ARTIST OF THE MONTH -SHARON JENSEN



When I retired in 2008 and moved back to Oregon from California, it was, in many ways, a homecoming. Growing up in Ashland and spending summers in

our family peach orchard was idyllic. I attended Southern Oregon University, earning a Bachelor of Arts in Psychology, going on to work with emotionally disturbed children. Moving from Ashland to Lake Tahoe, I went on to teach skiing at Alpine Meadows, California, and Mount Rose, Nevada for the next six years.

Eventually, life required a steady income and, so, my professional life began with the production of art festivals and fairs in California, spanning the next 10 years. The highlight was the production of Festival at the Lake in Oakland, California., an arts festival that has remained one of my greatest joys. It was the recipient of many awards and grants including funding from the National Endowment for the Arts, the California Council for the Arts, and California Council for the Humanities.

It was many years later, after 25 years in local and state government, that I started my own artistic journey. It began in watercolor, with classes from Katherine Lemke Waste of Sacramento, CA. In 2008, I took up painting full time, studying with Sas Colby, Nicholas Wilton, Susan Lehman and Zoe Cohen.

Working in my studio at Floras Lake, my work is now almost entirely in acrylics and collage: layering and sanding, adding, subtracting and mark-making. When I begin a painting, the first marks are gestural, made with a fluid acrylic or ink. When dry, I follow up with layer upon layer of paint, paper, or ink. Sometimes layers are allowed to dry, sometimes not; the process often intuitive. At this stage, I begin to observe the composition, making thoughtful sparing marks in the wet paint or scratch into the surface with various tools. My pieces generally take time to evolve, over days or weeks. But sometimes one comes together quickly and that is the magic of art

My work has been shown in Oregon and California, and is currently in the Hawthorne Gallery in Port Orford, Oregon. I travel frequently, recently to Spain and France, where I gather materials, ideas and inspiration.

Wow, what a program 20 plus of us experienced, presented by member Graham Wickham. It was

entitled "American Modernism" (the art from 1910 – 1950.) I may be speaking for a lot of the women artists who were present when I say "Thank You." It was wonderful to see how many female artists were included in the presentation. It was a visual delight, and so respectfully presented. Yes, there were plenty of male artists included in the program but what was notable was the abundance of women creating art. Also, several of the artists were immigrants, Jews, and blacks, showing that the art world was more open than many other social or professional circles during the early to middle 1900's.



Graham introduced us to some of the movers and shakers of the American modernist period, as well

as some lesser lights involved in advancing Modernism, but all done in a lovely way - first by giving us the artists' life stories, and then showing us the progression of their artistic careers, often in spite of hardships they encountered. It became apparent how influential many of these artists were and, as Graham pointed out, we have all been influenced by the artistic movements he shared, both Modernism and Impressionism.

The entire program was educational and inspirational, especially, I think, for the women present at the meeting. We were all glued to our seats during the slide show and learned new information while being entertained - even the "movie style" intermission with gift bags of M&Ms was delightful.

Thank you Graham and please do this again.

OUR NOVEMBER MEETING -CRITIQUING ARTWORK IN THE . .

SUZUKI STYLE ??

The November program is an interactive one. Members and non-members should bring in a work of art they have done, or are in the process of doing, so that we can learn how to use one method of critiquing. If you are hesitant, please don't be. Read on and find out why.

The Suzuki music method was designed for children, their teacher, and their parents. While the method is for musical performance and growth, will it **work equally well with visual art ? Yes.** But wait! We are adults, and a parent is not involved, and we probably don't have a teacher. So how do we apply the Suzuki principles to **critiquing someone's art work ?**

FIRST Above all, we begin by approaching another's work with **respect** for the person and **respect for their work**. Each of us should be able to expect that we, and our feelings will be respected. When we belittle someone's work we are belittling them. Unless an artist has built up a thick skin from years of being critiqued in a disrespectful matter, little growth will be accomplished by this standard critiquing method.

SECOND **A person's work is...personal**. Most of us believe in what we are doing or we wouldn't be doing it. But we can move along the learning process by **positive critiquing**. This is fundamental in "**teaching with love**," as Shinichi Suzuki styled it. So how is it done?


STEP ONE Commend everything you can before you go on to anything else. Find those things that are strengths, that are unique to the person's style, that jibe with what is considered good in composition, use of color, repetition, balance, etc. There are good things that every artist does that can be used to **build both their confidence and a desire to progress. And, as artists, aren't we all students?** (Note – Giving valid commendation tests our own knowledge of artistic principles. This is a good time to expand our own growth in that area.)

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STEP TWO Normally, outside the Suzuki method, after initially showing strengths in a work, the teacher or critiquer would begin listing all the poor and bad nasties in their work, often deflating the person's sense of accomplishment. So, the moment right after commendation is an important one. It is a time to invite the artist to identify ways in which they think they could grow and make what is good even better. (This shows both respect and partnership.) Warning if your commendation has been successful, the artist won't say (or be thinking) something like, "OK, so it really stinks. Tell me how to make it as good as yours !") Many artists may have few or no thoughts. This usually results in their asking you for your thoughts. Now you have been invited, you haven't imposed yourself.

STEP THREE At this point, showing respect and word choice are important. So, use phrases like "what do you think if you did this to this (shape, color, area, etc.)?" You are asking and inviting their thoughts and their partnership. You are also helping the artist to learn to self-critique and take the lead in their own growth. It doesn't hurt to invoke a standard art principle such as "it's often effective to move the center of interest away from the center of the canvas," or "a great way to make grey is to mix complementary colors. Have you ever tried it?" If they aren't familiar with a principle or a technique, explain it and why it can be effective. But it's important here not to make what is a proven principle to sound like a rule. The history of art is littered with rules that aren't rules. And art history is rife with rule breakers who became great artists.


At our November meeting we will explore using these ideas. After a recap of the concepts (and some experiences shared) Graham will give an example based on an artwork he will bring in. Then it will be everyone's turn to try this method out on the artwork we all bring in. Bring a new one, and old one, an in between one, even one you are working on. See if you don't go home with some new ideas and greater confidence.
