




Thanksgiving Guided Drawing



Pilgrim Girl

1. Draw a circle for the head.
2. Draw a rainbow over the head to form the bonnet. Draw a line from the rainbow to the head to close the bonnet on both sides.
3. Draw a skinny rainbow over the top of the bonnet to form the rest of the hat.
4. For the bangs, make two "smiles" going towards one side and then the other. Add more lines for the rest of the strands of hair.
5. Draw the face in the usual way!
6. Starting at the bottom of the face near where the shoulders would be, draw two straight lines down to form the bodice of the dress. Put a lid on it by drawing a line at the bottom of it to form the waist line of the bodice.
7. Make a capital A without the line in the middle of it under the chin. Add two lines on the sides of it to form the collar.
8. To form the apron, draw a line under the waistline very close to the first line. Then draw a rectangle underneath it. (Or, tell the children to draw a large capital L underneath it, and then go back up and put a lid on it.)
9. To form the skirt, start at the sides of the apron and draw two "slides" going down. Then put a lid on the bottom of it.
10. Draw two hot dogs (or squished circles) for the shoes. We usually also draw a number eight on its side to form the shoe laces. (This is only shown in my sample picture on the boy, however.)
11. To form the arms, draw two lines going down and then put a lid on it. Draw a circle for the hands.

Pilgrim Boy

1. Draw a long, skinny rectangle for the rim of the hat. Color it in black. Draw a rectangle on top of it to make the top part of the hat.
2. Draw a line very close to the rim of the hat to form the black striped part of the hat. Put a number eleven in the middle of the hat to form the buckle. Let the children know that when they color that part, it will be yellow because this is supposed to be a brass buckle.
3. Draw a big smile shape to make the whole head. Add a capital C for one ear and a backwards C for the other ear. Draw the face in the usual way. Add hair by drawing in lines as shown on the sample, or any way you chose.
4. Starting at the bottom of the face near where the shoulders would be, draw two straight lines down to form the coat. Put a lid on it by drawing a line at the bottom of it to form the bottom of the coat.
5. Make a capital A without the line in the middle of it under the chin. Add two lines on the sides of it to form the collar.
6. Draw a line going down from the middle of the capital A to form the middle of the jacket. Add buttons by drawing small circles on either side of that line.
7. To form each pant leg, draw two lines going down, and then put a lid on it.
8. Draw two hot dogs (or squished circles) for the shoes. We usually also draw a number eight on its side to form the shoe laces.
9. To form the arms, draw two lines going down and then put a lid on it. Draw a circle for the hands.

Turkey

1. Draw a nice big circle for the body.
2. To form the neck and head, make a long, skinny hot dog.
3. Make a V on its side for the beak. Draw a small circle for the eye. Then add some very small circles or scribbles under the neck to form the waddle.
4. To make each feather, draw two lines going up, and then put a small rainbow lid on it. Usually, after we make one or two, I tell the children to just draw rainbows coming down from the top of each feather to make the next feather. It doesn't really matter too much how you describe it, because they will probably just make circles for each feather no matter what!
5. To make the wing, draw a capital letter C in the middle of the turkey. Then put a lower case C inside of it.
6. To make each leg and foot, draw one thick line going down, and then three lines to form the toes. You can tell them to make a letter A for the first two lines and then add a third line in the middle of it, but it doesn't seem to matter much. Just telling the children to make three lines at the bottom of the leg seems to produce an acceptable looking turkey foot!
