President's Letter

COLLAGE POWER

This month. I offer for your consideration an 'old' medium whose artistic potential remains to be rediscovered and exploited: the Collage. We all think we know what a Collage is: sort of akin to "something old, something new, something borrowed, something blue." Yet as zealous a proponent of Modernism as Robert Motherwell has stated: "Collage is the twentieth century's greatest invention." Could there be more to Collage than meets the eye? Could there be something left for us to rediscover in this medium?

We now know the origins of Collage in Europe predate Picasso and Braque by nearly a century. But to them goes the credit of bringing Collage to the forefront of what we now call Modern Art. Let's imagine them tearing up wallpaper in 1912. Oh to have been a fly on the wall in 1912! It's not too hard to see how pattern in their collages was transformed later into the breakup of an object into vibrant color shapes in their better known paintings. Composition was reinvented by these exercises.

For Motherwell, the Collage is philosophically distinct from the 'Unexpected Combination': "To pick up a cigarette wrapper or wine label or an old letter or the end of a carton is my way of dealing with those things that do not originate in me, in my **I**." Collage then is the artist's opportunity to amalgamate the life of his or her times, "to convey a message, a feeling, a mood."

By 1917 the Collage was already gaining interest, even acceptance. Henry Wolf devotes a whole chapter to Collage in his book Visual Thinking: "The Artist in this medium is above all a good editor, a pack rat and a paste-up man with a sense of design. It helps to have collected visual oddities of all kinds over the years. Tram tickets from Barcelona, calling cards from Japan, illustrations clipped from a Sears and Roebuck catalog of 1920 are examples of valuable ingredients. By judiciously combining several of these images in a seemingly haphazard way, you can convey a message, a feeling, a mood. Often the strange juxtaposition of unrelated pictures from widely different sources can create a startling effect, not only because of the variety of literal content, but in the great range in style and technique displayed... In spite of its seemingly unrelated sources, a successful collage makes a definite point and relates to a theme."

Now to our goal. If each and every member of our organization creates one or more collages in the next month (or two,) BAAA will have produced an entirely new Show on one theme one that has the potential to tour various venues in Oregon and beyond. As your President, I dedicate myself to make that happen. But YOU have to create The Collages! Good luck!


I have been a Bay Area Artists Association

THE CHARLES EDMUNDS *I* KNOW

Twelve years ago I started working at CAM as a front desk volunteer. A woman came in and told us about

meeting a man in the waiting room of her car dealership where they were both having their cars worked on. He told her he was a painter and insisted she visit this wonderful art museum. She said, "I can't remember his name, but he really talked a lot." Carla, the lobby manager at the time, said "That must have been Charles." That was my first introduction to Charles of Charleston.

He is an artist--a really good artist. He started his studies at the age of 17 at the Museum School of Art in Philadelphia, and, after a stint in the Navy, attended the Pennsylvania Academy of the Fine Arts for four years. Now, over 60 years later, he continues to paint often, and well. Along with his sidekick, Rod Sullens, he paints with the Bandon group on Mondays, with our local group on Tuesdays, with Alice's group on Fridays and wherever, whenever someone suggests a plein air paintout.

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He is not only a one-man booster club for the museum but has given five of his paintings to the museum's permanent collection and donated many more to the auction fund-raisers. When the museum started the Art in the Schools program at Sunset Middle School, he was one of the first to volunteer because he believes children need art education.

Twenty years ago, Charles was one of the founders of Bay Area Artists Association, along with Jim Davenport, Betty Bangs, and Dutch Mostert, and he continues to be an active, participating member, currently serving as treasurer. And he has long been the Education Chair of the association. Many new people show up to our meetings because somewhere they met Charles who recruited them to join our group. He's hard to turn down.

Charles is an artist and art supporter, but he is much more than that. He enjoys everything. Besides art receptions, he goes to movies, to lectures, to musical performances, and all the plays at the Liberty, and Dolphin theaters.

He is fascinated by the natural world. A month ago when we were painting at the Marine Life Center, he got really excited about the squid skeleton and how the suckers on its tentacles worked to catch prey. In this often cynical world, Charles's enthusiasm and wonder for life is a refreshing balm.

Let me tell you another Charles story. Again the scene is the front desk of CAM 12 years ago. But by this time I had actually met him. Charles would come in with his friend Curt Hitch. They discussed and critiqued the art work on exhibit, but, of course, Charles did most of the talking. I was impressed by the depth of his knowledge and his perceptive observations. It was easy to eavesdrop on them from the front desk because Curt was quite deaf and the discussions were really loud. The point of telling you this story is not what I learned about art, but what I learned about Charles. Curt lived alone and he had dementia. Charles worried about him. He would go over and convince Curt to get up, get dressed, and get out of the house. A few months ago I read a French proverb that made me think of Charles and Curt: "Friends show up even when you're at your worst." Because of his disease, Curt was at his worst, but Charles refused to give up on him. He continued to show up.

I don't think the rest of us are at our worst, at least most of the time, but Charles shares his talent, his enthusiasm, his curiosity, his great joy for life with us. He continues to show up for us and we are all the better for it.

Then our guest presenter, longtime BAAA member Shinan Barclay, took us on a trip to the world of the native Inuits of Alaska. She told us how she had come to be with the Inuits many years ago. These experiences when she was young meant a lot to her, and told us that they helped make her the woman she is today.

With the help of the TV monitor, we saw examples of native Inuit art. She shared a quote from James Houston who wrote a book, "Confessions of an Igloo Dweller." Houston traded away all his possessions to stay with the Inuit and collect their art work. Later he showed these in museums and was able to spark grants for the benefit of the tribe.



Shinan had us work on an art project – using construction paper, scissors, and glue to create Inuit style cutouts of native animals.

As I saw the finished art there were no two

alike! Shinan was very interesting to listen to, with a great sense of humor. All 27 people on hand enjoyed her



talk as much as they enjoyed the activity.

OUR MARCH MEETING PRESENTATION

On March 19 at our monthly meeting Meadowlark Molyneux will tell her story of finding her totem through art with what she calls "painting with threads," or cross stitch. Science gives evidence that humans and animals DNA are intertwined and she will acquaint the group with how to identify their own totem, or many totems, throughout their lives.

At a difficult time in her life when Meadowlark was looking for something to help ease her stress, it was then that she was introduced to cross-stitch. This craft flourished in China as early as the 7th century AD. It's created by using multi-colored embroidery threads and needle, pulled through fabric to form a design. Her "paintings with threads" art will show how the appearance of the animals became her totems and influenced her art.

Meadowlark exhibited her show of thread paintings in January of 2016 at the opening of Gallery by The Bay art gallery in North Bend, and she continues to thread-paint and add new paintings to her body of work.
