## ARTIST OF THE MONTH -CHARLES EDMUNDS

Charles was born in Washington in 1930. His first artistic talent, encouraged by his mother, a concert violinist, was music and he became so proficient on the oboe that he was admitted to the prestigious Curtis Institute in Philadelphia in his teens, where he was awarded a four year scholarship.

While he excelled on the instrument his heart wasn't in it (basically - "my mother made me do it.") His heart was leading him toward the visual arts. He moved from one great learning center to another – the Philadelphia Museum School of Art for 2 years, starting in 1948. While there he received an Oil Painting Award. His education was interrupted when he joined the Navy in 1950, but after his duty, he returned to his studies under the GI Bill and enrolled at the Pennsylvania Academy of the Fine Arts (currently ranked as one of the best art schools in the US) for four years. The school awarded him a Life Painting Award.

Rather than continue with further academic studies, or look for a job in commercial art, he decided to travel the US, especially visiting national parks such as Zion and Yosemite. Starting in 1969 he roamed around California operating his own galleries in three different towns.

His travels also took him to the neighborhoods of San Francisco and Los Angeles where he completed many fine watercolors.

He joined a commune in Marysville, California, which he describes as a defining moment. Next, moving to artsy Santa Cruz he started working as a janitor in 1975 at an elementary school for 17 years. After he retired he moved to Coos Bay and continued his artwork under the nom d'artiste "Charles of Charleston."

While he is adept in many media, Charles favors oil painting and has recorded hundreds of scenes in and around our area (see "Roosevelt Road..." at lower left.) His favorite method is en plein air – painting outdoors, in order to capture the moment, as the Impressionists did.

For all of us, Charles is synonymous with BAAA. He has served on the board in a variety of offices since BAAA's inception, currently as treasurer. In addition, he handles the BAAA website and is also Education Committee Chair. Also, he is currently a member of the Artist Loft Gallery.

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Twenty-three members, and visitors joined us on February 16 at CAM for our monthly meeting. One guest, Judy Rose, had been a member in the past, and we all were pleased she could be with us again. Our

president, Sharon Leahy, welcomed everyone warmly. She especially thanked Archi for her lovely refreshment assortment. Sharon invited anyone who had upcoming shows to let us know about them. (See the last section of this newsletter **BAAA MEMBERS ART ON EXHIBIT** for a full list.) We should also remember that our BAAA show at Evergreen Court will be coming down on March 3 between 1 and 3. So, if your work is hanging there, please remember to pick it up during that time.

We then took our refreshment break, visited awhile, and after that Graham introduced our presenter Catherine Walworth for "It's Only Clay – Part One." Catherine had provided each visitor with 2 slabs of 2 pounds of clay. There were backing boards available and everyone laid out their tools. She invited us up front to learn some quick and basic steps in working with clay, plus providing us with other tools from a very large battery laid out on the front table.

With our heads spining from these last minute instructions we headed to our respective work areas. It may only be clay but any new medium carries its challenges. The time allotted was barely enough for most to finish their

projects, while some even theirs home to finish and later deliver to Catherine.

ats, clay is not as responsive as it looks. It has a "memory" that can make it seem more resistant than resilient. I was greatly frustrated and, when Catherine came around her advice was to "start all over." Having wasted 30 minutes I had to try something far simpler than the "simple" project I had planned. Needless to say, I was not happy with my results.





Walking around to see what other members were up to, Jim and Archi were going into production making 3 cat bowels and a vase. Judy Caldwell was turning out a large and very 3 dimensional sunflower with a flat center large enough to park a flower pot.

Next month, Catherine will return with our bisque fired works all ready to finalize with glaze. The April meeting will begin with her having fired the glazing and we can stand around and ooh and aaah onr another's work while some, like me,

will not be surprised my own *photo by Archi* production which will look like something that a beginning 3<sup>rd</sup> grader would chuckle about. Oh well, it's all in the trying.

One thing I am sure of – we all met up with a wonderful medium and will have greater respect for any one who works in it.





If you were at our February meeting you created your own ceramic project. For sure, no two were alike which is the beauty of turning artists loose on a new medium without being told what to make. The results were varied and we were informed that we needed to make those soft surface designs full of places to catch the object's future glaze.

So, at our next meeting, March 15 at CAM, Catherine Walworth will return with our bisque fired pieces. (Bisque firing is done at a low temperature to make the ceramic hard enough to decorate with glaze.) After that, they she will fire the glazed ceramics at a higher temperature to set the glaze. Many times, the glaze will run which becomes an even more decorative effect. Since the final appearance is not always "as planned," it can become a wonderful finish where the glaze takes on a life of its own.

Even if you didn't make the February meeting please join us to see what we did and how we proceed with the final decoration. You might kindle enough interest to learn basic ceramics.

Our guest presenter will be KATHLEEN MOREY BAILEY from Bandon's Art By the Sea Gallery. Kathleen, well known for both her art and her teaching, will be here to help us loosen up and get abstract.

### IN THE GALLERIES



For this month we catch up with artists at the Artist Loft Gallery on Anderson in Coos Bay. We will look at the work of BAAA member artist Carol Howald (currently the Gallery's Artist of the Month,) and a new member of the Artist Loft, photographer Janet Ashikaga.

Carol grew up in southeast Alaska, and started drawing as a child. While Carol's technique is outstanding in many ways she

describes herself as "mostly self taught." Later on she did take some college art classes in Alaska.

By 1983 she was confident enough to start her own



Fiordland Studio. Mostly working in oils, with both brush and palette knife, she also does some acrylics.

Carol paints in a realistic style with some influences from impressionism. Her compositions are strong and colorful, yet conservative, and her subject matter reflects her life in Alaska and what she gained from its inspiration.

Carol is a recognized painter and has had 3 of her paintings purchased by the State of Alaska, as well as having works on display in various buildings in Alaska. She has a studio in Myrtle Point, is a member of the American Society of Marine Artists, and has been represented in the local Maritime Show at CAM, where she has sold some of her work.



Back in the 1970's the Loft's newest member, photo-grapher Janet Ashikaga, began to work her way into the film business in L.A.



She eventually be-s came a top assistant film editor. In the 80's she was active in photo editing, her real goal. To suplement her education,

she took a class in photoraphy at the esteemed Art Center School of Design in nearby Pasadena, and a new passion was born. Realizing that, because of the demands of editing, she would have to pursue one or the other, she chose editing.

Photography (basically editing and focusing on just a moment in time) would have to take a back seat. Her editing career saw her working in television ("Seinfeld,

"West Wing" and other award winners) until, eventually, she and her husband decided it was time for a change.

The change? A move to Bandon where she would have time to pursue her photography. Again, the opportunity to capture a moment in time would have her full attention. Joining the Artist Loft Gallery was a boon to the gallery's collection of photographers, and fellow working members.
