## 1-100 Counting Worksheets Description and Instructions

**Set 1. Picture Graphs . Pages 2-11 -** This set includes ten different graphs for children to complete that feature objects from the 1-100 book. Children count the objects and color in one square on the graph for each one that they see. Children love to color in the whimsical creatures that surround each graph when they are done! Heidi enjoys giving her students colored pencils, "twistable pencils," or thin markers to make their coloring time a bit more fun. Don't forget to ask your students which row on the graph has the greatest or least, the most or the smallest number of squares colored in when they are finished so that your students get some practice interpreting their graphs.

Set 2. Fill in the Blank. Pages 12-21 - This set includes ten worksheets for practice in number sequencing. These worksheets also feature objects from the 1-100 book, but with a space for the children to write a number on them somewhere. So, there might be a car with a seven, followed by a car with an eight, and then a car with a blank space. The children would write a nine in the blank space, and then go on to the next problem. Five of the worksheets include numbers that are sequenced from 1-10, and five include numbers that are sequenced from 11-30. This is great practice for children that need to remember how to write numbers in the teens verses numbers in the twenties!

Set 3. Connect the Dot · Pages 22-51 - This set of Connect the Dots Worksheets is fun because it features the imaginative drawings from the 1-100 book. But the greatest part is that it lends itself to differentiated instruction quite easily, because each one can be done in three different ways: counting by ones, or by two's, or by five's! That means that you can give any child or group in your class the "same" worksheet, but change the level so that each child is challenged appropriately. Kids don't even have to know that they are doing a different assignment, so it also supports their self-esteem! Heidi uses Connect the Dots worksheets in her classroom by putting them on the backs of their "real" work, and making them optional. That way, children always have something to do if they are finished, but it doesn't really matter if they don't complete them or not.

Set 4. Coloring . Pages 52-66 - This set of Coloring pages are included here just for fun!


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
