

Sight Word Puzzles – Sing & Spell Vol. 1



These puzzles are designed to give kids another way to practice reading their sight words. Once they are printed out and laminated, they will make a nice literacy center for your students! Included in this set is one sight word puzzle for each of the words on *Sing and Spell the Sights Words, Vol. 1*.

The puzzles come in two formats: one prints the letters of the words in solid black, and the other prints them in an outline, so that you could color in the letters if you choose. In fact, if making multiple copies is not an issue for you, you may wish to let your students color in their own set and take them home for further practice!

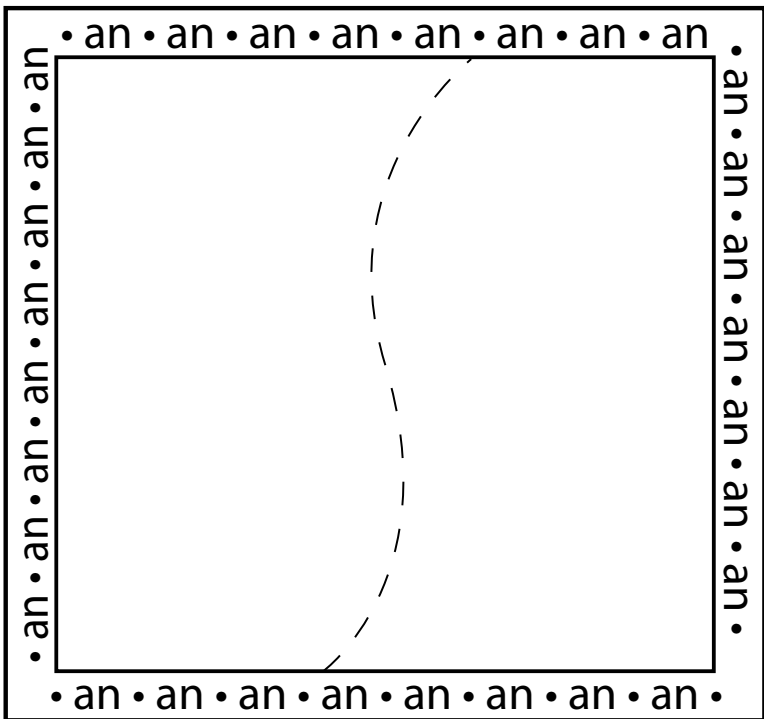
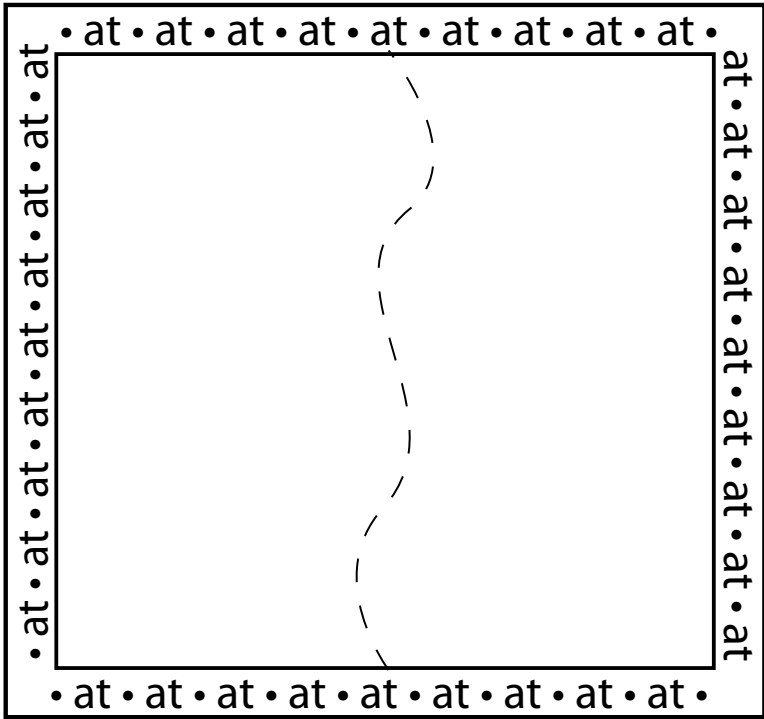
For those that would like to make these into file folder puzzles, we have also included another smaller sized format of the puzzles that will fit horizontally on a standard letter-sized file folder as is shown in the picture. My kindergarten students were more successful with the puzzles divided into sets of four words per folder. They attach the puzzle pieces with velcro onto the blank puzzle board backings, and then were able to pick up their finished puzzles and carry them across the room to show me without all of the pieces falling off. This was very important to them, and much more satisfying than putting together a puzzle that doesn't "snap together and stay put" the way real commercially produced puzzles do.

