

SO MUCH FOR YOUR PURCHASE.



Your playhouse has arrived and now it's time to set it up!

Included: You should have received 5 playhouse pieces and a small container of 8 washers, 8 wing nuts and 8 caps. The playhouse pieces include the roof, front (has a door), back (no windows) and 2 sides.

I try my best to make sure there's no excess packaging or a ton of things to throw away after the playhouse is all ready to go. So the only packaging that needs to be removed prior to assembly is the bubble wrap surrounding the bolts.

After you've removed the bubble wrap and have your playhouse where you'd like it to go, I'd recommend attaching one of the sides to the front (piece with the door + windows) first. The playhouse is angled towards the back. The tallest part of the side piece will go in the front and attach to the front piece. You should see the sides get shorter towards the back of the playhouse.

Should look like this:



Just line up the holes on the side, both top and bottom, with the bolt and slide it on. You want to be careful not to hit the bolt forward because it is secured underneath the playhouse siding. Repeat for the second side.

Next, you'll want to secure the sides to the front. Start by adding a washer over each bolt, then twist on a wing nut. It doesn't need to be tighter than you can get it by hand. Lastly, add the plastic cap over top of the bolt's end. Repeat for all 4 bolts on the front of the playhouse.



Now it's time to put the back of the playhouse on. The back has no windows and has 4 bolts just like the front. All you need to do is match the bolts on the back up with the holes on the sides (2 top and 2 bottom). Once all 4 bolts are lined up correctly, gently push the back of the playhouse until it fits tightly with the sides. After it's in the correct position, with no gap between the walls, add a washer, wing nut and cap just like you did on the front.

Next up is the last step! Place the roof on top of the playhouse. It should fit like the lid on a box and sit over the sides of the playhouse. If the playhouse is somewhere you're concerned about very windy conditions, you can put a screw or a nail through the roof to hold it onto the sides even tighter. But once you pick up the roof, you'll see its heavy enough to hold itself in place under normal circumstances. If you have any questions about the roof or setup, please don't hesitate to reach out.
