


It's time to meet our last Little Lion friend on this journey.




Parent/Sibling reads aloud:






John Adams was a huge fan of reading and learning. Count the books and trace the correct number.


Parent/ Sibling reads aloud:


John and Abigail Adams wrote over 1,000 letters to each other! These letters show how much they loved and respected one another. Count all the hearts on this page.


Introduction:



Parent/ Sibling reads aloud:

Activity Time!





Instructions:

- I. Explain to your kiddo that John Adams helped build the foundation of America, just like how they're going to build a "freedom fort" to symbolize the country Adams helped create.
- 2. Have your little one use pillows, blankets, and chairs to build their own cozy fort, imagining it as a free place for them and their friends–just like John Adams helped create a free country for Americans.
- 3. Once the fort is built, they can use the flashlight to read or tell stories inside their fort about why freedom is important, just like John Adams shared his ideas for a free America. Your little one can read their own declaration they made from the previous lesson.
