# BAAA ARTIST OF THE MONTH - MAY JUDY CALDWELL

Judy is May's BAAA Artist of the Month at Coos Art Museum. Included there are five other galleries of "Expressions West," and other exhibits. (The museum is following the mandates of the State of Oregon as far as the number of guests in the building one time, plus observing masking requirements. If you wish to go call CAM to make sure of the latest information.)

Earlier, Judy Caldwell had her art ready to show at Gallery by The Bay when plans were interrupted by COVID-19. She went ahead and hung her work on the gallery walls. Gallery by the Bay has become one of the best kept secrets in Coos Bay/North Bend since its schedule of open hours was set aside during this past year. (You can call 542-808-3027 or 541-808-3404 for appointment showing. We are hopeful that regular hours will be restored soon.)

Here's a little of what you have been missing. In her show Judy has departed from her representational art. She's done many shows through the years in this style, has received numerous awards, and has passed on her skills to her many students.

She tried doing "abstract" before moving here 4 years ago, but it didn't pan out until artist/teacher Kim Kimerling came to town. He conducted his unique style of





mixed media collage in the abstract at the Art Salon of the gallery. His encouragement and teaching inspired to give it a try. He taught her to use fabrics, assorted paper, stencil work, miscellaneous memorabilia, and a free style of letting the brush lead the way for the color to express her inner feelings at the moment. She was able to find the freedom of expression

she had been looking for. Her brilliant splashes of red, yellow, and orange might declare the joyous

feeling she would be experiencing at the time, while the darks, when played against the light, might reveal a more pensive or reflective mood. She calls it "painting her emotions".



# DO YOU KNOW THIS "JANE" ARTIST? - JANE FREILICHER

She was born in Brooklyn in 1924 and died at the age of 90. As a child she loved art and said, at one point, "I might do something in art, not for fame or achievement, but out of a romantic inclination to beautiful things. A free-floating feeling that something was creative in me."

After high school she took both art and teaching, earning her BA at Brooklyn College, then an MA from Columbia University. During this time she met the very important art teacher, Hans Hofmann. Hoffman had come from Germany where he had taught art and, with his ebullient teaching method, almost immediately became a top art teacher in the US. His own style was based on the abstract and he was fundamental in the creation of the Abstract Expressionist movement. Freileicher studied with him and began to work in abstract painting.

But her personality and goals took her down another road. Influenced by the French artist Pierre Bonnard, she moved to a much more realistic continued on next page

mode that was "softly brushed, meditative, (and) lyric" as one critic said.



She painted from what she saw from her windows. Her work was done both from her Fifth Avenue penthouse apartment -



and her Long Island home on Mecox Bay. We may recall that last year our past president Phil Noguere urged us to both study the art of, and use in our own art, views through windows, a painting then becoming a window within a window. Frielicher is a great example of how to use that arrangement.





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Being that we are talking about abstract painting and Perspective is in the nostalgia mode, here is the regular Artist of the Month from May. 2016 which featured one of our outstanding and longtime members, Pat Snyder.



# ARTIST OF THE MONTH PAT SNYDER

Pat Snyder is a former art teacher at Marshfield High School in Coos Bay where he began his career in 1967 and included college-level instruction at Southwest Oregon Com-

munity College. Currently he is a full time artist in Coos Bay.

About his art Pat says, "My primary interest is to sense visual elements composed through the semiabstract and abstract. Real and abstract exist together in this ever-changing, active world. I enjoy visually

#### 10 MINUTE SUNSET SKETCHING

I've been itching to paint outdoors, but I didn't want to go alone. When a Florence artist friend posted her "plein air sketches" on Facebook. I admired her—quick representations of the dunes, foliage, and water. Hey, I can do that. I don't have to sit around grumping for someone to paint with. Ten-minute sketches, on location. I'll make it simple and use my new Swiss watercolor crayons and two small pieces of mat board.

I stopped whining and took positive action. After zipping my down jacket and tightening my wool hat, I stepped into the cold windy twilight. Crayons are kid's stuff, so is scribbling. I'd have no expectations.

Twilight is that in-between time, adding magic to beauty and awe. Down near Empire Docks, the sunset sky and reflected water were in an ever-changing luminosity and flow. The natural beauty inspired me; I felt myself swept up into the creative process.

A choice of subject was changing skies, shimmering water, black storm clouds, or an orange sunset. The muted olive and ocher colors of the swamplands and the S-shape curves [IMG1] of the slough snaking silver through the grasslands dazzled my senses.

I jotted down the colors, shapes, and patterns. Translating the energy of the bay water and beach onto my paper took ten minutes. "Find your own joy," I told myself.

Back in my warm apartment, I set out the sketches and saw two areas that needed study and practice: trees and water. More to learn. Then, I added shadows, highlights, and embellishments.

Here in Coos Bay, on Tuesday mornings, a group of plein air artists led by Charles and Joan venture out to paint at prime locations around the county. People of various ages and experience paint together in the same vicinity. I've stopped to chat with them, even envied their outdoor art time. However, Tuesday is a work day for me, plus I prefer painting at sunset.

Saturday evening is my time for sunset scribbles.
