JOHN ALLEN

Auckland-based sculptor John Allen has been working with wood for more than 50 years. It is his passion. He collected driftwood, built furniture and dabbled with sculpture for many years, yet made a working path through the corporate world. John studied at the University of California, Berkeley in the early 1980's, and although not in his field at the time, was introduced to leading architects and a way of seeing the world which seeded his opening into his sculpture practice in the last decade.

John is inspired by American architect Christopher Alexander's approach to creating wholeness and life in architecture and art. The approach requires awareness of and attention to the feelings of wholeness and life inside us. John's sculpture practice is all about inner focus and eliciting these deep feelings.

NEW BEGINNINGS

Through his sculpture work John has been starting to see the world differently. Part of the difficulty of learning to focus on the wholeness and life around us is heightened awareness of the state of the world. It's easy to get stuck in negativity and battling things not working, but John is not buying into the doom and gloom any more.

The way forward is connecting inside, feeling and living the wholeness already present in the core of our beings – being the change we want to see, and reminding us of our part in the world. John's current work taps into old forms as a link to our deeper being and includes pieces crafted from woods such as Puriri, Pohutakawa and Kauri, using fallen trees, driftwood and reclaimed wood.
