








HIGHLIGHTS



BALLARAT'S FIRST DRIVE THROUGH PHARMACY

In a first for Ballarat, a drive through pharmacy was opened in Sebastopol in May, 2023.

This service adds a new level of convenience for patients and reflects our continued responsiveness to the needs of our community for increased access to quality healthcare services. Patients can collect their prescription medication or other pharmacy products from the comfort of their car, which has proven popular for those with mobility issues, for young families and those not wanting to brave the elements!

The Sebastopol UFS Pharmacy team relocated from the former site at 56 Albert Street to the new pharmacy across the road. As well as the drive through service, the pharmacy is also easily accessible for patients from the medical centre upstairs, or for walk-in customers.

SEBASTOPOL UFS MEDICAL

Our team of GPs, nurses and reception staff from Bridge Mall relocated to the new purpose-built Sebastopol UFS Medical centre in April, 2023.

The new facility offers on-site pathology services with radiology services conveniently located two doors away. The medical centre has since expanded with several new GPs joining the team.





WENDOUREE PHARMACY UPGRADE

A small refurbishment of the Wendouree UFS Pharmacy was undertaken in the latter half of 2022.

This work included the installation of a ROWA medication dispensing robot, which has added efficiencies to the operation of the dispensary. The ROWA dispensing robots are also in place in our Bridge Mall, Bacchus Marsh Village, Sturt Street and Sebastopol pharmacies.



BALLARAT PRIORITY PRIMARY CARE CENTRE

During 2022, we established and opened the Ballarat Priority Primary Care Centre (PPCC) on behalf of the State Government

The Ballarat PPCC is situated downstairs from our Windermere Street medical practice and is a short walk from the Grampians Health Ballarat Hospital emergency department.

The centre is open from 10am to 10pm every day of the year and is staffed by a team of GPs and nurses to provide immediate medical care for non life threatening injuries or illnesses. Patients are triaged on arrival for their suitability for the service.

There is no charge to patients, regardless of whether they have a Medicare card.

Since opening on 31 October, 2022, up to the end of June, 2023, the PPCC saw 10,862 patients and in May this year was recognised as the busiest of the 25 PPCCs in the state.

MEDICATION BLISTER PACK RECYCLING

Delivering on our commitment to reduce our impact on the environment, we are now providing recycling collection boxes for empty medication blister packs at UFS pharmacies and medical centres.

Throwing empty medication packs in regular waste bins means they go to landfill, where they can take hundreds of years to break down. With this program, blister packs are separated into aluminium and plastics. The aluminium is then smelted to create industrial products and plastics (polyethylene or PVC) are made into pellets, then sold or used to make pipes, helping to contribute to a circular economy.



HIGHLIGHTS

COVID CLINICS CLOSE

As part of the winding down of the government's COVID response, the contract to operate the UFS COVID-19 testing clinic ended in February, 2023.

The testing clinic was established in a very short period of time, opening early on in the pandemic in April 2020. During its operation, 99,725 COVID PCR tests were completed, with 5,862 positive cases detected.

The contract to operate the dedicated COVID-19 vaccination clinic operated by UFS ended in December 2022. This clinic was established in March 2021 when COVID vaccinations first became available in Australia and administered 67,483 vaccines. UFS continues to support the community with our team of immunisation accredited pharmacists vaccinating patients against COVID in UFS pharmacies.

The testing and vaccination clinics played a vital role in the community's response to the pandemic, particularly in the period prior to Rapid Antigen Testing becoming widely available. UFS is proud to have supported the health needs of our community in such uncertain and challenging times.






EXPANSION OF SUPERCARE NURSING SERVICES OPERATED BY UFS

We welcomed Supercare nurses from four additional Supercare Nursing sites to the UFS team in December, 2022, as we expanded the number of Supercare Nursing services we operate under the Victorian Government Supercare Pharmacies initiative.

UFS now operates all 20 Supercare Nursing services across the state, providing treatment for minor illnesses and ailments within pharmacy settings across the state. This free service operates from 6pm to 10pm each evening.








PATIENT CONSULTATIONS AT EACH UFS MEDICAL PRACTICE

OUR COMMUNITY

DONATIONS AND SPONSORSHIPS

Our continued support for our members and local communities is demonstrated by our commitment to supporting community organisations across all areas of our operations, providing donations, sponsorship and in-kind support to local groups and organisations each year. A total of \$93,500 was donated in the 2022/23 financial year to the organisations listed opposite.



