Days**—we are continuing the program started in 2016. We will offer free admission and a themed, family friendly art project for the community. Mostly we need help during the actual events, which will take place the third Saturday of the month from 11-3pm.

3 Art Cart in the Park—this will be a traveling art program that will coordinate with the free lunch programs during the summer, 3 days a week, in 3 different locations. We will be at the park during the tail end of the scheduled lunch. When kids have finished eating, they can do an art project. Volunteers are needed to assist.

After refreshments, our new president, Judy Caldwell, called a short BAAA information meeting to order. We were reminded that the Pony Village Mall Show was just a short time away (art delivery on

May 31,) and that the entry blank would be in the April newsletter. Also, new programs for this year were being lined up. Outgoing president Graham Wickham received a nice thank you gift – a beautiful book to be filled up with small sketches, photos, etc. He was very appreciative of the gift.

Next was our presenter, artist, and committed felter, Mattie Lane from Bandon who began with pottery classes in a community college when she was young. When she retired she wanted to return to art and met a neighbor who was a master quilter. From what she learned, she realized that fabric and textiles were very appealing media. She began thinking she could stitch materials into 3 dimensional objects like bowls and vases. Having had some training in felting, but not wanting to do ordinary felting, she decided to combine fabric and felting.

She joined a co-op gallery but realized that making everyday objects for the buying public was both boring and defeating. So, she broke free and worked on making felt vessels. She uses pre-dyed wools, preferably angora, and joins these to a cloth or felt backing with a needle felter, then runs it all through a felting machine. Using an interior cardboard form, she builds the materials around the form Through repeated washings and shapings (hours of tiring labor) and then removing the sodden cardboard, she has a bowl which is shaped and shaped until it achieves the form she wants. Interestingly, like clay, she can stretch a round bowl into a longer, or taller cylindrical form as a potter would, but without the wheel. Shrinking over several days, to half or less its original size, she continues to work it through the drying process.



Interestingly, Mattie, like most artists, sets the now completed work aside for months. Only then can she decide if she likes it or not. A lesson to be remembered -

give your work time to sit by itself before you pass judgment, or decide on changes. Our brains need that distance.

Mattie learned that the cost in time and materials in making vessels would not be profitable in a gallery. An artist's conundrum. She also makes flat items – landscapes and abstracts, which are profitable. All in all, it was a fascinating meeting reminding us that an artist's choice of materials and processes is almost infinite. Mattie was a lively and interesting presenter. Whether interested in textiles or not, there was much to learn and be stimulated by.



Through the years many BAAA members have been closely involved with the community through their volunteer work in the arts. They continue to contribute countless hours of time and expertise to the Coos Art Museum, the schools, and other entities, surely enriching the arts and our region.

Stories found in the BAAA Archives highlight other creative examples of members contributions. For example, in 1992 Jim Davenport presented his oil painting of the Shore Acres gardener's cottage to the Friends of Shore Acres. The painting was displayed in the cottage at the State Park for the visiting public to enjoy.

In 1993, Merrie Holbert "worked in cooperation with the U.S. Coast Guard to illustrate the operational lighthouses of Oregon, later writing and illustrating a booklet on the subject (which was) then sold in national park interpretive centers. She also worked with the Bureau of Land Management and the Confederated Tribes of the Coos, Siuslaw and Lower Umpqua Indians to illustrate their plans for parks."

In another example "as a way of saying thanks to the Charleston Fire Department for years of volunteer service and to provide a remembrance of the old fire station," artist Leo Dingman did a painting of the old station and donated it to the department in 1993.

Most of us are familiar with the beautiful Music Festival Posters celebrating marine mammals created each year from paintings by BAAA's first president, Don McMichael.

This illustrates just a sampling of special contributions by generous artists during the years 1992-1993. Likely other examples remain undocumented. We would like other stories and examples you may have to add to this collection.



WANT SOME GREAT FREE ADVERTISING?

Since she asked me to be the go-between from BAAA to *South Coast Beat*, any member who has an upcoming exhibit and would like some publicity needs to send me the following:

1 A brief writeup that outlines your thoughts on your work, what is in the exhibit, and the dates, location, etc. She is not interested in the resumé approach – that is, schooling, list of past exhibits, and such. She wants something more dynamic, something to interest the newspaper reader in wanting to come see your work. I will edit it as needed for the newspaper's use.

2 A photo. They love photos in the news media. A picture of YOU next to one of your works, or amidst your work in the gallery would be ideal. Send me several to choose from and make them flattering shots. They do not have to be professional. I can take snapshots you send me, even a photo from your phone, and ready them for publication.

Any artist (except artists associated with the Artist Loft Gallery) may submit up to 3 art works which express the Spring season – through color, through images, through feelings, etc. What exemplifies Spring to you? **Acceptable Formats** – Any two or three dimensional medium (for exclusions get the official entry form - see contact info. below.) 2D art limited to 320 sq. inches including frame; 3D art no more than 16" in any direction (height, length, or width.) 2D items must be ready to hang with wire. 3D items must be ready to hang, or be ready to sit on a flat surface without additional support. (The gallery may refuse any work.) **Entry Fees** - \$10 for the first entry and \$5 each for the second and third entries. Awards – First prize - \$50, plus certificate (and a guest artist show in 2018.) Second prize - \$25, plus certificate. Third prize - \$10, plus certificate. Honorable Mention -Ribbon. Commission - The Artist Loft will receive 20% commission.
