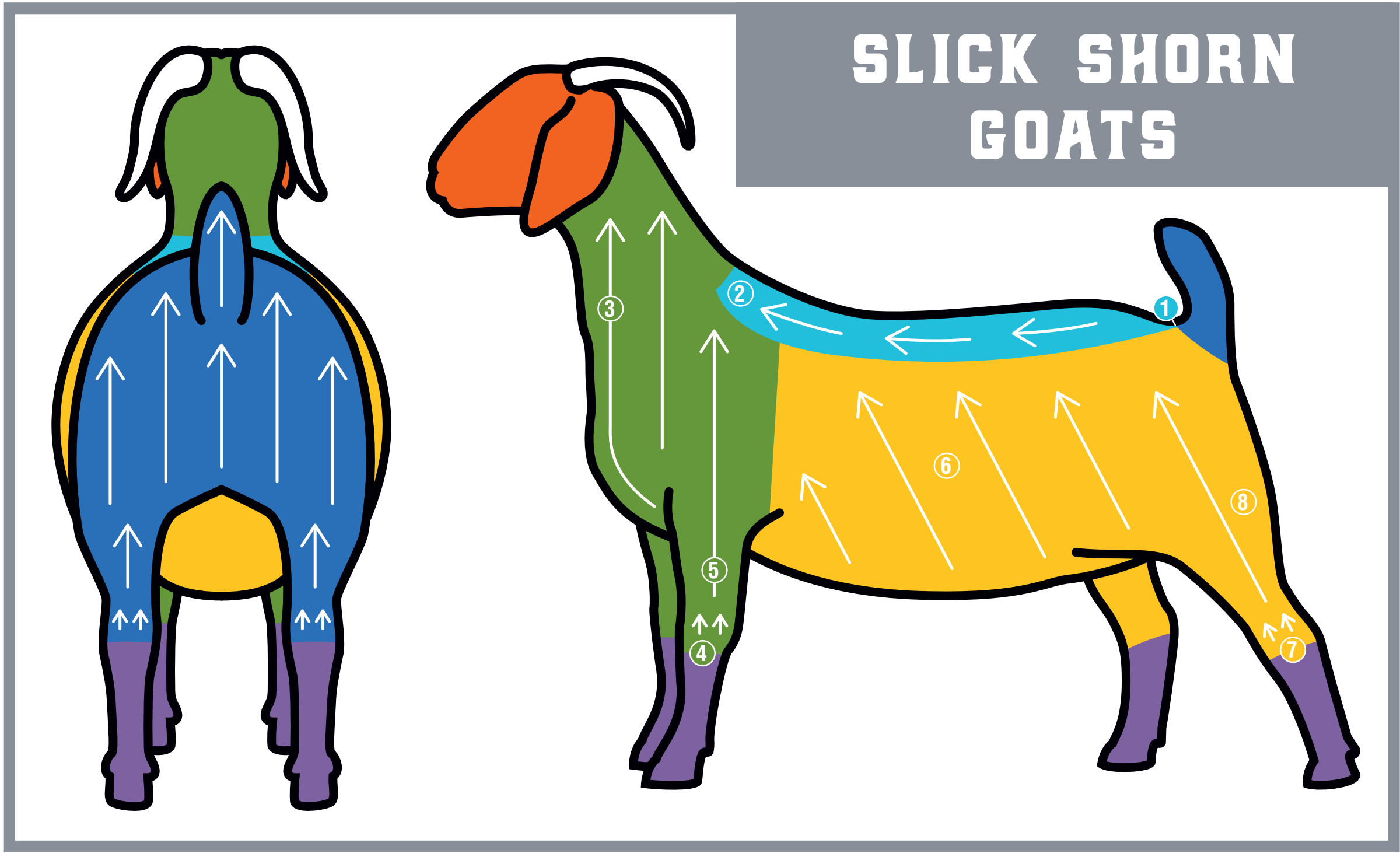




