But, there was more to come! Joan served as MC, while Sam, in appropriate dress, helped some of us exchange gifts. Next year, let's all bring a gift and take one home.

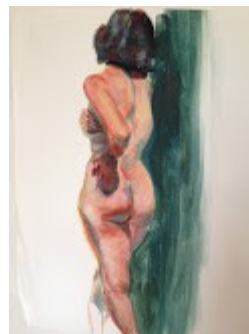
This year's party felt high on the list of best parties. Maybe, we are starting to get the hang of it!

ARTIST OF THE MONTH -

W. RALSTON-BURGER



We all know Wendy's interest in painting the human form. How many know her art background, though? Here is what she says about herself. (It was all news to me.)

"Life drawing has held a special interest for me since my very first, and accidental, experience drawing from a nude model. I was seventeen, on my own, and charging into a future that I was sure would be exciting, creative and adventurous. I had enrolled in a couple of evening classes held in an old Boston Brownstone - one for Russian language, the other an open studio "Life Drawing."

"The open studio was packed, and, since I was late, the only space available was at the front of the room where the model was sitting on a raised

platform in a kimono. I was pretty well stunned when she removed her robe and took up the first quick gesture pose, completely naked.

“There was furious scratching and rustling around me, otherwise the room was silent. So, I just began to draw and the surroundings disappeared. My eye guided my hand, charcoal against paper, moving as quickly as I could, leaving no room for thought or self-consciousness. I don’t remember what the results on the paper were, but I was hooked on the process.

“Since that time, I have often taken figure drawing classes or joined drawing groups, especially in the years when I was without space, time and energy to pursue my artwork. I feel the intensity and dynamic of this sort of drawing has kept my creative spark ignited.”

CAM JURIED PRINTMAKING EXHIBITION



It has been almost 3 years since the last print show at CAM, from Northwest Print Council and a fantastic show it was. This year, the show was generated by CAM, which invited print makers from several western states, and was juried by artist and Associate Art Professor Nicole Pietrantoni. (Her work is featured in the show “The Tumbling Oracle,” in the Perkins.)

I do love prints, as so many of us do. A different way of saying what we want to say, and, in most cases, a form of original art that more than one person or museum can own without having to take out the proverbial second mortgage.

The overall collection this year is very good, but not with the eye ball burning power generated

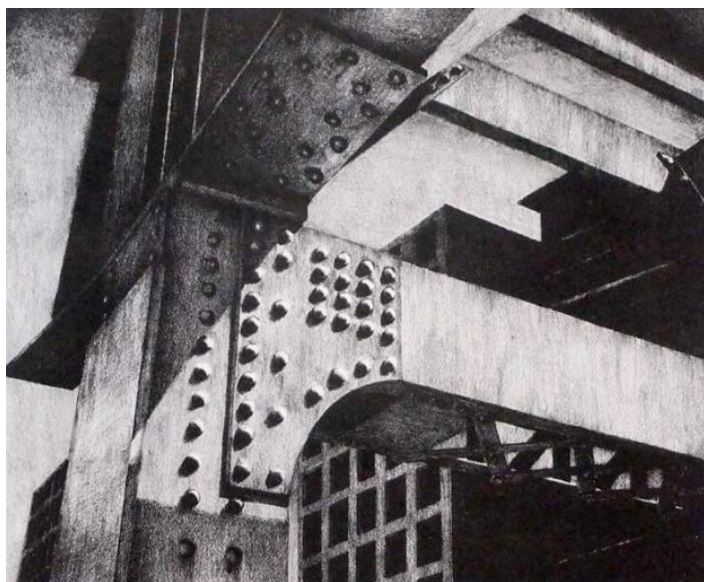

back in the early 2016 Northwest Print Council show. I have to attribute partly to the juror that at least some of the overall examples are more, shall we say, **subtle** in nature. Her own interesting work, centered around black and white, reflects that and is limited in both scope and power.

