- Continuum of sexual behaviours


Practitioner briefings

- Importance of being able to identify when specialist input is required

Assessment

- AIM2
- Structured approach to gathering and analysis of information about a young person, their problematic behaviour, their family and their environment.

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■ Children's school attendance unreliable

- Recent neglected appearance reported by teachers
- Parents both unemployed and arguing
- Parents asking for help with Charlie's behaviour
- Charlie (14) taking parental responsibility for younger children, is bullying siblings, watching pornography with David in the room
- Charlie has been initiating sexual activity with Susan (8), parents have found Charlie in bed with Susan
- David (10), delayed language and intense closeness with mother
- Susan (8), displaying sexualised behaviour with other children at school

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Intervention planning

Key components are:

- Collaborative working
- Safety planning
- What's ok and not ok
- Age appropriate communication about sex
- Hope for the future

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Mum and Dad

- Family safety plan
- What are age appropriate sexual behaviours?
- What should we be worried about?
- Providing strategies to encourage children to follow privacy and sexual behaviour rules.
- Strategies for building positive relationships
- Promoting safety and future protection

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Charlie

- Family safety plan
- Negotiating change 'Old me, new me'
- Talking about sex
- What's ok and what's not ok
- Understanding consent
- Developing positive relationships with family and friends

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Susan

- Staying safe- family and school safety plan
- Building a relationship and engagement
- Understanding effects of abuse on her
- What's ok and not ok touching
- Coping skills
- Describing and monitoring feelings
- Positive relationships
- Building resilience

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David

- Safety planning in the home
- What's ok and not ok touching
- Building a relationship and engagement
- Coping skills
- Describing and monitoring feelings
- Relaxing and calming
- Working with anxiety problems
- Positive relationships
