ADAPTING TRUTH78 CURRICULUM TO YOUR SPECIFIC NEEDS

Generally speaking the Truth78 curricula has been developed for age-specific students in a church classroom setting. However, the structure and format of the curricula allows for much flexibility. Below are some general recommendations for adapting curricula for the following settings:

- 1. Multi-age classroom
- 2. Christian school
- 3. Homeschool

1. USING TRUTH78 CURRICULUM IN A MULTI-AGE CLASSROOM

Although we believe there are distinct advantages to teaching a particular curriculum to a specified age group, we understand this is not always possible. For example, some churches have classes that include children with a six-year age range. If this is the case, here is the first thing to consider before choosing a curriculum:

 Carefully examine the Truth78 Scope and Sequence and curricula descriptions. Each curriculum specifies a targeted age and an age range. We have considered many factors to determine these age ranges. As much as possible, choose a curriculum that best reflects the age range represented in your class.

After choosing a curriculum, you will need to prepare and teach the lessons based on the ages of your students. Here are common things to consider:

- **Vocabulary:** It is not always possible to state Children/Youth things in a way that is both Ministry Leaders, Teachers, understandable to a young Christian School Teachers, child, and challenging and Homeschool engaging to an older child. Parents You will need to strive for TARGET AGE: Preschool balance, at times using to Youth language that caters more to older students, and at other times caters more to younger students.
- Involvement: Engage differing ages by assigning tasks and levels of involvement appropriate to their age. Older students can read texts, participate in more complex illustrations, etc. Younger students can display visuals, help with an illustration, etc.
- Attention Span: When using a curriculum geared toward older students, you may need to use more visual or tactile elements to bridge the gap between the attention spans of older and younger students. When using a curriculum geared toward younger students, you may need to challenge the older students by adding Scripture passages and questions that are more complex.

2. USING TRUTH78 CURRICULUM IN A CHRISTIAN SCHOOL

Using the curricula in a Christian school setting offers some distinct advantages. You can study the material in more depth, since you can present each lesson over a longer time span and/or with more frequency—up to five days a week. This allows children and youth more time to listen, absorb, and interact with what they have been taught.

Scheduling Recommendations for Christian Schools

TWO-DAY OPTION

- **Day 1:** Present lesson and assign memory verse.
- **Day 2:** Review lesson, discuss application questions, and complete student workbook/journal.

THREE-DAY OPTION

- Day 1: Present lesson and assign memory verse.
- **Day 2:** Review lesson, discuss application questions, and complete student workbook/journal.
- Day 3: Choose additional activity from the lesson,
 Growing in Faith Together/Parent Resource
 Page, or the Appendix section of the
 Teacher's Guide.

FIVE-DAY OPTION

- **Day 1:** Present lesson and assign memory verse.
- **Day 2:** Review lesson and discuss application questions.
- Day 3: Complete student workbook/journal.
- Day 4: Choose an additional activity from the lesson, Growing in Faith Together/Parent Resource Page, or the Appendix section of the Teacher's Guide.
- **Day 5:** Create a simple test or quiz, or do a service or mission project.

3. USING TRUTH78 CURRICULUM IN A HOMESCHOOL

There are many advantages to using the curricula in a home setting. First, each lesson can be studied over a longer period of time, allowing children more time to listen, absorb, and interact with what they've been taught. Secondly, the whole family can participate in learning and discussing the concepts. Finally, it can serve as a valuable tool for parents to assume their most sacred responsibility: to instruct and disciple their children in the Christian faith. Parents are in a unique position to not only instruct the minds of their children, but also to engage their hearts—imploring and encouraging their children to rightly respond to the truth in their thoughts, feelings, words, and actions.

TWO-DAY OPTION

- Day 1: Present lesson and assign memory verse.
- **Day 2:** Review lesson, discuss application questions, and complete student workbook/journal.

THREE-DAY OPTION

- Day 1: Present lesson and assign memory verse.
- **Day 2:** Review lesson, discuss application questions, and complete student workbook/journal.
- Day 3: Choose additional activity from the lesson, Growing in Faith Together/Parent Resource Page, or the Appendix section of the Teacher's Guide.

FIVE-DAY OPTION

- Day 1: Present lesson and assign memory verse.
- **Day 2:** Review lesson and discuss application questions.
- Day 3: Complete student workbook/journal.
- Day 4: Choose an additional activity from the lesson, Growing in Faith Together/Parent Resource Page, or the Appendix section of the Teacher's Guide.
- **Day 5:** Create a simple test or quiz, or do a service or mission project.

Tips for Using the Curricula in the Home

- Parents are best suited to make the most meaningful application of these biblical truths when they "walk by the way" as a family (Deuteronomy 6:7).
- Review the lesson to see where you can use real-situations for the illustrations given.
- Use suggested objects or talk through an illustration—making the same points without using the objects.
- If desired, omit an illustration. Some illustrations are especially suited for the classroom to keep the attention of a group of children. You can omit these at home.
- Make space adjustments. For example, in the Faithful to All His Promises curriculum, the promises are printed on a large card to post in a classroom. If you do not have space for this, you can put the cards in a three-ring notebook.
- Make number adjustments. For example, in The ABCs of God, the curriculum asks for nine children to each take a card to spell the word "Incomprehensible." Simply divide the cards among the number of children you have.
- Assign older children to present one of the illustrations. They will have fun executing this, and it will take a task off your teaching plate.

Different Ways to Involve Dads

- Dad can be the Bible teacher for your homeschool or share the responsibility with Mom.
- Dad could teach a portion of the lesson before leaving for work, or follow up with review at supper time.
- Dad could be responsible for any portion of the curriculum (lesson, application, workbook/notebook, or Growing in Faith Together/Parent Resource Page).
- Dad could be responsible for the memory verse teaching and review.
- Dad can make practical application of the lesson in real life.
