

I was born and raised in Eugene, Oregon and graduated from South Eugene High School. Meeting and marrying my husband brought me to Coos Bay area in 1970.

I joined one of the first crafter's malls in the early 1970's, helping relieve my house of the many crafts and art pieces that I had created over the years. I started painting with oil in the about that same time, working mostly on wood. I sold my plaques and paintings to some of the local myrtlewood shops and did several commissioned pieces.

I went to work in 1984 and my husband started his own business, so, finding time for painting was limited. I worked at a print shop and helped local artists get true color matches for the prints and giclees of their artwork. One of those artists was Barbara Lippold, who was holding watercolor classes every week. She talked me into attending one of her classes, and I became hooked on the medium. I have attended several classes and workshops given by local artists, taken a couple different art classes at Southwestern Oregon Community College, and also did a weekend workshop with nationally known watercolor artist, Monty Preston.

I have been a Bay Area Artists Association

member for many years and was their treasurer for three years, and also chaired several art shows.

My love for wildlife and nature has been an influence on my paintings. My approach and technique involves many layers and glazes of beautifully blended colors in order to create the shading, textures and bold colors in my paintings.

After sharing some thoughts about the **CAM Adopt-a-Work** program (see the article in this issue) she passed around the reproductions of the works being considered. 

# **MONSTER SHOW AND TELL**

## (Something Old, Something New...)

No, we don't bring in pictures of monsters. It's "Monster" - like huge, big, like **everybody** brings an artwork to the meeting. Then we we will take turns showing and sharing and telling everyone about one of our latest projects, or maybe one of our oldest, as the case may be – or maybe both.. This worked **very nicely** last year, so we hope MANY members will be there to share.

# MAY MEETING PROGRAM

Our presenter for the May 'hands on' art night will be **Kathleen Morey Bailey**. You may already know her as a friendly, hard working, and talented artist who is a mainstay of the Bandon art scene. Her abstract and semiabstract art is both eye- catching and uplifting. We will have a great opportunity as she leads



us into abstract art down her own path.

Kathleen says, "Since sometime in the 1980's, I realized I had a gift for painting the essence, the energy of a person, a place, or a feeling. It's difficult to teach people how to do that unless they can feel it too."

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So, she will begin with a demonstration. On May 17th she will paint an "energy painting" of someone in the audience, in order to show how the process works. We will have a bowl at the meeting with the name of each person, and one name will be drawn. Katheleen will then demonstrate her painting style with a portrait of that person. It will be in oil on a 24 x 30 canvas board. The whole painting will take around 15-20 minutes. (P.S. The person whose portrait is painted will get to take their portrait home.) After that, she will encourage and help us do our own work following her precepts. What should we bring for our hands on participation?

**Bring media you can work with easily** – pencils, charcoal, watercolors (including watercolor pencils and watercolor crayons, pastels, wax crayons, etc. **Don't forget to bring** your own brushes, water container, erasers, etc. You should have whatever you need so you can open up and get right to work without any involved setup. Oil paints and maybe even acrylics could be difficult and messy. Easy and quick setup means you can get to work right away... sketching, experimenting, mixing media...perhaps working on a piece that can be finished that night.

So, bring your favorite materials, and, as Katherine recommends, "Leave your mind at home and try painting from your heart."




# BAAA AND BMG... TOGETHER AGAIN

You may recall back in 2017 we had an official **BAAA show at Black Market Gourmet**? And very successful it was, too. Well, the wonderful Jardin and Kristin at BMG have written us down for shows in both 2019 (March, April) and 2020 (July, August.)

The venue hosts many, many banquets through the year for a variety of organizations, businesses, and

groups, plus hosting a GREAT community opening reception for the show. So, many people who may never have seen your artwork will be able to enjoy it under very favorable circumstances.

Obviously, there will be much more publicity later this year and beyond, and **all BAAA members will be guaranteed a place on the walls of Black Market Gourmet.** The BAAA Board just wanted to share this good news, now that it has been finalized.



What's "Adopt-A-Work"? It's a program at CAM whereby one of the artworks in the wonderful CAM permanent collection, which is showing its age and is in need of some conservation efforts, gets "adopted" by an individual, corporation, or organization. Their generosity then pays for its rehab.

What do these, poor, benighted, and helpless art works need? Some need a new frame, some a new mat, others to have the heavy glass removed and replaced with acrylic. Some need all three, and, possibly, even more critical repairs.

