This guide offers practical application of the vision and framework presented in the book, *Zealous: 7 Commitments for the Discipleship of the Next Generations.* With a biblical vision for the next generations before us, we want to provide some actionable steps to move us closer to that vision becoming a reality.

I opened *Zealous* by emphasizing that "vision without zeal rarely becomes reality." Even though we can't make ourselves authentically zealous, there are things we can do that God can use to awaken zeal in us. A good starting place is to acknowledge our inability and ask God to ignite zeal in us. This can, in turn, awaken zeal in others through "embracing seven essential commitments and acting on them, trusting God not only for the grace to be able to act upon and to fulfill them, but also for the zeal without which your efforts will be unsustainable" (page 15).

In addition to awakening zeal in us and others, these seven commitments help us communicate the biblical responsibility we share as God's people for the discipleship of all nations (Matthew 28:19) for His glory throughout all generations (Ephesians 3:21). I assume that everyone reading this heartily affirms the priority of this responsibility, but the struggle we face in our churches and homes is a lack of intentionality and scope. This is why we at Truth78 emphasize "comprehensive" discipleship, and it is why we create tools for the church and home that can help us be more intentional and comprehensive. This resource provides next steps for application in the church and home. Church leaders can use the "Application for Home" portion of each section for their own homes and as steps to provide to families in their church

It is our hope that this guide will be an encouragement to continue to act on the priorities we affirm and faithfully fulfill the responsibilities we have embraced.

Embrace a Biblical Vision for the Faith of the Next Generation

Think of the children you care most about—the children growing up in your church or in your family. What would you want them to be like in 20 years? Ask yourself questions like the ones on page 27 of *Zealous*.

In what specific ways do the programs and activities in your church help children or hinder them from becoming what you desire most for them? What adjustments can you make to existing programs, or what intentional strategies can you employ that will encourage growth toward your vision?

Having a vision is crucial for discipleship of children and youth. As a vision-oriented church leader, you consider where you are going—clarifying your goals—and then you carefully develop and implement an intentional plan to pursue those goals. By having a long-term vision, one can more effectively develop a discipleship strategy that evaluates every program, activity, curriculum, and resource in terms of the greater vision.

Foster a Robust Partnership Between Church and Home

Consider the following questions:

- Who bears the responsibility for the discipleship of the next generation?
- To what extent are parents responsible and held accountable?
- To what extent is the church responsible and held accountable?
- What is the relationship between the two?

God has called both the church and home to raise up the next generations to know, honor, and treasure God through Jesus Christ. This is accomplished through a strategic, loving partnership between the church and home. This partnership affirms that parents by proximity, opportunity, and God's design, bear a unique responsibility for instructing children in the faith. (See Deuteronomy 6:4-9.) This partnership also affirms the role and responsibility of church leadership to provide encouragement and training for parents, as well as the formal instruction of children and youth.

1. CLARIFY ROLES AND EXPECTATIONS

It is helpful if there are clear, distinct roles for both church and home, and that both work together to pursue one main goal for our children. However, for that partnership to happen, these roles need to be clarified, and the expectations need to be articulated. For example, here are a few basic things that the church could tell parents to expect:

The church will...

 provide a safe, welcoming, structured, age-appropriate environment for the students.

- instruct children with well-prepared, theologically sound, faith-nurturing Bible lessons that are presented in an age-appropriate, interesting, and God-honoring manner.
- design a class structure that is attentive to the needs of the children, while emphasizing and maximizing spiritual instruction.
- provide parents with written communication outlining class procedures and expectations, behavioral guidelines, contact information, curriculum notes, and other relevant information.
- extend to parents an open invitation to sit in and observe the classroom whenever they choose.
- recognize and affirm that parents bear the primary responsibility for nurturing their child's faith. Teachers and other leaders will not seek to usurp that role.
- speak directly to the parents when an issue arises with their child and seek solutions that properly weigh the needs of the larger class and the specific child.

2. PROVIDE PARENTS WITH TRUTH78 CURRICULA PARENT RESOURCE PAGES

One very strategic way our resources foster a partnership between church and home is through the inclusion of parent resource pages for every lesson in our curricula. (For the Sunday school curricula, they are called Growing in Faith Together or GIFT Pages.) After children have received formal weekly instruction in the classroom, these pages provide parents with a tool that will assist them in taking the biblical truths learned and guiding their children to personal application. Parents have the greatest opportunity for "teachable moments," situations that arise in everyday life that can be opportunities to apply the truth of God. Real heart application of biblical truth, which changes lives, usually takes place in the context of relationship and everyday life.

Parent resource pages generally include the following:

- Lesson title, main ideas, selected memory verse or key verse, and a list of Scripture presented in the lesson
- A brief summary of the lesson
- Questions to further spiritual discussion and heart application
- Suggestions for acting on biblical truth

We strongly encourage children's ministry leaders and Sunday school volunteers to make these pages easily available to parents. Furthermore, it is important to educate parents regarding the importance of these pages and seek ways to motivate and assist them if necessary.