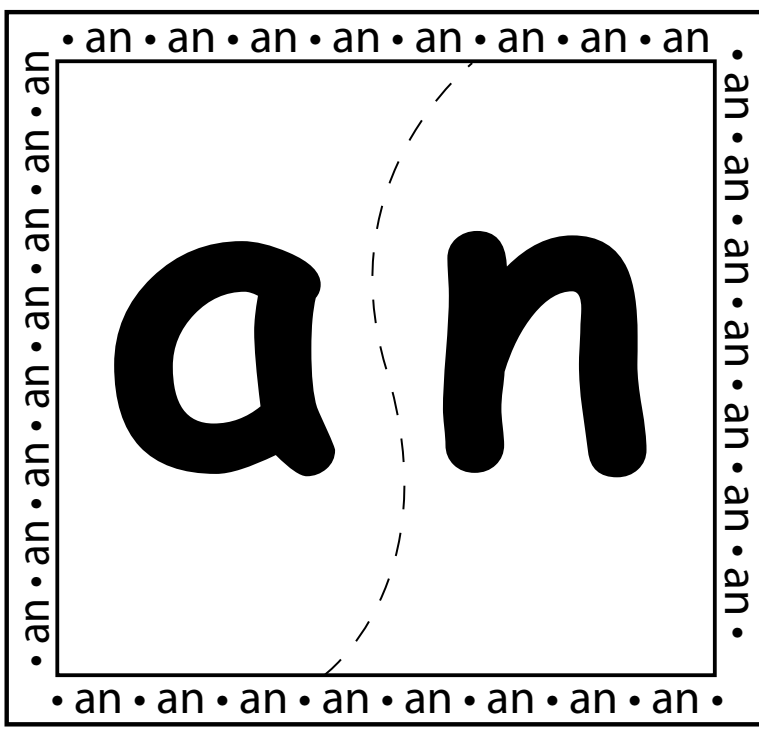
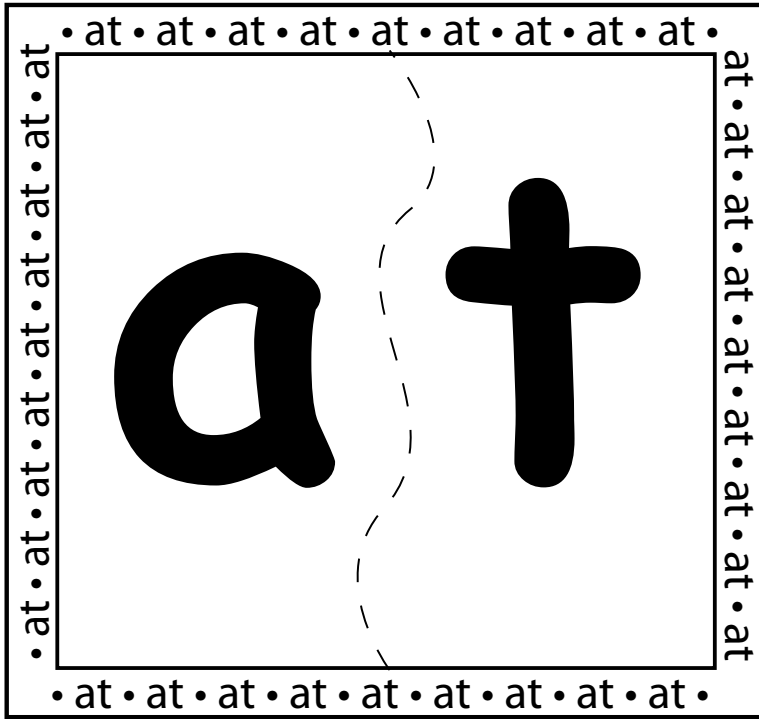


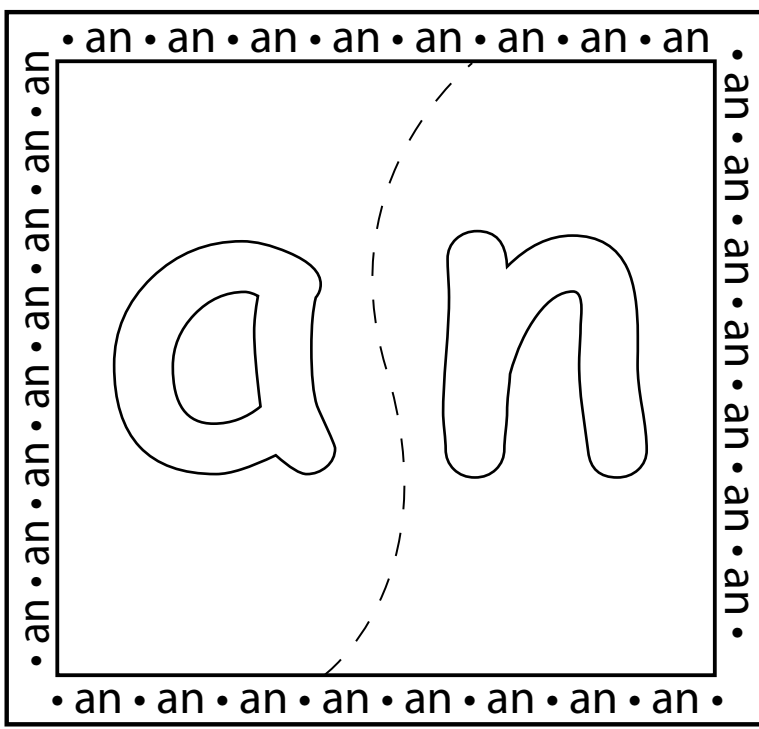
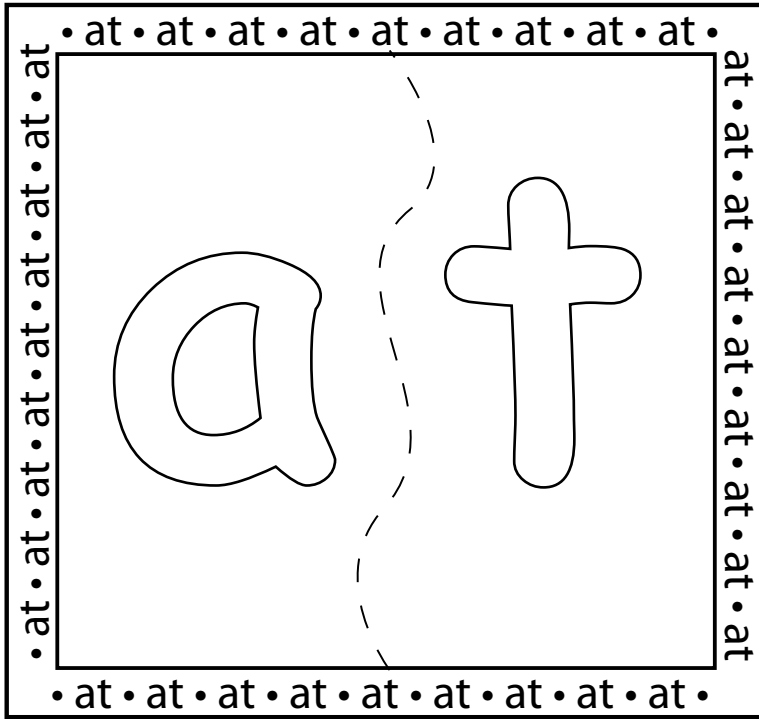
To prepare the puzzles, simply print out the images directly from the .pdf files and paste them onto colored paper, or xerox them directly onto colored sheets of cardstock or construction paper. I like to copy about four word puzzles on blue, four on yellow, four on green, four on pink, and four on white, etc. That way, the children can use the color cues to help them figure out which pieces together, without letting the colored paper give the entire puzzle away. So, they would use the colors to narrow down their choices, but not tell them exactly which piece to use. Also, if you are gluing them onto file folders, you can put the yellow words on a yellow folder, etc., so that if a piece falls out, you know which folder to put it back into. Of course, if you choose to use the puzzles with the outlined letters, then you will need to color them also. After copying, laminate them and then cut the puzzles apart. I store my puzzles in a small plastic shoe box, and label them by the title of the CD that they go with. However, if space is an issue, a manilla file folder will work just as well.