One of the bonuses in this print show is the presence of the CAM printing press amid a number of explanatory exhibits which acquaint us more intimately with what a print is and how it is generated. One of the really outstanding and powerful works in there (from the CAM Permanent Collection) is a lithograph by Nelson Sandgren entitled "Beach Genre." This is a great introduction to the power of the print.



Moving out to the main Gallery is work by another lithographer (since we are talking about that subset,) Peter Baczek from Oakland, CA. In his two works "Structure," (above) and "Slow Curve," he provides us a small but strong reminder of an earlier art style called Precisionism. Both his lithos are black and white. Other B & W works that caught my eye included Marsha Schweitzer, of L.A., and her painful monotype "The Air We Breathe III," where two whooping cranes are attempting to avoid the

belching smoke of pollution. (Wonder what that has to do with living in L.A? Hmm.) For another work of modern social comment, try Brandon Barón's strong color work "Wanted Shoplifter," a print using a variety of methods.



For other outstanding items in color, there is a wonderfully composed landscape woodblock print by Millie Plank of Etna, CA, featuring a beaver entitled "The Paws That

Refreshes" (see above.) Near the exit to the lobby is a very strong trio of works in strong color by Corvallis satirical artist Yuji Hartsuka (first place winner – see photo at top of article) done in "intaglio/chin coleé." Intaglio is, of course, a cutting down into the metal printing plate where the ink then settles, and "chin coleé" is a process whereby the print can be done on more fragile papers than normally used. There are also ample abstract color works, among them: "Arches" and "Arches II," screenprints by Corte Madera, California artist Amy Torgeson, and a great monoprint by Mande Schroeer of Portland.


Only two BAAA members made the cut: Pat Snyder's "Highway 101," and Phil Noguere's "Night Heron Standing in Rain" described as woodcut/oil. It's always a good thing to see our artists represented.

Upstairs in the Atrium is a sampling of CAM's deep and wide collection of prints. (There is one by the great English artist/sculptor Henry Moore, and another from well known American printmaker Robert Kipniss.) There are many marvels in the room, all adding to the overall theme of quality printmaking.

Finally, digital art takes up the Hansen Gallery and fascinating it is. Among the art is work by our Victoria Tierney, and her "Artrage" output. Don't be threatened by the concept of digital art. It is here to stay, and the art on exhibit says it should be. Very powerful and effective work. Art does not stand still for anyone at any time. But it is a marvel that in our era, art of virtually any stripe can hang in a gallery with any other style. No more strangleholds on creativity.

Artists, whether amateur, professional or beginners are invited to submit both two-dimensional or three dimensional art works. For space consideration, 2D works cannot exceed 11 X 14" (NOT including frames,) and the maximum dimension in any direction for 3D items is 12".

The Gallery is inviting artists of any level who work in any medium to enter. There will be three prizes and several Honorable Mention ribbons and a public People's Choice award. Artworks submitted must have been created within the last 2 years (2017 - 2019) with a framed size limitation of 48 inches by 96 inches and a weight limitation of 50 pounds. 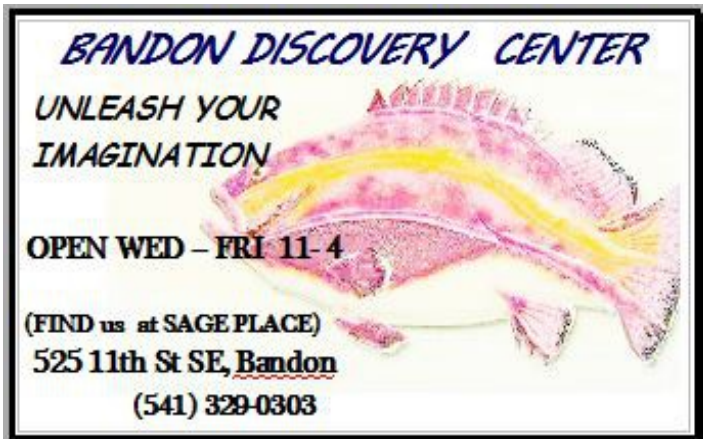
