Introduction

Called out of Egypt is a VBS program by Pax Domini Press on the testimony of Christ in Israel's exodus from Egypt. It is a great VBS to help understand the Christian life using the types and foreshadows of Israel's journey from slavery to redemption.

Why is this theme important?

Called out of Egypt teaches several important truths about Christian faith and life. First, it introduces the concept of christocentricity. That is, all the Bible is centered on Jesus Christ. Even the Old Testament reveals Jesus through prophecies, types, foreshadows, and unfolding promises.

The VBS also uses the exodus of Israel as a foundation for understanding the Christian life. The Christian life has a remarkable parallel to the life of Israel as they left Egypt. The New Testament invokes the exodus account for this very purpose. Israel was enslaved in Egypt, redeemed by the Passover lamb, passed through the waters in which their enemies were drowned, lived by heavenly bread in the wilderness, and looked to the bronze serpent for healing. So also are we enslaved to sin, redeemed by the Lamb of God, pass through Holy Baptism, are fed by Holy Communion, and we look to Christ in Holy Absolution for our forgiveness.

How do Pax Domini Programs work?

How do I order?

Craft

What is the craft?

The craft is a pyramid that opens up into five panels – a base panel and four triangular panels. Each panel corresponds to a theme covered on each of the five days of VBS.



How can a congregation make this craft?

To make this craft, a congregation will need someone to cut out the panels from 1/8" birch plywood on a table saw. The doorposts/lintels and cross from the bronze serpent will also need to be cut out.

The bricks for the Day One panel (Enslaved) are made from salt dough mixed with tan paint and dry grasses, and then shaped in bricks and cooked in a microwave for about a minute.

The rest of the materials can be purchased at a craft supply store or online.

Craft kits may be purchased through Pax Domini Press for \$15.00.

Jessie: Hey Nickolai. Did you hear the news?

Nickolai: No! What's going on?

Jessie: I checked already. Besides...Ew!

Nickolai: You won't be saying "Ew!" when you're dying of thirst after I've licked the entire bowl clean...OK, you're right...Ew!

Jessie: Nickolai, let's think this through. Do you really think mom and dad would just leave us alone here like in a desert? Do you really think they'd leave us to go hungry and starve? And have no place to go out and do our business? Do you think they'd take the chance that your furry butt would leave little gifts all over the house...again.

Nickolai: I resemble that remark, Jessie!

Jessie: I'm just saying I don't think we may need to worry. I mean, what else do we know about mom and dad?

Nickolai: I don't know. That it's not like them to just leave us alone in a desert with no food or water?

Jessie: And why is it not like them to do that?

Nickolai: Because they love us?

Jessie: That's right! They love us! They haven't forgotten about us. They will make sure we have food and drink. I bet they have someone set up to come over and feed us, give us water, and let us out. I bet it might even be Alexandria. You remember her, don't you?

Nickolai: Alexandria! She's the one who loves scratching me behind the ears and thumping my belly! I love her!

Jessie: See, Nickolai! Mom and dad love us and have not abandoned us. They will make sure we're taken care of.

Nickolai: You know, the children today are learning about the people of Israel being in a desert. I bet they also got afraid and thought they would die from having no food or water.

Jessie: Right! But God took care of them. He gave them water from the rock and the manna from heaven. And why did God take care of them?

Nickolai: For the same reason mom and dad took care of us, because He loves us!

Jessie: That's right.

Nickolai: But Jessie, it sure is hard to trust that God will take care of us every day. In a desert so many bad things can happen. There's nothing we can do to make water flow or cause food to grow. We have to totally trust in God! That's really hard!

Jessie: It is hard. In fact, it's kind of like a test. God teaches us to trust in Him daily.

Nickolai: Hey, Jessie, I just thought of something. Is that why we pray every day that our Father might give us this day our daily bread?

Lesson Two: Redeemed

I Corinthians 5: 7b – Christ, our Passover, was sacrificed for us.

Introduction


Last lesson we learned that the whole Bible is about Jesus. Even the parts written long before Jesus was born are still about Jesus! How can this be?

Jesus was born a little baby, but He is also the Son of God. As the Son of God He has been around forever!

We are learning how, long before Jesus was born, God had a special people named Israel. They were the Hebrew people. They were the children of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob.

They were slaves in the land of Egypt for a long, long time. The Egyptians made them work long and hard hours to build their buildings. Oh how Israel cried out to God to save them!

God raised up a messenger, a prophet named Moses. He met Moses at the burning bush and told Moses he was going to save His people from Egypt. Today we're going to learn how God did this.

The Plagues and Passover

After Moses came down the mountain where the burning bush was, he met his brother Aaron. The two brothers went back to Egypt, to save Israel from their slavery.

Moses and Aaron went to Pharaoh's palace, came before him, and declared to him, "Thus says the Lord God, 'Let my people go!' "

Pharaoh didn't care one bit what the Lord had to say to him. In fact, he made a command that the people of Israel had to work even harder than they were working before. When Moses and Aaron returned to the Hebrews, the people cried out to them, "We thought you were going to save us. You've only made our work harder!"