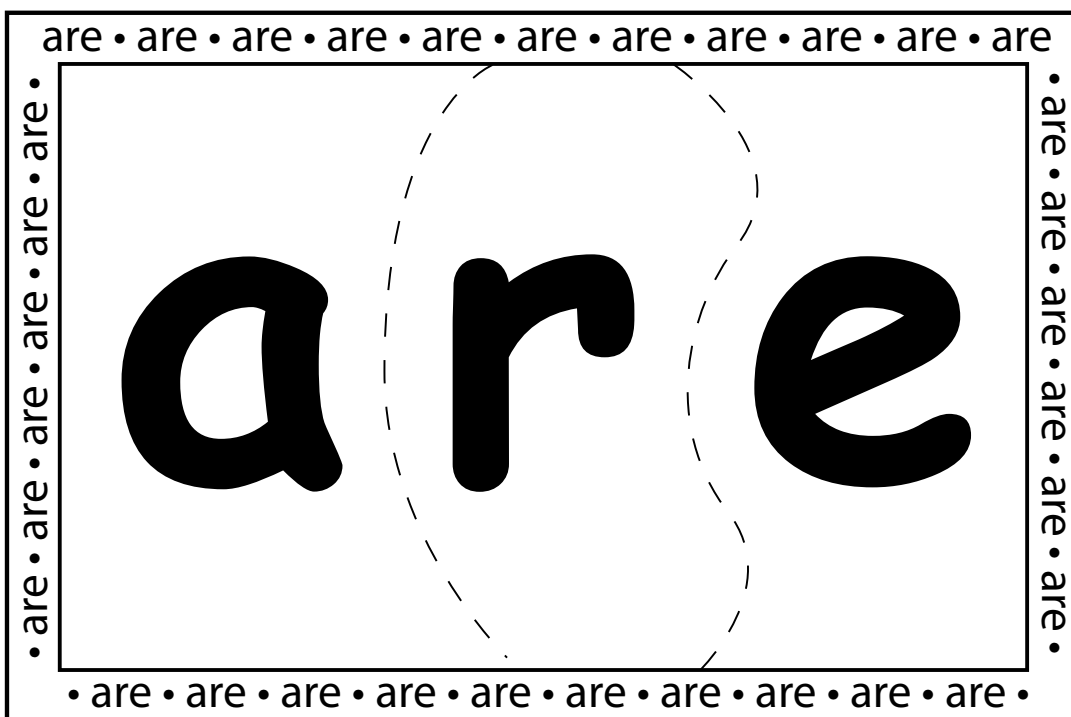
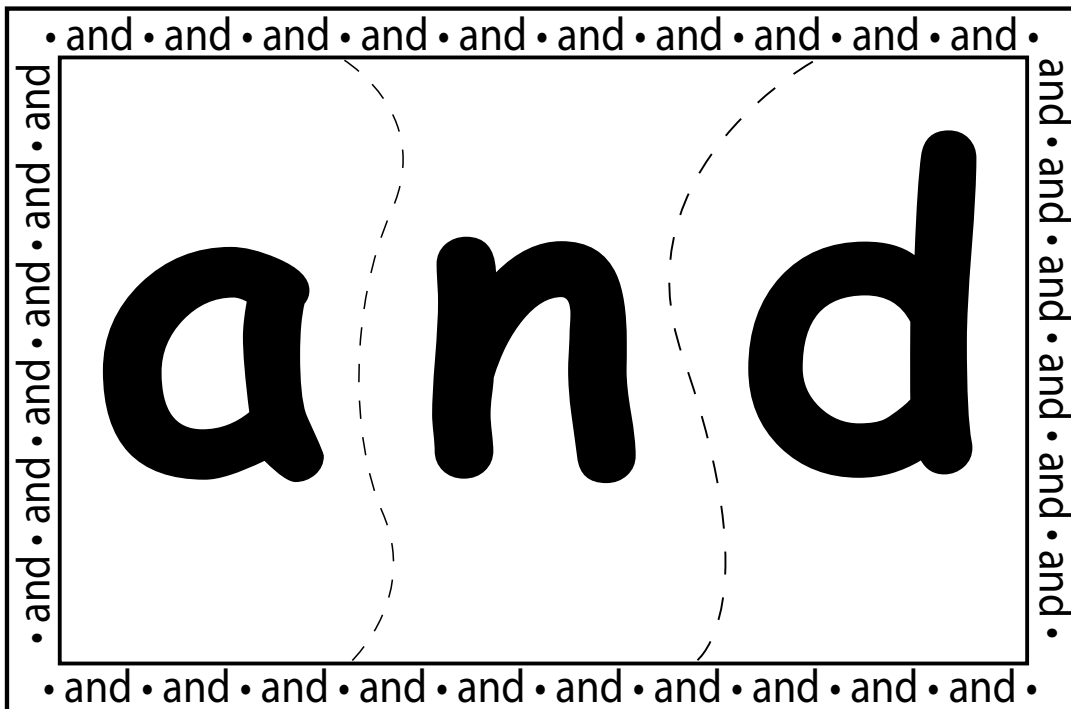