BAAA is currently looking at doing this as a follow up to getting to know our 2018 Honorary Member, Del Smith who oversees the permanent



collection. It is certainly in line with one of our stated purposes, to "**promote the visual arts as a positive and necessary component in the community.**" What with CAM being THE visual arts mecca in the region, it is certainly an organization we give our whole-hearted support to.

Very shortly, you will receive an email (or snail mail document, if you don't have email) showing the 5 artworks which were selected by a BAAA

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temporary committee – all items in dire need, will be well within our budget. As members you will then be asked to vote for 3 of the 5. The 3 selected items will then be shown to The Art Connection, who will figure their already discounted costs of restoration, and the board will choose one of the three as our adopted work.

So, keep an eye on your mail and let us know as soon as you can which works you choose. We will tally the results and keep you posted. **Thanks, in advance, for your interest and generosity.** 





The traditional summer vacation is looming. Travel is in the wind. Are you headed somewhere? Nice change of pace maybe ? Hitting the road for new or renewed sights, sites and places? Is "**it**" already on your radar? What is "**it**"? Art, of course. If I took any trips these days, besides saying hi to medical personnel, "**it**" would be on my radar.

Last October, when I had my post-op appointment in Portland, I did treat myself. My trip coincided with **THE best day of fall color** in western Oregon. I took Oregon State Route 34 from Waldport to Lebanon. The color blistered my eye it was so bright. In Portland, the colors in all the neighborhoods consisted of just two visible groups- an intense blue above the horizon, fronted by every conceivable red, orange, yellow, and warm purple you could think of. But, that's not all. I got to visit the **Portland Art Museum** and was wonderfully rewarded there, too.

So, any art included in your summer trip plans? The west coast has many great art museums, both large and small - from Seattle to San Diego. Smaller museums in Santa Barbara, Pasadena, and Oxnard, in California, as well as Eugene, and Salem in Oregon have a few surprises just as interesting as you will see in some of the big ones. And the big ones – Seattle Art Museum, the Getty Museums, LA County Museum, the Norton Simon, are **just overstuffed with great art.** 

So, IF you are traveling the west coast this summer, here is what's on tap in art. If you aren't looking for art, then why are you even leaving home? Actually, beaches, mountains, inland rivers and forests and all the beautiful natural sights we have on the west coast are what I really look for. Art museums are a wonderful frosting on the cake. But I love frosting. Enough of that...here's what will be out there.

### SEATTLE

SAM – Seattle Art Museum is hosting a collection of **pioneer European avant garde works** by leading artists of the early 1900s. Also on tap - the work of some great **American and European abstract artists** from 1940's and 50's when Abstract Expressionism took off like a Cape Canaveral Atlas rocket. There are more than 100 works on display.

FRYE ART MUSEUM (from whence came Steven Broocks) - The show to see is **"Towards Impressionism: Landscape Painting from Corot to** 



Monet," which runs to August 5. Modern landscape painting came of age in France with the work of Corot and Corbet,

major influences on the Impressionists. The art on exhibit comes from the **Musée des Beaux-Arts**, **Reims**, and Frye's own holdings.

### PORTLAND

PAM (no, <u>not</u> SAM's wife) in Portland, has a fine summer show of the early work of the great California artist **Richard Diebenkorn** (who was born in Portland) on display through September 23. I am unreservedly a Diebenkorn fan. These early works, from 1942-1955, **have never been on display before** 

and come from the Diebenkorn Foundation. If you know his Ocean Park series, as well as his figurals and landscapes, this will be a wonderful chance to see his work.



## story continued from previous page SAN FRANCISCO

SFMOMA – The huge AND redone San Francisco Museum of Modern Art is a real wonder...as in "wonderful." Huge collections, lots on display. There is a show this summer of 70 (yes 70) of **Rene Magritte**'s surrealist works. If you don't know Magritte, Google his images.

DeYOUNG MUSEUM – The DeYoung is known for blockbusters – The Impressionists, Sargent, Picasso, and more. While not a blockbuster, the summer show"Cult of the Machine" offers **American** 

**precisionist paintings**. As the blurb says "Precisionism—a style that... flourished during the 20s and 30s reconciled realism with abstraction to create a streamlined, "machined" aesthetic with themes ranging from the urban and industrial to the pastoral." While not always an endorsement of mechanization, the style is



intriguing and wonderfully executed, to say the least.