3. CONNECT PARENTS TO THE CLASSROOM EXPERIENCE

A very tangible and practical way for the church to partner with parents is to encourage parents to become more acquainted and involved in their child's classroom experience. Here are a few ideas for doing this:

- Encourage parents to volunteer with the children's ministry team.
- Host a Parent Orientation and Open House at the beginning of each Sunday school year where students and their parents hear an overview of the curriculum and class structure, as well as meet the teachers and volunteers.
- Send home a monthly class newsletter highlighting what the students have been learning, special announcements, prayer requests, and one or more memorable moments from the class.
- Encourage parents to sign up to bring and help serve a treat.
- Host a Sunday lunch for the families of your class.
- Give a personal invitation for parents to visit the classroom.
- Invite parents to pray together before the class begins.

4. INTRODUCE PARENTS TO VISION CASTING RESOURCES

Another important way for the church to partner with parents is to share with them the church's vision for family, youth, and children's discipleship. Too often—albeit unintentionally—parents are not informed of the bigger picture regarding children's and youth ministry. Truth78 has a variety of video and print resources that communicate the vision, mission, and values that undergird our ministry, curricula, and other resources. Teach the Breadth and Depth of the Whole Counsel of God

Consider this: By the time your children reach their 20s, will these statements be true of them?

- They are thoroughly acquainted with the Scriptures.
- They have the necessary tools to properly study the Bible.
- They have a deep understanding of the essential doctrines of the Christian faith.
- They can articulate the essence, means, and goal of the gospel.
- They know what it means to be a faithful follower of Jesus.

This generation is to teach the next generation the whole counsel of God—a core knowledge of the breadth and depth of Scripture that is essential for coming to salvation in Christ and living a life of faith. Teaching the whole counsel includes five elements that address specific and essential questions:

- Bible Survey and Book Studies (What's in the Bible? Who is the Bible about?)
- Biblical Theology (What's the main message of the Bible?)
- Systematic Theology (What are the essential doctrines of the Christian faith?)
- Gospel Proclamation (What do we need to be saved? How are we saved?)
- Moral and Ethical Instruction (How are we to live?)
- Listen to a podcast about this commitment.

- Watch "A Vision for Teaching the Word of God," and then discuss the implications for ministry at home or in the church.
- Carefully evaluate the materials your church uses for the instruction and discipleship of your children (e.g., Sunday school/midweek teaching materials, books in the classroom or library, VBS, clubs, retreat or camp materials, etc.). Taken together, how comprehensive is the instruction your children are receiving?

- Decide which of the essential elements are included and where they fit within your church program. Make a chart that shows where each element is taught and at what grade level. Where are the gaps? Is there a plan for filling those gaps?
- Determine the theological themes or essential doctrines your children should be taught. Where are these being taught now? What's missing? Develop a plan for how and when each theme/doctrine will be emphasized and taught (e.g., Sunday school, midweek, retreats, weekend seminar for teens, etc.).
- Are the children and adults encouraged and equipped for regular and active Bible memorization? Consider an all-church Bible memorization plan. (See FighterVerses.com and Foundation Verses.)

Proclaim the Glorious Gospel of Jesus Christ

Someday our children will be standing in the throne room of heaven before King Jesus who will either welcome them into His everlasting joy or cast them forever into the outer darkness (Matthew 25:30). On that day and in that moment, the only thing that will matter is if they have embraced Christ as their hope and treasure. Surely, there is no greater privilege or responsibility placed upon parents and teachers than to diligently and faithfully point our children to this gospel hope and treasure.

Consider:

- What biblical truths are essential in order to understand the gospel?
- How and when should these be presented?
- How can we guide and implore children to respond in genuine belief?

The gospel is simple yet amazingly profound, freely offered yet extremely costly, and should be communicated as such. While the gospel can be simply conveyed to children, our approach should not be simplistic. In the early stages of life, we can begin laying a solid, deep, gospel foundation. Clearly and patiently, we can introduce and lead our children to understanding the key essential truths of the gospel found throughout the Bible. Through repeating and explaining these with increasing depth, we hope to help children see the splendor, majesty, and holiness of God, the enormity of their sin problem, and the immeasurable love and grace of God in Christ, resulting in true repentance and genuine belief.

- With your ministry team, watch "A Vision for God-Centered, Gospel-Focused Teaching for the Next Generations," and then discuss implications for your ministry.
- Using *Established in the Faith: A Discipleship Guide for Discerning and Affirming a Young Person's Faith* as a guide, take one to two hours to help parents discern the faith of a child and, when the time comes, how to prepare a child for baptism.