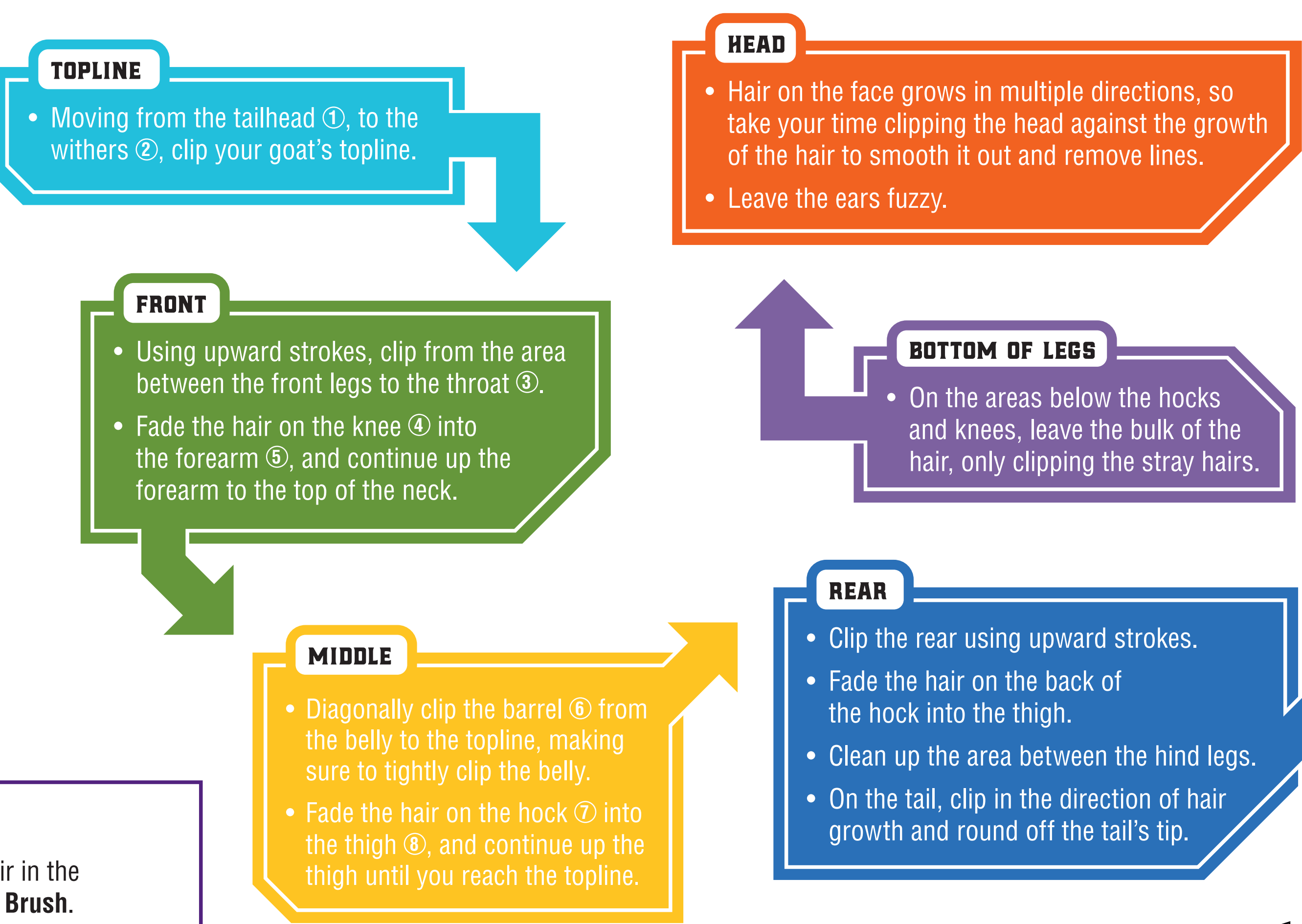
SLICK SHORN GOATS

BEFORE YOU CLIP:

