
Husband



Parallel Pattern Between Church and Home

1. Headship

"Wives, submit to your own husbands, as to the Lord. For the husband is head of the wife even as Christ is the head of the church, his body, and is himself its Savior." Eph. 5:22-23

"....wives should submit in everything to their husbands." Eph. 5:24



Headship

"One body"

"Therefore a man shall leave his father and mother and hold fast to his wife, and the two shall become one flesh." This mystery is profound and I am saying that it refers to Christ and the church. 5:31-32

"This mystery is that the Gentiles are fellow heirs, members of the same body, and partakers of the promise in Christ Jesus through the gospel." 3:6



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"...that he might create in himself one new man in place of the two, so making peace, and might reconcile us both to God in one body through the cross." 2:5-16



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"There is one body and one Spirit-- just as you were called to the one hope that belongs to your call-one Lord, one faith, one baptism, one God and Father of all and through all and in all." 4:4-6

Biblical Parallels Between Church and Home

HOUSEHOLD

- 1. United as one "flesh"
- 2. Under headship of the husband
- 3. Obedience, submission to husband/parents
- 4. Responsibility of husband/father to instruct, care for, nourish, "shepherd"

CHURCH

- 1. United in one "body"
- 2. Under headship of Christ
- 3. Obedience, submission to elders/leaders
- 4. Responsibility of leaders to instruct, care for, nourish, "shepherd"



Implications

- 1. The foundation for the home is the Gospel
- The church may be overlooking an untapped asset for shepherding and discipleship.
- 3. The husband <u>IS</u> the head of his wife and his household



The Husband's Great Indicative: Inescapable Headship

"The husband is the head of his wife and that is a universal fact.

This is not an ideal or something to aspire to but a statement of fact

When Paul said, "the husband is the head of the wife" he did not mean that he ought to be the head, but that he already is.

He may be a contemptible, unworthy head, but he still remains the head.

He cannot escape this office, no more than he can escape the fact that he is a male.

He may neglect his headship; he may ignore his headship, he may abuse his headship

yet he is still the head."

Daniel Patz: The Husband's Great Indicative: Inescapable Headship



"As the head, the man's actions always dominate (dominion of the head) the marriage relationship. He may live a life of sacrificial love, cherishing and nurturing his wife, yet his action of love dominates the relationship --usually setting a beautiful and harmonious course.

He may escape the relationship, yet it is his action of escape, which dominates the relationship.

He may neglect his role of loving leadership and allow his wife to usurp his role, yet it is his action of neglect and spinelessness that is really controlling the relationship."

Daniel Patz: The Husband's Great Indicative: Inescapable Headship



"Given that the husband is the head of the wife, he is always responsible for what happens in the marriage relationship. The husband is the "buck-stopper" and the "rudder-setter." If there are problems in the marriage he is always responsible. Yes, always responsible! The husband may not always be guilty, but the weight of responsibility still lies upon his 'headship'.

As Douglas Wilson states — 'without this understanding of responsibility, authority becomes meaningless and tyrannical." When the husband takes the covenant-oath to be the husband, he assumes responsibility. This means that "men whether through tyranny or abdication, are responsible for any problems in the home" (Wilson, Reforming Marriage, 33).

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Vision and Agenda Parallel

- 1:15-19—I do not cease to give thanks for you, remembering you in my prayers--that you may know what is the hope to which he has called you
- 3:16-19 for this reason--strengthened with power through the spirit in your inner beings
- 4:11-14 He gave apostles, prophets...to **equip the saints** for the work—building up, unity of faith, mature manhood...
- 4:15-16 speaking the truth in love...growing up into Christ, building itself up in love.
- 4:20-24 To learn Christ, to be taught in Christ to put off the old self, be renewed, put on the new self.



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- 5. Effective leadership at home is a prerequisite for effective leadership in the church and heads of households should aspire to the standards set for leaders in the church



Prerequisite for Leadership

1 Timothy 3:1-7

The saying is trustworthy: If anyone aspires to the office of overseer, he desires a noble task. Therefore an overseer must be above reproach, the husband of one wife, sober-minded, selfcontrolled, respectable, hospitable, able to teach, not a drunkard, not violent but gentle, not quarrelsome, not a lover of money. He must manage his own household well, with all dignity keeping his children submissive, for if someone does not know how to manage his own household, how will he care for God's church? He must not be a recent convert, or he may become puffed up with conceit and fall into the condemnation of the devil. Moreover, he must be well thought of by outsiders, so that he may not fall into disgrace, into a snare of the devil.



Prerequisite for Leadership

• Titus 1:6-9 "...if anyone is above reproach, the husband of one wife, and his children are believers and not open to the charge of debauchery or insubordination. For an overseer, as God's steward, must be above reproach. He must not be arrogant or quicktempered or a drunkard or violent or greedy for gain, but hospitable, a lover of good, self-controlled, upright, holy, and disciplined. He must hold firm to the trustworthy word as taught, so that he may be able to give instruction in sound doctrine and also to rebuke those who contradict it."



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- 6. The home is the basic unit of discipleship in the church



Home: Basic Unit of Discipleship

- Small groups are important structures for adult shepherding and discipleship that cannot be replaced by a family structure.
- Unlike small group leaders, husbands and fathers have a calling on their lives to shepherd and disciple their family whether they want it or not (Psalm 78:5-8; Ephesians 5:22-24, 6:1-3). God has assigned it.
- The union of husband and wife and the formation of a family were intended by God to be the context for passing His commands (Deuteronomy 6:6-9), his word, (Deuteronomy 11:18-21), his testimony (Psalm 78:5-8) from one generation to the next.
- Therefore it is fitting that a structure for shepherding and discipleship in the church reflects the importance of the household in the sense that we have just seen.

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7. Husbands/fathers are shepherds



Husbands and Fathers are Shepherds

- Loving his wife and children sacrificially and cherishing her as a reflection of the love of Christ for the church (Ephesians 5:25, 29; 6:4).
- Being alert to and discerning of the spiritual, emotional, relational, and physical needs, of his family and make the effort to meet those needs—directly or indirectly (Hebrews 3:12–13; 1 Peter 3:7).
- Praying regularly and earnestly for his family (Genesis 25:21; 1 Timothy 2:8; 1 Peter 3:7).
- Seeking to build his wife and children up with biblical knowledge, including both his own speech and his encouragement to connect them with the teaching ministries provided by the church (John 8:32; Ephesians 4:25-30).



Husbands and Fathers are Shepherds


• Encouraging and helping his family engage in ministry at church and in the world

(Proverbs 31:20; Ephesians 4:11-12, 1 Timothy 5:9-10).


- Bringing Christ near in practical and verbal ways (1 Corinthians 11:1; 2 Corinthians 4:5-6).
