WHO?

Who is the bully? It can be anybody: a boy, a girl, young or old, rich or poor, bad at school or with good grades.

Who is the victim? It's usually children with an apparently different cultural, social or religious background, or those who have some kind of disability. Even if you are very good at school or a particularly shy person, you run the risk of being persecuted.

WHAT?

What are the typical actions a bully do? They are form of aggressions which can be verbal, physical and psychological, too. They must have certain characteristics: they must be repeated, constant and with a specific target.

WHERE / WHEN?

Where and when does this hurtful behaviour usually take place? It takes place mostly at school, but all places with a lack of adult supervision are a suitable occasion for a bully to "operate". Yet, as we said before, schools and classrooms are bullies' favourite locations, even while the teacher is speaking. Other occasions are represented by school buses and the way to and back from school.

WHY?

Why does the bully behave like that? There can be several reasons such as lack of control, inability to cope with anger, wish of revenge, lack of love. As a sort of compensation the bully needs someone to harass and humiliate in order to feel better and powerful.

HOW?

How do the victims feel? They feel desperate and helpless, depressed and scared, isolated and horrible, victims of a cruel "game".

COLLECTING DATA IN A MAP (p. 119)

Facts / What he did – joined the Nazi party not for political ideas, but to carry out his business; gave SS officers a lot of illegal goods / met the Jewish local community; employed a lot of Jewish people in his factory

Obstacles – made a list of "essential workers" in his factory and saved them from the concentration camp / stopped a train to Auschwitz

Historical impact – saved a lot of Jewish people and was appointed "Righteous Gentile" by Israeli / he had become the symbol of life during the Nazi period