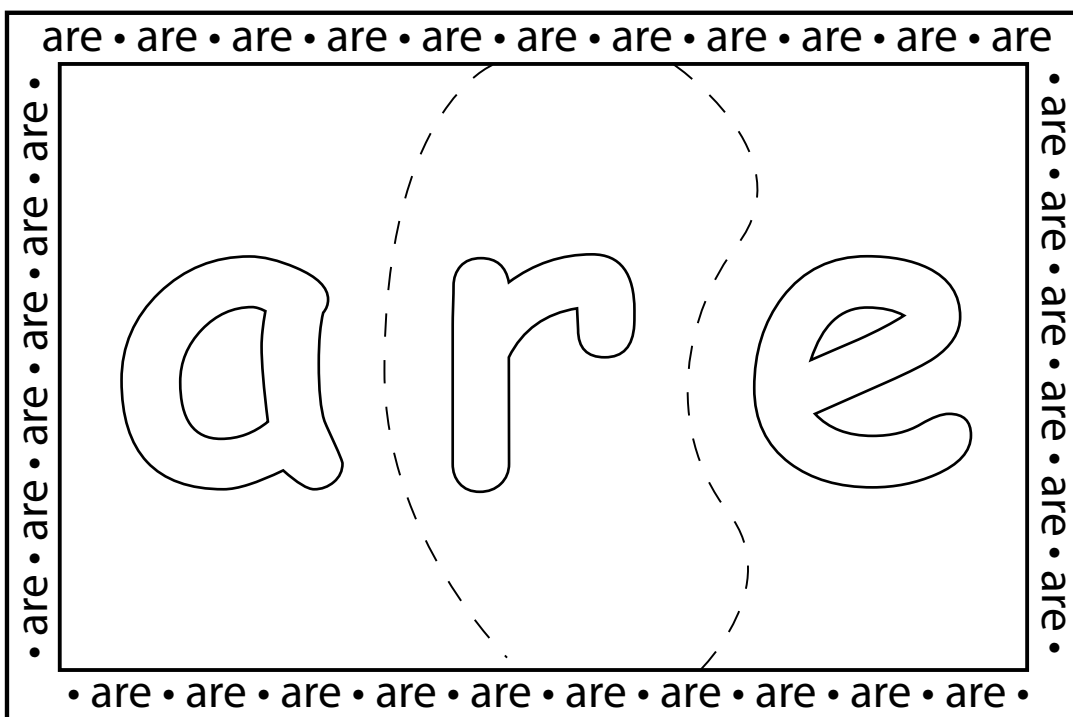
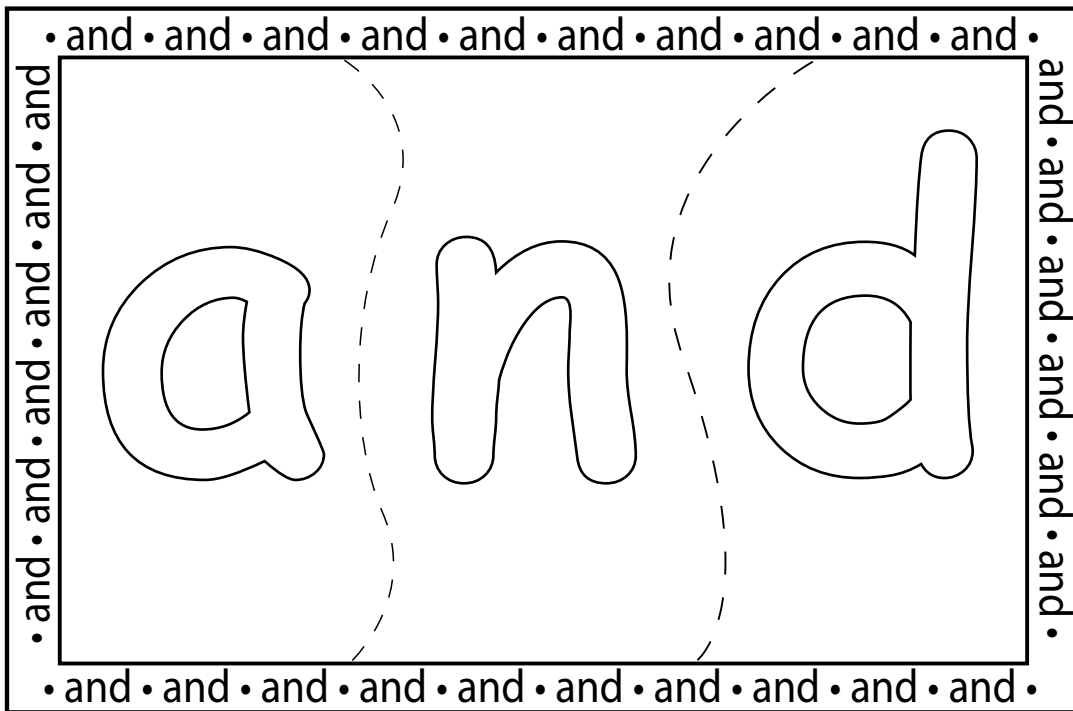
B = Blank puzzle