We're one day past the Winter Solstice as I'm writing this, and the hours of Light become longer each day. The dark season ends, and the white season brings us Art Nouveau studies of feathery ice on our windshields.

Even though a prism will split white light into the spectrum of colors, it seems so odd to think of white as containing all colors... as an oftenfailed color mixtress, it's easy to believe that it's black that contains all colors! Studying up on it, I understand now that it's not 'white' that contains all colors, but 'white sunlight' that splits into colors.

It was a slow process which could take a month or more. It made an excellent white and was used by artists for centuries."

My journey through life has been most meaningful; from college, marriage, children, and working as a nurse for many years. Growing up, I was always sketching landscapes, animals, and people. It was always a treat to visit the art museums and galleries in Cleveland, Ohio. In addition, I discovered that being in or around nature created an awareness of the colors, textures, movement and energy

that brought me so much joy and peace and was so very inspiring. Loved the outdoors!

My husband and our two boys moved to Coos Bay in 1973. We lived on acreage on the South Coos River. Having grown up in a large city, I was so amazed by the forest, ocean, creeks, flowers, birds, and animals. We had a vegetable garden and raised blueberries, and raspberries. During the thirty years we lived there we had horses, cattle, goats, llamas as well as many dogs and cats, They made great subjects to draw.

I retired 10 years ago as a psychiatric nurse. I was concerned that might be a difficult transition, missing the relationships with my patients. By then we had moved to town and fortunately my Chocolate Labrador was my shadow and good company. I decided that this time would be a great opportunity to paint. I already knew that I loved the freedom and the spontaneity of watercolor, and I felt my creative spirit needed to be nurtured.

I appreciate the Impressionists and their legacy. My favorite is Claude Monet. He and some of his peers were considered to be radical by many critics as late as the 1880's. The last 10 years that I have painted watercolor, my goal has been not just to create detail but to allow the viewer to use their imaginations from their own perspective, hoping to create some thought provoking paintings. Now at 80 years young I know I want to continue to enjoy the process and to grow and learn more to nurture my creative spirit.

GREEK ISLES ART TOUR

You're invited to experience the sights, sounds, and tastes of Greece with at our monthly meeting of the Bay Area Artists Association at Coos Art Museum on Thursday, January 18, 2018 at 6 PM. We will travel to the **islands of Crete, Santorini, and Mykonos,** and visit the historical sites of Delphi, Corinth, Nafplio, and Delos. This record of our fall trip with 20 other travelers led by John Hewitt includes a photo slide show of the three weeks, as well as some of his watercolors done in Greece. Each day entailed at least one painting session with the other part of the day exploring the local town, and nearby archaeological sites or museums.

Traditional Greek music of the bouzouki will accompany the slide show, and introductory **snacks will include Fetaopitta and Tzatziki** (phyllo with



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olive cheese, with a cucumber-yogurt sauce), Chickpea Humus and Pita Bread, and seasonal fruit. Come and enjoy an across the board experience of the Greek country and its culture.

(The following is an article excerpt from the Oct. 2015 issue of the Perspective about Del Smith)

"What an amazing resource we have ... in Del Smith and her years of excellence and unswerving loyalty to CAM and the permanent collection. She has been keeping the books and doing everything else with the collection since the days of Maggie Karl and the collection's old home. The new room, where the collection has been stored since 2000, cost \$100,000 to refurbish...steel cases with drawers, drawers and more drawers for archivally storing unframed prints.

"What Del has REALLY done is keep the collection in great shape, cataloging it, labeling it, entering all the information (much of it having been stored in shoe boxes) into a wonderful database program and recording everything possible about each work. It has been her baby."



IN THE GALLERIES GARY OSTROM AT PACIFIC PARK and A CAM MELANGE

Currently at Pacific Park Gallery, former BAAA member Gary Ostrom (Canadian artist and presenter of the "Group of Seven" presentation last year at a BAAA meeting) is sharing his "Waves on the Shore of the Mind's Eye Sea, Visionary and Other Paintings." **Gary has a unique style** and POV and he went to one of the best art schools in Canada.



His focus is on late evening scenes, mostly outward bound. We have sea shores, closeups of water, assorted views of beach pebbles, lonely beaches,

and more. There is symbolism here and an undercurrent of feelings and emotions not easily parsed. A good example is "The Refelection of the Evening Star at Whiskey Run Beach" (above.) On the surface it seems a straightforward theme, but the painting is anything but straightforward. His color scheme (deep and sometimes murky blues set against deep yellowy gold accents.) Included in the showis another work from the same question provoking vision, "Happy Valley."

After Gary completed his formal education he went on to do commercial work - advertising, book covers, and such. Included in the show is a fine example of art done in that commercial vein, "Eight Shoes by Moonlight." The medium is gouache, the commercial artist's go to color medium before the onslaught of the computer.

If you are interested, the Mirandas, Roland and Carol, have a photography show upstairs. The exhibit (continued from previous page) consists mostly of routine local shots, though Roland has 3 very nice abstracts - "Swirlybird," "Coy Koi," with the third, "Grayscape," printed on canvas



The CAM shows this winter are quite varied. Downstairs we have a large and very colorful fiber exhibit courtesy "High Fiber Diet" of the Columbia Arts Guild. The show is split in two - "Heat Wave," dominated by orange, and "It's Not Easy Being (dominated by) Green." While I spent time with both, it was the orange that really swept me away. "Sunrise, Sunset" by Mary Arnold is a desert scene with saguaro cacti and is so hot I almost took my jacket off. Superb work. Another, "Hotflash," is a portrait in two halves made by two artists. Another collaboration "Dalsumba," by Jo Noble and Pat Fyer, celebrates African culture using beautiful African fabrics. There is also a wonderful cityscape, "Where the City Meets the Desert," (see below) the work of Elizabeth Bamberger, along with a natural theme to choose, "Hot Fall," by Annette McFarlane.



In the Vaughan Gallery is the CAM Staff Show. If you needed any proof that BAAA people are the heart of art here, you will see works by: Beth Wegner, Victoria Tierney, Archi Davenport, Pat Snyder, Betty Bangs (whose work is

also upstairs as Artist of the Month,) Sarita Southgate, Ken Ayers, and Carol Hanlin. Remember, not only are they local artists of note, but these are all employees and/or regular, hard working volunteers at CAM. **Way to Go BAAA!!**

Upstairs is a show of the two recent CAM Peoples' Choice winners - Jean Kyle (ANOTHER BAAA member,) and Bandon's ace gourd artist Sunny Kudo. Kudos to Kudo for such elaborate and creative work with the lowly gourd. They becomes cloissone, or abstract art or whatever she wants them to be. And it is wonderful to see Jean's signature style and watercolor pours all gathered in one place. The unity of her style and her personal view of things is very effective.

The Wehrle has some clever felted nesting birds on display, and the local woodworkers have taken over the Atrium. There are the usual pieces of furniture, many very nicely done, but the interpretive artistic pieces carried the day for me. Though I was a professional furniture and musical instrument maker for decades, these smaller, more intimate and creative pieces really caught my eye. Rick Fox, (yet another BAAA member) has some wall pieces and a marvelous "Alder Vessel" on display. An amazing spalted alder bookcase was done by Roland Olsen. No ordinary bookcase this. Finally, Artist Loft artist Mark Rom has some fabulous Henry Moorish carvings that look like polished brown marble -"Atonement," and "Argument and Logic" among them. Top grade work and great imagination.