The next day, Moses and Aaron entered into Pharaoh's palace again. Again they said to Pharaoh, "Let my people go!" This time Aaron threw down his staff, and it turned into a snake!

Pharaoh called his magicians in, and they did the same thing. They threw down their staffs, and they all turned into snakes. But Aaron's snake ate all the other snakes.



The next day, Moses and Aaron met Pharaoh as he was outside by the Nile River. Again they said to him, "Let my people go!" This time, Aaron stretched his staff over the river, and it turned into blood. Blood was everywhere! It was in the streams, in the ponds, and in the pools. No one could drink any water, because it was all blood. The fish in the waters all died, and everything stunk very bad.

All in all, God sent ten plagues on the land of Egypt. The first plague was turning the Nile into blood. After that came nine more plagues.

God sent frogs over all the land of Egypt, frogs everywhere, in the houses and in their cupboards. Then He sent lice to swarm over all the land. After that, the Lord sent flies everywhere.

Next, all the cattle, sheep, camels, and donkeys died from a disease. After that, the Lord sent boils, painful skin sores, on both the animals and on the people. Then the Lord sent heavy hail so heavy it killed animals and people.

After the plague of hail, God sent locusts to eat all the food the hail didn't destroy. Then came the plague of darkness – all the land was covered in darkness, so that no one could see anything at all.



Finally came the last plague. After this plague, Egypt would let Israel free. This plague was called the Passover.

On the night of the Passover, God was going to go through all the land of Egypt and strike the firstborn son of every house. But He would "pass over" the houses who followed His instructions.

These were His instructions. Each family of Israel was to kill a one-year-old, male lamb, and paint its blood on the doorposts and lintels. That night, when God went through Egypt, if He saw the blood of the lamb above the doors, He would "pass over" that house. Everyone in that house would be safe from death.

On the night of the Passover, God went through all the land of Egypt and struck the firstborn sons of many houses, but none of the sons of the Hebrews was harmed at all. They were protected by the blood of the lamb.

Finally, Egypt had had enough! They cried out to Israel to leave them. At last Israel was freed from Egypt!


The Lamb of God Who Takes Away the Sin of the World

Let us say together, "Christ, our Passover, was sacrificed for us." Jesus is our Passover Lamb! The blood of Jesus protects us from God's judgment. One day, Jesus will judge the whole world, but we will be protected from His judgment, because we are covered by His blood.

When Jesus died on the cross, He was the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world. He died so we can be freed from sin, death, and the devil. Just as the Passover lamb freed Israel from Egypt, so does Jesus, our Passover Lamb, free us from sin, death, and the devil.

Introduction


The Bible tells us all about Jesus. The Bible tells us many other stories too. The Bible is divided into the Old Testament and the New Testament.

The Old Testament tells us all the things before Jesus was born. The New Testament tells us all about Jesus and the Church He set up.

One of the greatest stories of the Old Testament is how God freed His people Israel from Egypt. God freed His people Israel from Egypt, He also free us from sin, death, and the devil. In fact, the story of God freeing His people from Egypt is also about Jesus freeing us from sin, death, and the devil!

Israel Enslaved in Egypt

Let us learn how God freed His people from Egypt. Let us learn how He frees us also!

Long ago, God called a man named Abraham. God promised Abraham he would have many children. He would have as many children as there were stars in the sky!

Abraham's family grew very large indeed. He had a son named Isaac, and Isaac had a son named Jacob. Jacob had twelve sons.

During a famine, Jacob and his family moved to Egypt to get food. They remained there for many, many years. They became a huge family in Egypt.

These people were called Hebrews. These were the people of Israel. These were God's people.



Israel as slaves in Egypt

The king of Egypt was called Pharaoh. He feared the Hebrews because there were so many of them. He came upon a plan. He made them slaves. He made them build his buildings without pay. He set masters over them to force them to work hard. The people cried out to the Lord for help.

The Pharaoh had another evil plan. He ordered the Hebrew mothers to throw their baby boys into the Nile, the river of Egypt.

One Hebrew mother tried to save her baby boy. She made a little basket for her baby and placed

him in it. Then she set the basket in the river. The basket floated down the river, and the baby's older sister followed the basket to see what would happen.

The basket came to where a princess was bathing in the river. She saw the basket and felt sorry for the boy. She wanted to keep him for herself. The baby's sister came up and told the princess, "I know someone who can nurse the baby for you and help raise him." She meant the baby's mother!

The princess named the boy Moses, which means "drawn from the water." Moses grew up in the princess' house.



One day Moses went out and saw the Hebrew slaves working hard. He saw an Egyptian master beating a Hebrew slave, so he killed the Egyptian. Because of this crime Moses had to leave Egypt.



Moses left Egypt and soon he met a shepherd who had seven daughters. He married one of the daughters and became a shepherd for many years.

One day while Moses was tending sheep, he came to a mountain. There he saw the Angel of the Lord in a burning bush. The bush was on fire, but it was not burning up!

The Lord spoke from the bush and said, "I am the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob. I have seen the slavery

of my people Israel, and have heard their cry because of their masters, for I know their sorrows. So I have come down to deliver them out of the hand of the Egyptians."

