## Stockholm

Built in the 1920s and reflecting the timeless elegance of the Swedish Grace design movement, this room has been skilfully reinvented by Note Design Studio. A chimneypiece made of Brännlyckan blue-green marble is balanced by a 1940s burr wood and black lacquer coffee table by Erik Johansson. The use of vertical space – with an unusually tall doorway contrasted by the low furniture, none of which is higher than the fireplace—introduces a sense of scale and drama. notedesignstudio.se


## Madrid

Interior designer Marta de la Rica has subtly divided this long, narrow room in a 1920s apartment into distinct areas for dining and sitting, using brass-framed panels. These are painted in a slightly lighter shade of terracotta than the walls and ceiling, which provides further visual differentiation between the zones. They are used as the backdrop for eye-catching art that can be changed easily to give a new point of interest. *martadelarica.es* 

## São Paulo

The vision of designer Pascali Semerdjian, this open-plan sitting room has an inviting TV area screened by natural rope curtains.