to write in your own letters, **F** = Filled solid letters, **O** = Outline letters to color

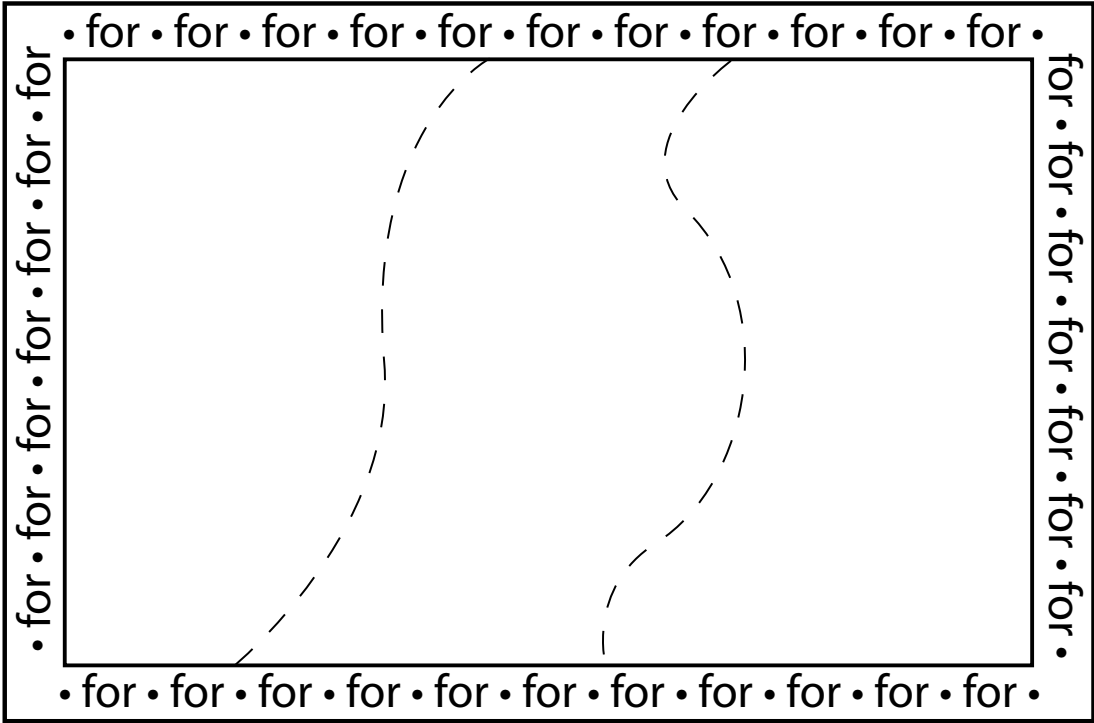
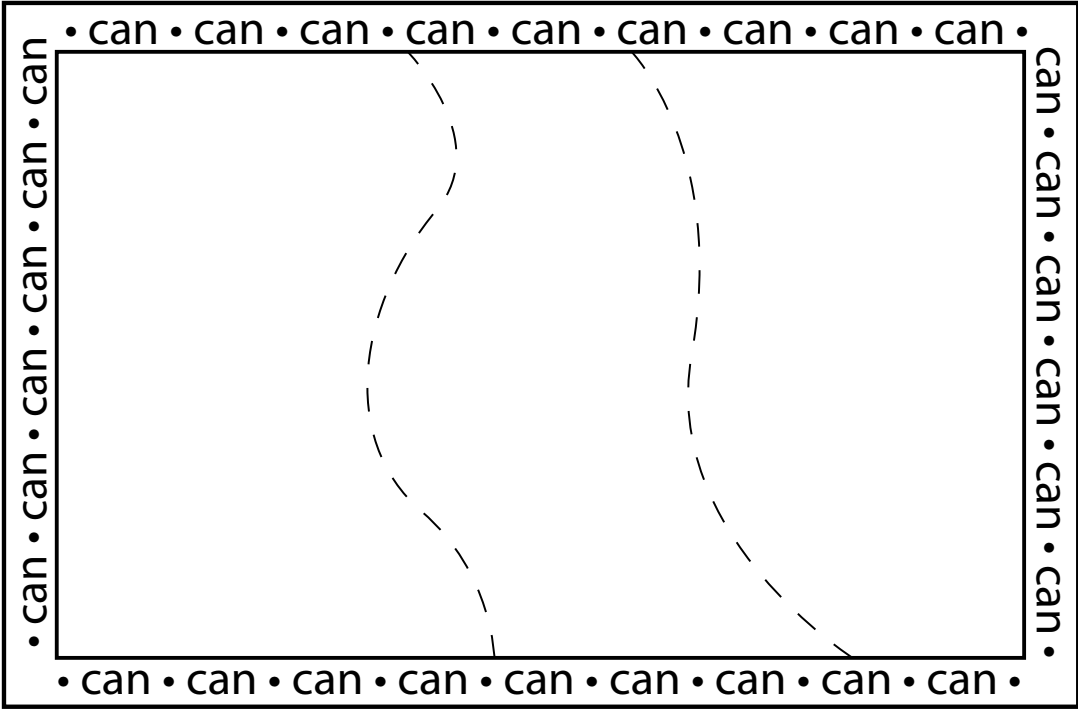