God continued speaking to Moses, "I will send you to Pharaoh that you may bring My people, the children of Israel, out of Egypt."




Introduction

The Hebrews were slaves in Egypt for 430 years. They cried out to the Lord for freedom. The Lord raised up His servant Moses. Through Moses, God sent ten plagues on Egypt. After the first nine plagues, Pharaoh still not let Israel free.

On the first Passover, God passed through Egypt and struck down the firstborn sons of Egypt. God spared any house with the blood of a lamb over its doors. Israel was free!

Israel left Egypt the next day. They came to the Red Sea, and then Pharaoh went after Israel. He changed his mind again! Israel was trapped between the sea and Pharaoh's army. The Lord split the sea for Moses, and Israel walked through. They were totally free at last. All their enemies were drowned in the sea. The Lord defeated Pharaoh for Israel.

Now Israel was in the wilderness. A wilderness is like a desert. They would live in the desert for forty years! What would they eat during this time? What would they drink? Today we answer those questions.

Israel in the Wilderness

After crossing the Red Sea, Moses led Israel into the wilderness. Soon they became thirsty. They came upon water, but it was bitter. The Lord had Moses throw a certain tree into the waters, and then they could drink the water.

All forty years, Israel had water. Once Israel needed water, so Lord stood before a rock and told Moses to strike the rock. The rock began to flow with water! Afterwards the rock followed Israel in the wilderness.

Who else was struck and had water (and blood) flow from Him?

After a few days in the wilderness, the people became hungry. They began to complain to Moses.

Here is how the Lord fed Israel. He said, "Behold, I will rain bread from heaven for you. The people shall gather it every day. This is a test for them, whether they will walk in My law or not. On the sixth day, they shall bring in twice as much."

In the morning, there was a substance like frost on the ground. Israel gathered up the substance, as each family needed. They baked it like bread. This is what Israel ate for forty years in the wilderness.

Each day they were to take no more than they needed. On the sixth day, they took twice as much, so that they would not work on the seventh day, which is the

Sabbath. Some tried to keep more than they needed and store it away. The next day, it rotted and stunk. Others tried to gather it on the Sabbath. The Lord forbade them from doing this.

Israel called the bread Manna. It tasted like wafers made with honey.

Fed in the Wilderness

Israel never forgot how God fed them manna in the wilderness. Many years later, Jesus was in the wilderness too. Many people were following him, just like Moses! He also fed them with bread and fish. He took five loaves and two fishes and fed 5,000 people.

Jesus taught them that He brings a greater bread than justmanna. He said "I am the bread of life."


Israel ate manna, but still all of them died. Jesus gives us a better bread. Whoever eats this bread will live forever.




Forgiven

Introduction

The people of Israel were enslaved to Egypt for many years. Then they were redeemed by the blood of the lamb. Through a baptism into the Red Sea, they came out the other side a new people. In the wilderness they were fed by the bread from heaven.

Is this Israel's story or our own? We too were enslaved...to sin, death, and the devil. We too were redeemed by the blood of the lamb...of God who takes away the sin of the world. We also were baptized...in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. Through this all, our Lord is training us to trust in Him. We learn we have to rely on Him every day for our daily bread.

Today we will learn how Israel sinned against God in the wilderness, but how He gave them forgiveness.

The Bronze Serpent

Israel had been journeying for a long, long time in the wilderness. They traveled through dusty paths in the dry heat of the sun. Every day they woke up, and God provided the manna they needed to survive. He also provided the water from the rock.

Finally Israel had had enough. The people complained against God and Moses and said, "Why did you bring us up from Egypt? To die in this wilderness? There is no food and water, and we hate this worthless bread."

Now, this was not exactly true. Israel most certainly had food and water. They had the quail, the manna from heaven, and the water from the rock.

What Israel meant by saying, "We have no bread and water" is that they had no permanent bread and water. They had no fields in which to grow grain, or rivers from which to get water. They wanted their homeland! They wanted to arrive at the Promised Land!

When you want to rely on yourself rather than God, you lose your in God.


Israel lost patience and trust, and they were not grateful for what the Lord had given them. Patience and trust are important elements of the faith we must have during our time in the wilderness. Being grateful for everything God richly provides for us daily is also an important part of faith.

Let us continue with the account:

Because the people complained, God sent fiery serpents among the people. These serpents bit the people, and many of them died because of the serpents.

The people repented of their lack of trust, patience, and gratitude. They came to Moses and said, "We have sinned, for we have spoken against the Lord and against you."

Then they asked Moses to pray to the Lord, that He might take the serpents away from them.

An intercessor is someone who asks something from someone on your behalf. How was Moses an intercessor for Israel? Who is our intercessor?

Moses prayed to the Lord, and the Lord heard His prayer. He said, "Make a fiery serpent, and set it on a pole; and it shall be that everyone who is bitten, when he looks at it, shall live."

So Moses made a bronze serpent, and put it on a pole; and so it was, if a serpent had bitten anyone, when he looked at the bronze serpent, he lived.