Our support for WRISC's *Little Children, Big Outcomes* program continued with a further \$15,000 donated for this important work.

This pilot is a specialised response for children under five who have experienced family violence. Evidence tells us that the social, emotional and developmental wellbeing of children under five is significantly impacted by family violence. Evidence also tells us that children under five have a strong capacity for recovery and recover best when their key safe care-giving relationship is adequately supported.

The Little Children, Big Outcomes group provides a creative play environment that supports mother-child recovery from family violence and enhances the growth promoting capacity of the mother-child relationship.



We continue to support Ballarat Men's Mental Health (BMMH) with a further donation of \$15,000. BMMH focusses on early mental health intervention and provides a telephone, video or face-to-face service, delivered in a male/user friendly environment designed to minimise barriers to men seeking help.



In a joint partnership with Cafs and the Ballarat Foundation, to support vulnerable children in out of home care or in family support programs in our region, UFS donated \$7,500 to the back to school vouchers project.

The aim of the vouchers project was to help with back to school costs like school shoes, uniforms and stationery as the 2023 school year commenced.



We were pleased to once again provide support for a Federation University student by donating to the Federation University Australia Foundation Scholarships Program.

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

On behalf of the Board, I am pleased to provide the 2023 Chair's Report.

It is fair to say that the last three years have been characterised by more uncertainty than in any similar period over recent decades. Consumer demand has been volatile, impacted by the economic slowdown, rapidly increased interest rates and higher inflationary pressures.

It is a tribute to the engagement and performance of our leadership team and all staff that we have been able to deliver an acceptable financial result in the face of both economic and operating challenges. Full year revenue exceeded our plans but we reported a minor net loss at the bottom line. A large part of the revenue gain came from the sale of high-cost drugs with corresponding low margins. Operationally we saw increased payroll, rents and utilities and additionally we made substantial digital investments — expenditures which reduced the bottom line but are essential to the company's future success. Retained earnings increased substantially from the revaluation of land and buildings. Our balance sheet remains strong and can support our strategic initiatives.

It's been a year of significant transformation in which the Board and CEO Matt Vagg reset the fundamentals of the company. In addition to completing a detailed review of our business portfolio, a new five year strategic plan and performance framework has been established that is supported by a new Purpose and Vision Statement with five key objective pillars and guiding principles. Our values will guide the decisions we need to make as we deliver on our strategies. With this model, Matt has effectively set the direction of the business, aligned the organisation, is mobilising the plan through the business leaders and connecting with the stakeholders. The Board is fully engaged with the CEO and leadership in delivering on the strategic initiatives to create a stronger and more resilient UFS.

In line with this work is the recognition that a change in the company name and branding is warranted to more fully reflect the broader nature of the UFS offering today and into the future – to be a leading partner in connecting more people to high quality, integrated healthcare across our region.

On 9th May 2023, the Federal Treasurer, Dr Jim Chalmers handed down the Labour Government's second Federal Budget. The Government announcement included their intention to increase the maximum dispensing quantity of certain medicines. This policy reform means that from 1 September 2023, nearly 100 common medicines listed on the

Pharmaceutical Benefits Scheme (PBS) will have the option of a 60 day prescription for the cost of a single prescription.

This policy is likely to adversely impact pharmacy profitability and although the Government has pledged that all savings derived from this policy will be reinvested into the community pharmacy sector, the lack of details and high level of uncertainty prevent any useful estimates from being made.

While the Company is proactively pursuing a series of measures to counter the effect of this change, the period ahead promises to be challenging. Persistently high global and local inflation and rising interest rates leave the prospect for the economy and the markets we operate in clouded. The impacts are depicted in lower script and OTC volume and fewer medical appointments. These will all influence the future of UFS and pharmacy in Australia. In the short term we will look to strengthen our core business and continue to execute our medium/longer term strategy while we monitor these unfolding events.

Following the recent review of our business portfolio and the development of a five year strategic plan, the Board identified the skills needed to support the business and lead UFS through the next growth phase and into the future. To this end we are currently in the process of recruiting one new non-executive director. Two other directors will offer themselves for re-election after retiring by normal rotation in accordance with our Constitution; they are Graeme Dixon and Jacinta Rivett.

