Farm Animal Guided Drawing

Horse

- * Draw a big squished circle (or an oval) for the body.
- * Make two lines going up like a number eleven for the neck.
- * Make a small squished circle (or an oval) for the head.
- * Draw an M for the ears.
- * Make an O for the nose and fill it in.
- * Give your horse one eye and half a smile since we are looking at him from the side. (Show the children how you can only see one side of your head when you are looking at a person from the side.)
- * Draw some hair for the mane on the horse's neck.
- * For the legs, draw one line, then another, and then put a lid on it.
- * Then put a line on the bottom of the feet for the hooves.
- * Make a rainbow above the third leg to show his hip.
- * Draw a bunch of lines for the tail.
- * For the saddle, draw a smile on the horse's back. Then add a number eleven under it, and a circle under that for the part where the foot goes.

Cow

- * Draw a big smile for the body, and put a lid on it.
- * Draw a circle head. Add one nose, one eye, and half a smile, since we are looking at it from the side.
- * Draw a couple of squished circles (or ovals) for the ears.
- * Make a rainbow under the cow's belly for the udder. Add four lines for the teats.
- * For the legs, draw one line, then another, and then put a lid on it.
- * Then put a line on the bottom of the feet for the hooves.
- * For the tail, draw one line and then put several lines on the very end for the hairy tip.


Duck

- * Draw a smile for the body, and put a lid on it.
- * Draw a circle for the head, and a pointed hot dog for the beak. Make two if you want the mouth opened! Give it one eye.
- * Draw a smile for the wing, and give it half a lid.
- * Draw a bunch of smiles for the tail.
- * For the legs, draw two lines going down, and then draw a capital A on the bottom of them to form two diagonal lines- but don't put the

line in the middle of the A. Put it on the bottom to form a "lid." (This is really the hardest part-trying to get the kids to put a triangle on the bottom of the duck's leg for a foot. If your kids already know how to make a triangle, then have them do that.)

- * Draw a couple of lines on the feet to show the toes on the webbed feet.
- * You may want to give him some feathers sticking up on his head to distinguish him a bit more from the chick.





Chick- (the only difference between the duck and the chick is the beak and the feet.)

- * Draw a smile for the body, and put a lid on it.
- * Draw a circle for the head, and a V for the beak. Make two if you want the mouth opened! Give it one eye.
- * Draw a smile for the wing, and give it half a lid.
- * Draw a bunch of smiles for the tail.
- * For the legs, draw two lines going down, and give it three lines for the toes.
- * The chick can be yellow, black, or white, etc.



Sheep

- * Draw a little cloud for the hair on the head.
- * Draw a smile under the cloud for the head.
- * Draw some long ovals for the ears and fill them in.
- * Draw two eyes, a nose, and a smile.
- * Draw a big cloud for the body.
- * Draw a little hot dog for the tail.
- * For the legs, draw one line, then another, and then put a lid on it.
- * Then put a line on the bottom of the feet for the hooves.



Pig

- * Draw a nice, round circle for the head.
- * Draw two capital A's for the ears, but don't put the line in the middle of those letters.
- * Draw a two circles for the nostrils on the pig. Then circle them to make the nose.
- * Draw two big circle eyes, and make big eyeballs in them. Fill in the eyeballs.
- * Starting at the top of the pig's head, draw a circle body. Keep going until you get to the bottom of the pig's head, where you finish the circle.
- * For the legs, draw one very short line, then another, and then put a lid on it.
- * Then put a line on the bottom of the feet for the hooves. (Or, make some lower case M's for toe nails instead.)
- * Make a curly snake, (or a couple of number threes on their sides) for the tail.
