I've just returned from the Newport fabric arts show, where I viewed a textile wall-hanging by Susan Cronenwett, in which a three-dimensional, nautilus-shaped wave curved across the piece. Titled Evolution, the artwork's impact was in the weight, shape and momentum of the wave, clearly that which was both unstoppable in its process, and elegant in its design.

As an abstract art quilt, it was a striking piece to find in a "quilt show," and a striking subject to find mused upon in textiles. That said, I am delighted to report that it has become the new normal to find both abstract and representational textile artworks in "quilt shows" as fabric and textile artists push past traditional boundaries to express themselves, to reflect their passions, philosophical musings, and inner, outer, social, cultural, and ambient environments through the medium of cloth and thread

Rather than to a wild mind, let's say that to an unlimited mind creativity within ourselves should not, then, be limited in any way, and that we'll trust our disciplined eye and we'll trust our passionate artistic yearnings to keep us focused as we ride our artistic inclinations to manifest our inner musings.

Let's give ourselves permission to release the burden of limitations, expectations, and traditions in our own mediums, and sally forth to the edges to play. Let's pack our colors, tools, and toys, and perhaps an adult beverage, and set up our studios at the edges, where we can see things we can't see from the center.

As I'm writing this, we're coming up to the August eclipse, which I anticipate will be very powerful for visual artists. I hope you all get to experience the eclipse outdoors, in a concentrated moment of attention and awareness, and that you let the density of that profound reversal of the every-day normal saturate you and inspire you to extend your artistic edges.

FINAL REMINDER ABOUT SWOCC SHOW

The annual BAAA Eden Hall Exhibit will be from September 22 to November 3. SWOCC art instructors especially like to see innovative, creative work to inspire their art students for the fall term.

This show is open to BAAA members only. The show will not be judged, and there is no entry fee. All forms of art are eligible for exhibit including paintings, collage, sculpture, photography, textiles, wood carvings, pottery, etc. At least one locked case will be available for jewelry or small pieces. Wall hangings are limited to 3 per person and must be ready to hang with wire on the back.

Entries should be delivered to Eden Hall lobby at the SWOCC campus on Friday, September 22, from 10 am to noon. Complete the entry form included in this newsletter and bring it with your art. (Additional forms will be available if you forget.) You will notice the entry form now includes a disclaimer of liability for both BAAA and SWOCC. This is just a precaution as we have not had problems in the past.

You do not have to put a price on your work but may do so if you wish. Purchase inquiries will be forwarded to the artist.

She did bring along a few items from other manufacturers. The important thing was..what did we like best? Charles voted loudly several times for the crayons (the kid in him?) He had fun trying each one out in both wet and dry. Sharon was definitely leaning towards the acrylic



art spray used in mixed media. I think she is intrigued by the Jackson Pollock approach, which the sprays are perfect for. They are so different from the orderliness of Sharon's fabric work. But that 's what play is for bring out the inner person. Beth appreciated the gesso and white medium paste one spreads deliberately with a palette knife.





Our September 21 guest speaker will be highly talented member, Jan Ayers. As an ace photographer. Jan hales from New York City from a family of scientists and musicans/artists who revered art and

learning. She came of age in the art world of 1970's NYC, surrounded and influenced by post-modernists, outsiders, the avant-garde, and the experimenters. She traveled the world, but kept NYC as home base for almost 30 years. She moved to Rochester, NY in 2003 and rekindled her interest in photography.

Jan started out as a dancer and studied improvisation. Throwing water on the concept of the "still camera," she says, "dance is an ephemeral world, like theater. .. When it comes to photography...I wanted to keep that idea of chance and change, of spontaneity, the movement of the image. The object speaks to me when I photograph it and the conversation continues when I look at the final print. If it doesn't, I throw it away."

Jan goes on, "Being a poet is the second most important influence on my photography. Distillation is one of the hallmarks of poetry. Each image can be viewed as a poem. Something that grips you without having to explain itself as to why."

With thoughts like these, and many photographic examples on the video screen, this promises to be a real thought provoking presentation, regardless of the artistic medium we work in. Please be there and see what kind of inspiration you come away with!



The juror for this year seems to have rounded up a number of the usual suspects – Dutch Mostert, Jeffrey Hull, Austin Dwyer, Harold Johnson, Don McMichael, William Selden, Kim Wurster, and one BAAA member, Clyde Kirkpatrick.

Dwyer is here with his signature 19th century ships, this time offering "Maiden Voyage of a Great Whaler." I don't know about you, but I'm glad all of them are relegated to the past. Other by-the-book ship paintings include works by Harold Johnson, Buck Braden, local star Dutch Mostert, with a paint-



ing of three colorful boats "Riomaggiore Trio," and several more artists. William Selden is well represented, this time on shore with "Surf Shack and Cat," and a standout "Sailing the California Coast" which displays his wonderful use of values and crisp composition and color. Speaking of boats and color, Frank Gaffney, Mountlake Terrace, Washington, offers up a boat picture impressive for its use of red tones (boats aren't usually expressed in warm/hot colors) "Waiting for Tomorrow." (See next page.)

I always look for Jeffrey Hull and his masterly watercolors, and I was not disappointed with "Minus Tide," (see above) though his sea stacks have a sort of Papa, Mama, and Baby Bear configuration. But who can argue with his technique?

My two nominations for best Wave paintings would have to go to "Dazzled," by Micaiah Hardison and a breathtaking pastel, "Feathers and Foam," by Kim Wurster, who only seems to get better and better. Will she ever reach the peak of her ability? Guess we will have to wait and see.

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Interestingly, North Bend turns out to be a productive town for artists in the show this year. Among them are Dan Gilmore and his "Orcas in the Umpqua." Gilmore paints with the clarity of a Don Mc-Michael. Also, North Bend ceramist David Brigham whose "Salmon Tryptich" looks about ready for the barbecue, and Megan Gray who combines whimsy with spot on pen and ink renderings of undersea life in "Corralling the Reef."

There is one bird painting of a crow -though not by definition a "maritime" bird - very nicely executed by Caroline Still of Florence, entitled "Ruffled Attitude." Our corvid friends certainly have the right to get ruffled, being one of the smartest bird families around, and having to deal with us.



There are also a couple of particularly note-worthy three dimensional artists. One is Eric Olander, of Myrtle Point, whose abstract rendition of sails in

"Spiral" is nicely done in steel. Also, the lovely and lacy glass works of Susan Moore from Yacolt, Washington surely have my esteem. "If I had a Boat...," and "Tides High and Low" are rendered in filmy and almost iridescent blues and whites which almost seem to move and vibrate in the eye.

One very small problem. One of Harold Johnson's boats in a small painting "Salmon Trawler on the Hard" appears to be a TROLLER, according to a very informed source. My source felt Harold should have known the difference. Not a big deal, but if you want to weigh in and put your oar in the water on this subject (apologize for the pun) please feel free.
