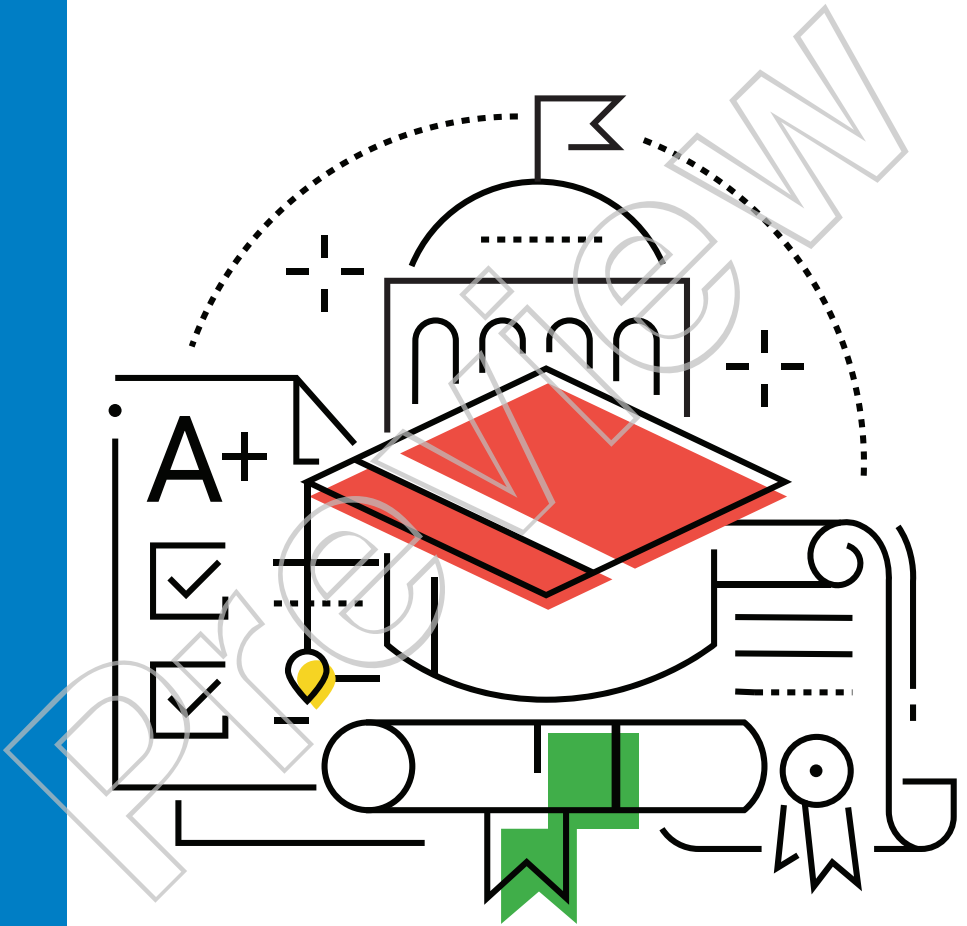

2- AND 4-YEAR COLLEGES

Whether someone goes to a 2-year or 4-year college often depends on their career goals. For example, if you want to be a firefighter, you would likely go to a 2-year college. However, if you want to become an elementary teacher, you must go to a 4-year college and earn a bachelor's degree.

Which is best for you?

2-Year colleges – Two-year community colleges prepare students for a career in two years or less. Students take just the courses they need to prepare for their chosen career field.

4-Year colleges – Four-year colleges prepare students for a variety of careers. To ensure that students get a well-rounded education, four-year colleges generally require that all students take courses in English, science, math, and social sciences.