- Lead families through the 10 Essential Truths from *Helping Children* to *Understand the Gospel*, or encourage them to walk through the 10 Essential Truths of the Gospel in The Greatest Treasure.
- Teach *Jesus, What a Savior!* to your kindergarten/first-grade class and *To Be Like Jesus* to your upper-elementary class.
- Encourage children to be present when you are baptizing new believers. Articulate the gospel at this time or encourage those being baptized to give a robust profession of faith and an explanation of the gospel.
- Preach a series carefully and comprehensively explaining the gospel.

Disciple the Mind, Heart, and Will

We can teach our children and students a lot of biblical information—and so we should. We should acquaint them with as much Scripture as possible; it is the only means of making them wise for salvation in Christ and living in a way that is pleasing to Him (2 Timothy 3:16-17). We want their minds to know, understand, and be able to rightly interpret the Bible. However, as Jesus' words remind us, it is not enough to simply receive knowledge about God.

"This people honors me with their lips, but their heart is far from me; in vain do they worship me..." (Matthew 15:8-9) "And everyone who hears these words of mine and does not do them will be like a foolish man who built his house on the sand. And the rain fell, and the floods came, and the winds blew and beat against that house, and it fell, and great was the fall of it." (Matthew 7:26-27)

For children to personally know, embrace, and apply biblical truth, we need to disciple the mind, the heart, and the will. To that end, we must diligently instruct the mind, providing them with the proper tools and skills needed to rightly read, study, interpret, and apply Scripture.

While fully acknowledging that only God can bring Spirit-wrought, grace-dependent faith in Jesus, and lead us to walk as His faithful disciples, it is our responsibility to engage the heart. Our aim is to guide, inspire, challenge, and exhort children toward a personal and sincere response to God's truth.

True saving faith will be evidenced by a growing desire to walk in obedience to God. While God is at work in us through His Spirit both to will and to work His good pleasure, we as His children work out our salvation (Philippians 2:12-13). Choosing daily to trust Christ, submit to Him, and follow in obedience, we guide, challenge, and encourage students to specific Christ-like thoughts, words, and actions.

Pray with Dependence on God's Sovereign Grace

We can faithfully and zealously embrace a biblical vision for the faith of the next generation, foster a robust partnership between church and home, teach the whole counsel of God, proclaim the glorious gospel of Jesus, and disciple the mind, heart, and will and yet fail to see the spiritual transformation we long for in our children. What's missing? What more must we do?

Pray with dependence on God's sovereign grace.

This generation of parents, pastors, and teachers cannot escape the responsibility they have for nurturing the faith of the next generation, and there is no way to escape the reality that the children of the next generation will only be saved by the grace of God through faith in Jesus Christ. Saving faith for any child "is the gift of God, not a result of works, so that no one [no parent, no pastor, no grandparent, no Sunday school teacher] may boast" (Ephesians 2:8-9). God's unstoppable purposes for our children and our inescapable responsibility to raise them in the faith come together in prayer.

- Inspire and mobilize parents, grandparents, church workers, and the congregation as a whole to read and apply *Big, Bold, Biblical Prayers* for the Next Generation.
- Listen to the Truth78 seminar, "Prayer: Utter Dependence on God in Children's Ministry."
- Encourage children's workers to pray regularly for the children in their classrooms.
- Encourage nursery workers to pray for each baby each week.
- Post prayer topics or verses on the walls of your nursery or classrooms and encourage workers to pray weekly for the children.
- Encourage every ministry team working with children and youth to pray together before each class, event, or activity.

- As you read your Bible each day, use the passages you just read as a springboard for praying for your children.

- Keep a prayer journal for each of your children.

Inspire Worship of God, for the Glory of God

What is the ultimate reason for discipling the next generations? To what end should parents, ministry leaders, teachers, and volunteers devote whole-hearted effort?

Our great hope and destiny as Christians is to behold the glory of Christ (1 John 3:2) which Christ has as the image of God (2 Corinthians 4:4) and to share in that very glory by reflecting it back to God in love and praise.

Thus God's supreme goal in history, in all that he does from beginning to end, is to display his glory and bring honor and praise to his great name.

If our zeal is conformed to God's zeal, and if our efforts are aligned with God's purpose, then the aim of our discipleship will be the glory of God so that His greatness and His worth will be known throughout the earth and throughout the generations. When we rightly emphasize God's glory when declaring His glorious deeds, the natural response of the heart is worship. The proclamation of God's glorious deeds in a God-glorifying way inspires children to worship God to His glory and their joy in Him.

- Learn hymns as a family. Talk about the concepts and theology taught in the hymn. Consider choosing a hymn to learn each month.
- Use Getty Family Hymn Sing as a resource.
- Explore nature with your children and marvel at the creativity, wisdom, and power of God. Keep a nature notebook, noting how creation reveals the glory of God.

May they never be shaken.

And may their names be remembered by the Lord, forever.
