This year Smile Clothing raised enough to help 2000 youngsters and it is hoped the idea will grow into a worldwide success.

It began with NAB business banker Soren Molineux, 25. who said he had developed a strong connection with Indonesia and its people on ramerous surf trips.

"I just wanted to help out, really, in particular the kids who grow up with so little. I looked at charitable options, but wanted it to be sustainable," he said. "You can ask people for \$50 for a cause and because Australians are so generous, you will probably get. it. But ask them for another \$50 in a few months time and it mucht be a different story.

"I heard about a US compuny that sold shoes, with proceeds going to help others and thought it was a great idea. So we decided to do it. with clothes."

Mr Molineux enlisted the help of fellow benker Shann Denaro, 28, who now lives in Brisbane, and businessman Jense Kirley, 33, who threw themselves into the cause.
