## TIPS FOR A NURSERY TO SETTLE NEWBORNS

- Ensure cots, change tables and furniture meet Australian Safety Standards and SIDS and Kids recommendations.
- Place cots safely away from curtain cords and power plugs.
- Create an ambient environment; soft, calming colours are best.
- Don't confuse the nursery with a play room - nurseries should have minimal stimulation.
- The nursery can be in the corner of the parents' room for the first six months; or the nursery should be next to the parents' room.
- If in doubt, ask your midwife or maternal and child health nurse.