Make sure you have the following items:

1. Degreasing Shampoo
2. Trimming stand
3. Flathead clipper
4. Covercote blade
5. Pig Face Brush
6. Blower
7. ProSheen
8. Brightening Shampoo

- Wash goat with **Degreasing Shampoo**.
- Dry goat completely with **Blower** while brushing hair in the opposite direction of hair growth with the **Pig Face Brush**.
- Have your goat jump on the **Trimming Stand** and put his head in the headpiece; if he can't jump onto the stand, you can lift him onto it.



TOPLINE

- Moving from the tailhead ①, to the withers ②, clip your goat's topline.

HEAD

- Hair on the face grows in multiple directions, so take your time clipping the head against the growth of the hair to smooth it out and remove lines.
- Leave the ears fuzzy.

FRONT

- Using upward strokes, clip from the area between the front legs to the throat ③.
- Fade the hair on the knee ④ into the forearm ⑤, and continue up the forearm to the top of the neck.

MIDDLE

- Diagonally clip the barrel ⑥ from the belly to the topline, making sure to tightly clip the belly.
- Fade the hair on the hock ⑦ into the thigh ⑧, and continue up the thigh until you reach the topline.

BOTTOM OF LEGS

- On the areas below the hocks and knees, leave the bulk of the hair, only clipping the stray hairs.

REAR

- Clip the rear using upward strokes.
- Fade the hair on the back of the hock into the thigh.
- Clean up the area between the hind legs.
- On the tail, clip in the direction of hair growth and round off the tail's tip.

AFTER YOU CLIP:

- Spray goat's hair with **ProSheen** and distribute product evenly with a rag.
- Use a blower to dry the product and blow out hair clippings.
- Wash goat the next day with **Brightening Shampoo**; dry completely.

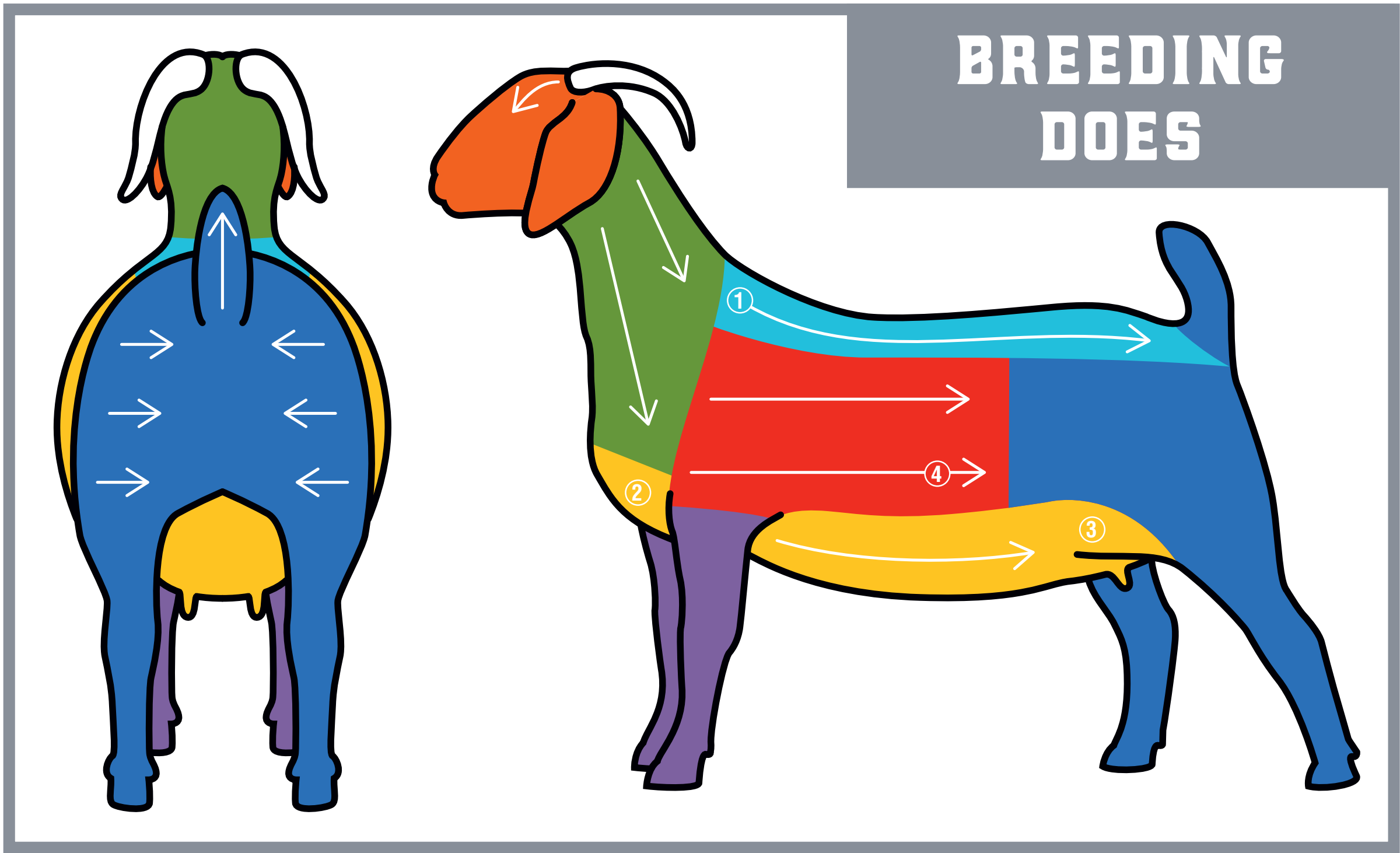
PROTIPS:

