Be in the Word daily

• Find a time and place to meet with God

"I think there will be no successful spiritual leadership without extended seasons of prayer and meditation on the Scriptures. Spiritual leaders ought to rise early in order to meet God before they meet anybody else."

If you want to be a great leader of people you have to get away from people to be with God.

- Have a plan—any plan; a plan keeps us on track; helps us to be diligent; keeps us from wandering aimlessly and holds us accountable
- Bible memory—(See Dr. Andrew Davis: <u>An Approach to the Extended Memorization of Scripture</u>)
- Meditate on the Word—don't just feed the words through your mind, but ponder the text, ask questions, wrestle with understanding

Joshua 1:8—This Book of the Law shall not depart from your mouth, but you shall meditate on it day and night, so that you may be careful to do according to all that is written in it. For then you will make your way prosperous, and then you will have good success.

Psalm 119:97—Oh how I love your law! It is my meditation all the day.

Psalm 119:99—I have more understanding than all my teachers, for your testimonies are my meditation.

"There are eyes in pencils and pens..." (Having to write something down about what you are reading, forces you to slow down and to think.)

Pray the Word of God

Fill your mind and heart with that which would nurture your soul

- Read books about the Bible and the Christian life—books of depth
- Seek Christian fellowship
- Listen to the preached Word
- Attend a Bible study

Guard your heart

Stop in situations and look at your heart and address the attitudes and feelings...and sin within.

Make confession a part of your daily routine

Keep short accounts with the Lord. Everyday our hearts lead us astray; we have attitudes which must be checked; desires that need to be reined in; actions that do not honor God.

Example: Team member who kind of rubs you the wrong way—stop yourself realizing that you have a choice to either nurture those feelings or to ask God to watch over your heart, give you a love and appreciation for that person, and help you to find ways of encouraging that person.

Find yourself getting frustrated, stop, examine your heart—what is the root of your frustration? Confess any exposed sin; pray for God's help

Wean yourself from the world

What you expose yourself to will either nurture your soul or damage your soul

Finally, brothers, whatever is true, whatever is honorable, whatever is just, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is commendable, if there is any excellence, if there is anything worthy of praise, think about these things.

We need to make the best choices of how to spend our time—what influences we will allow in our lives and which appetites we will feed.

Scripture Memory

These suggestions are based on a Bible memory method developed by Dr. Andrew Davis in his booklet *An Approach to the Extended Memorization of Scripture*.

Sunday: Read this week's memory passage with surrounding verses so you can see it in context. Ask the Lord to help you commit this passage to memory, apply it to your life, and use it to bless others.

Monday: Read this week's passage (with the reference) aloud ten times. Cover the passage and try to say it aloud (with its reference) ten more times, peeking if necessary. Say each memorized passages from previous weeks one time (aloud with references).

Tuesday: Cover this week's passage and try to say the verse aloud (with its reference) ten more times, peeking if necessary. Say each memorized passage from previous weeks one time (aloud with references).

Wednesday-Saturday: Say this week's passage and each memorized passage from previous weeks one time (aloud with references).

Other Suggestions:

- Repeat memorized passages once daily for at least 50 days; after that once every week or two.
- Pray daily asking the Lord to help his word remain in you, using it to feed your soul and minister to others.
- Take advantage of passing "idle" moments during the day to call this week's passage to mind.

Telling Christ-Centered Stories⁶

- Tell your story in a way that breaks down the misconception that you are essentially different from the person you are helping.
- Always tell a completed story. Your story needs to include (1) a difficult situation, (2) your struggle in the midst of it, and (3) how God helped you.
- As you tell your story, be honest in describing your struggles and failures. Your story must highlight God's grace in your weakness, not your heroic faith.
- Be discerning and purposeful as you tell your story. Limit the amount of "gory" detail. Your focus is not the situation, but the God who met you in the middle of it.
- Always tell your story in way that makes God the key actor in the drama.
- Tell your story with humility, admitting your continuing need for grace. Sometimes we have a way of telling our story that has a "good student learning the ultimate lesson" character to it. It communicates spiritual "arrival" rather than continuing need. We must tell our story out of a fresh recognition of our helplessness apart from the resources we find only in Christ. It may even be appropriate to ask for prayer from the person you are serving.
- Always make it clear that you are not what this person needs God is.
- The goal if your story should always be worship. Giving hope is about helping a person see the Lord. Giving hope is more than convincing people that things will get better, or helping them decide what to do. Giving hope introduces them to a Person. It helps people who are dealing with the unthinkable to view life from the perspective of God's glory and grace and their identity as his children.

God's grace is always grace leading to change.

As we offer people a humble, patient, gentle, forbearing, and forgiving love, we must never communicate that it is okay for them to stay as they are. As long as a vestige of indwelling sin remains, change is God's call.

And I, brethren, when I came to you, did not come with excellence of speech or of wisdom declaring to you the testimony of God.