Our approach to corporate governance is to help UFS enhance accountability and transparency around all those decisions made at the very top – those which would impact leadership, corporate and data management, executive remuneration, corporate culture, ethics, social and environmental matters and risk and compliance, thereby instilling greater confidence in the organisation by our members. The relationship between the Board and management is strong and remains engaging and constructive.

I thank my Board colleagues for their dedication to the Board and the company. My thanks also to the entire UFS team for their energy, commitment, professionalism and focus on delivering on our priorities over the year and the period ahead.

It is an exciting time for the Board, the leadership, and our people.

CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER'S REPORT

It's been an honour and privilege to have joined UFS as CEO last August.

This first year has been a whirlwind of activity as we have refreshed and redefined the Purpose, Vision and Guiding Principles of UFS. This was a very important piece of work to define why we exist, clarify our ambition and highlight the standards and behaviours that will shape our culture.

Following a thorough review of our underlying performance, we assessed the opportunities across our key markets and developed a five year strategic plan titled *Reshaping our Future*.

This detailed growth strategy defines the five key objectives that we will be focusing on to build a sustainable and diversified organisation. The strategy will deliver core business growth and ensure the continued success and sustainability of UFS into the future. It has a strong focus on change and transformation, revitalising how the company operates, in order to deliver a sustainable economic model.

The government's announcement in May regarding the change to 60 day dispensing for selected medication comes with a heavy financial impact on the pharmacy sector and reinforces the need for a strategy that ensures we remain focused on building a more sustainable core business.

We were delighted to be awarded the contract to establish and operate the Ballarat Priority Primary Care Centre (PPCC) on behalf of the State Government. The Ballarat centre is one of 25 in the state, the aim of which is to relieve pressure on busy hospital emergency departments, and we are collaborating with Grampians Health and other healthcare services in the region on this initiative. The PPCC provides medical care when it's urgent but not an emergency and is another way that we are increasing access to quality healthcare in our region.

A new purpose-built UFS Medical centre and pharmacy was opened in Sebastopol early in 2023. The team from the former Bridge Mall UFS Medical centre relocated to this new site, along with the team from the Sebastopol UFS Pharmacy. This location is also the site of our new drive through pharmacy, providing a new level of convenient access to prescription medication and other pharmacy products for a range of patients.

UFS was approached by the Victorian Government to increase the number of Supercare Nursing services we operate on

their behalf across the state of Victoria. This means that UFS now manages all 20 Supercare Nursing services in Supercare Pharmacies across Victoria from 6pm to 10pm each evening. The four additional Supercare Nursing sites are all based in Metropolitan Melbourne in Ascot Vale, Yarraville, Craigieburn and Knox.

After 11 years of managing Melbourne based pharmacies on behalf of Friendly Pharmacy Vic (FPV), UFS made a decision not to renew the management contract past 30 June, 2023. Our leadership team worked closely with the incoming CEO of FPV to ensure a smooth and seamless transition. The UFS pharmacies at Coburg Village in North Coburg and the Pentridge complex in Coburg will be known as Community Health pharmacies.

Planning is well underway for a new medical centre in Lucas, due to open in early 2025. This development is in response to the rapidly expanding population west of the centre of Ballarat, and is expected to play a vital role in enhancing access to high-quality healthcare services for the community of Lucas and surrounding areas. We are working with Integra to develop this purpose-built medical facility, with the ground floor offering a range of complementary allied health services to cater for different healthcare needs, and the first-floor housing consulting rooms for GPs and other specialists. This additional practice will bring the total number of UFS Medical centres to four, joining Doveton Street UFS Medical, Windermere Street UFS Medical and the recently opened purpose-built Sebastopol UFS Medical centre.

I'd like to thank the staff across the organisation for their hard work, commitment and focus on our members and patients, and the support and tireless effort from the senior leadership team and members of the executive. I'd also like to acknowledge and thank the Chair and Directors for all of their support during my first year.

While we have some challenges ahead, UFS has an exciting future as we embark on delivering our new growth strategy and I'm extremely optimistic about the possibilities for our organisation, our people, and what we can provide for our members, patients and customers.