- Clip no more than three days before the show to ensure that hair is short and even.
- Oil your clippers every 30 minutes.
- Use your opposite hand to keep the skin tight when clipping.
- Alternate combing and clipping for best results.
- A **ProCool™ Goat Blanket** is a must when wether goats and slick does are outside.

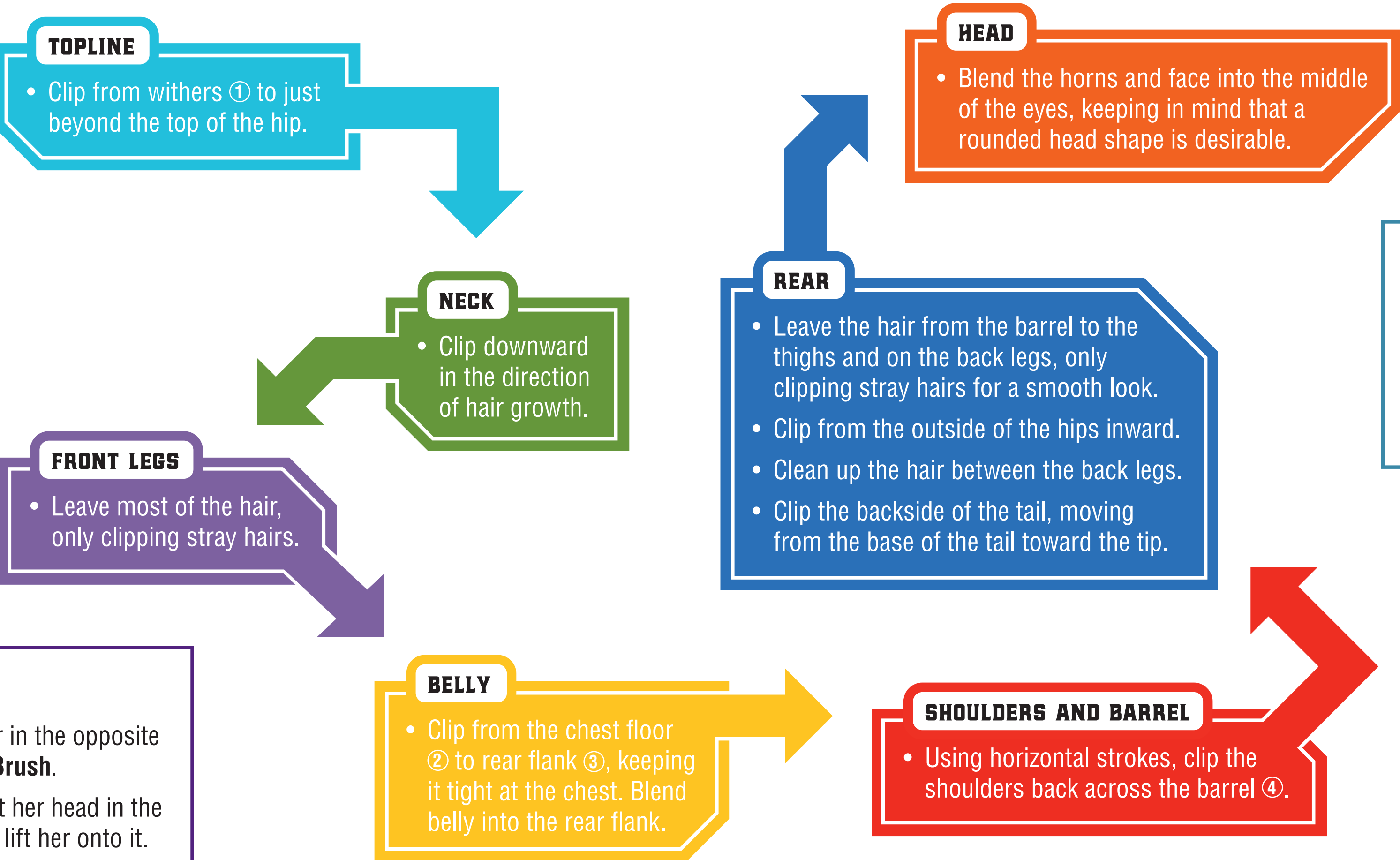
BREEDING DOES

BEFORE YOU CLIP:

MAKE SURE YOU HAVE THE FOLLOWING ITEMS:

1. Degreasing Shampoo
2. Coconut Shampoo
3. Trimming stand
4. Little clippers
5. Medium blade
6. Blower
7. ProSheen
8. Mini Wide Range Brush

- Wash goat with **Degreasing Shampoo**.
- Dry goat completely with **Blower** while brushing hair in the opposite direction of hair growth with the **Mini Wide Range Brush**.
- Have your goat jump on the **Trimming Stand** and put her head in the headpiece; if she can't jump onto the stand, you can lift her onto it.



TOPLINE

- Clip from withers ① to just beyond the top of the hip.

HEAD

- Blend the horns and face into the middle of the eyes, keeping in mind that a rounded head shape is desirable.

NECK

- Clip downward in the direction of hair growth.

FRONT LEGS

- Leave most of the hair, only clipping stray hairs.

REAR

- Leave the hair from the barrel to the thighs and on the back legs, only clipping stray hairs for a smooth look.
- Clip from the outside of the hips inward.
- Clean up the hair between the back legs.
- Clip the backside of the tail, moving from the base of the tail toward the tip.

AFTER YOU CLIP:

- Spray goat's hair with **ProSheen** and distribute product evenly with **Mini Wide Range Brush**.
- Use a blower to dry the product and blow out hair clippings.
- Wash goat the following day with **Coconut Shampoo**, and dry completely.

PROTIPS:

- Clip a week before the show, and do touch-ups on show day.
- Oil your clippers every 30 minutes.
- Use your opposite hand to keep skin tight while clipping.
- Alternate combing and clipping for best results.
