ARTIST OF THE MONTH -LIZ YOUNGKER



I started my painting career when I was four years old. For me the act of creating something is like breathing - I can't do without it.

I like to mix mediums, and I prefer to paint on non-traditional and reclaimed surfaces. I have painted on old doors, mirrors, carpets, yoga mats, scrap wood, even old toilets. I have used plaster, mud, metal and spray paint in my work.

I am an "an-art-kissed" (it's my play on the word 'anarchist') when it comes to painting.
In my art world I like to push the limits, ignore the rules, and take risks.
I call my work 'abstract reality' because I paint real things in abstract ways - after all the real world can be very abstract at times.

I have no formal training in art but I have fervently pursued educating myself and continue to do so. When I was ten I picked 8 artists to study:

DaVinci, Michaelangelo, Edward Hopper, Dali, Van Gogh, Georgia O'Keeffe, Picasso, and Degas. I read everything about them and studied their work. And the more I explore the creative process the more I learn.

In the future I would like to do more big murals. I see so many wonderful buildings with big blank spaces and I imagine turning Coos Bay into an art mecca.

I am very grateful for BAAA and for the art community we have here.

BAAA ARTISTS SHINE AT ARTIST LOFT "POWER OF SMALL ART SHOW"

Out of 8 awards at the Artist Loft Gallery's latest open show, "The Power of Small Art," fully half of the awards were taken by 3 of our members, including first and second place. (See photoes at end of the article.)

The gallery holds two shows a year which are open to regional artists. Over 50 entries came in from all over our area, and first prize went to Monte Rogers. Lizzy Youngker, BAAA's April Artist of the Month, took second place and both she and Elizabeth Spona received honorable mention. One of Youngker's works sold even before the show opened, and Spona had recently sold the only item to sell in BAAA's Evergreen Court show which closed at the end of February. (When I told her that hers was the only work to

sell she exclaimed "This is the first one I've ever sold!")





The Artist Loft, now almost the only gallery in Coos Bay/ North Bend, continues to encourage local artists with their contests. And BAAA



continue to help all member artists to display their work, to have educational opportunities and to have a place to meet, and get to know other artists.

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the home of Archi, and Jim Davenport (the pitmaster for the barbecue.) It looks to be a fabulous picnic so plan now, not later.


Betty Bangs then introduced Kim Kimerling, an old friend. Kim, at a spry 87, and full of ironic humor, reminded us that our meeting day, March 21, was the New Year's Day in many cultures around the globe. He was born in Colorado during a fierce and subfreezing snowstorm in July. He grew up in Idaho, loved dancing, (learning by carefully seeing all the great dancers on screen including Astaire, and Kelly) singing, poetry, sculpture, and painting. He has primarily been a teacher who, by his own count, has taught various arts to over 8,000 teachers and students in Idaho, Oregon (Eugene) and Nigeria. Nigeria was the answer to a dream he nurtured from the 4th grade on, a dream of going to Africa.. He told us he has settled in Coos Bay, which is the best place he has lived so far, and despite moving so many, many times, he and his son decided that the next move he makes will be when he is put in a box.



The rest of the time he focused on his own art work. He started in watercolor which eventually bored him, moved to oils which he couldn't do because he was allergic, and settled on acrylics, collage and sculpture using found materials. With his favorite artists including Picasso and sculptor Louise Nevelson, the die was cast and his artwork echoes what he admires in those artists. His found materials sculptures are fantastically creative, as is his work on flat surfaces.

At the conclusion he left us with many wise phrases which he used, and still uses, in his teaching. One of them was particularly suitable for all of us in our own artistic pursuits, "Who says you can't?" At the conclusion he thanked us all as a group and community for being so accepting of him. Our group

thanked Kim very much, for his enlightening evening.

APRIL MEETING – FIRST HANDS-ON-PAINTING DEMO OF THE YEAR

Get ready to get yourself messy. Our leader will be member Cindy Pinnock, known for her brilliant and very lively and expressive artwork. Cindy is a

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relatively new member who has already made a mark in our area. She is a member of the Artist Loft Gallery, has submitted work to both the Evergreen Court show (where her work will be hanging later this year in a solo show,) the BMG show, and has been juried in to the coming Expressions West at CAM.

In addition to her painting she is also proficient in three dimensional work. She has created many "Steampunk" items using found metal pieces such as wheels, gears, which she has stained to reflect the antiquity of the machine-age revolution

The program will be hands-on-participation which she calls "Finger Painting for Adults". Cindy asks the attendees to bring their own canvas or board, no smaller than 5 by 7 inches and no larger than 16 by 20 inches, along with their own acrylics. She will supply plastic gloves sizes Extra Small to Medium. If you need Large or Extra Large, you will need to bring your own. "It may be a bit messy, so bring a clean rag and perhaps an apron," Cindy suggests. Kids may love finger painting but, why should they have all the fun?
