# About Migration

**Migration** is movement from one place to another. People, just like animals, migrate for different reasons, and it's a natural part of life!

In *I'll Be the Moon*, a child and her mother are migrating from Mexico to the United States. Many families and individuals from Mexico choose to move to the United States in search of better opportunities and a brighter future. Some people leave their homes because they want to find better jobs, get an education, or be closer to their loved ones already living in the U.S. Others leave their homes for safety reasons.

**Migration happens all around the world**, not just from Mexico to the U.S. border. For example, some animals, like birds, migrate too! They fly long distances to find warmer climates or places with more food. Just like us, they have reasons to move and find a better place to live.

**In some parts of the world, people have been migrating for thousands of years.** Sometimes, it's because of changes in the environment, like droughts or floods, that make it hard to live in their original homes. Other times, it's because they want to trade goods with different communities and learn from each other's cultures.



# Meaning of the Moon

The moon is an amazing part of our night sky. In *I'll Be the Moon*, a child watches the moon on her journey north and reflects on all it represents. The moon gives her hope and keeps her going.

Did you know the moon holds a special place in the hearts of people from different cultures around the world? Let's explore the meaning of the moon in some of these cultures!



**In many ancient cultures**, the moon was seen as a symbol of change and cycles. Just like how it goes through phases, growing from a tiny sliver to a bright full circle and then back again, people thought of it as a sign of life's changes. They believed the moon guided the seasons and helped farmers know when to plant and harvest crops.

**For some Native American tribes**, the moon was a timekeeper and a way to mark important events. Each full moon had a name, like the "Harvest Moon" or the "Wolf Moon." These names helped them keep track of time and celebrate special occasions like harvest festivals or gatherings.

**In Chinese culture**, the moon is an important part of the Mid-Autumn Festival, a joyful holiday where families come together to give thanks and enjoy mooncakes, delicious sweet treats shaped like the moon. They believe the full moon brings good luck and happiness.

**In Hindu mythology**, the moon has a special role too. It's connected to stories of gods and goddesses, and people believe that gazing at the moon can bring calmness to their minds and hearts.


