

HIGHLIGHTS



ESTABLISHMENT OF COVID-19 VACCINATION CLINIC

UFS Dispensaries is proud to be playing a key role in the Commonwealth Government's COVID-19 vaccination program in the Ballarat region.

A dedicated vaccination clinic was established in March, 2021, in Ballarat's hospital precinct, right opposite the Ballarat Base Hospital. This clinic relocated to new premises in Dana Street in central Ballarat at the beginning of July, 2021.

The clinic administered 11,580 AstraZeneca vaccine doses in the period to 30 June, 2021, with Pfizer vaccinations introduced in July, 2021.

COVID-19 TESTING CLINIC

The UFS COVID-19 Testing Clinic established in 2020 continued to play a key role in keeping the community safe during the 20/21 financial year, with 44,211 COVID-19 tests performed.

Established swiftly in April, 2020, in the early stages of the pandemic, the capacity of the testing clinic was expanded in July of that year following Department of Health approval for an additional consulting room to be opened up. This resulted in more appointments becoming available to address increased demand. At one point, five doctors and seventeen nurses were working at the clinic.





SUPERCARE PHARMACY INITIATIVE EXTENDED

The State Government's Supercare Pharmacy initiative was extended by another 12 months until 30 June 2022.

As well as the Sturt Street UFS Pharmacy being a 24 hour Supercare Pharmacy, UFS Medical operates the Supercare Nursing Service in 24 hour Supercare Pharmacies in 16 locations across Victoria, on behalf of the State Government.

The nursing service includes wound care, blood pressure checks, treatment of minor strains and sprains, rashes and minor burns, coughs, colds, vomiting, diarrhoea, removal of sutures or staples (with instructions from a doctor), injections (with prescription), immunisations under the National Immunisation Program (NIP) schedule and general healthcare advice.



CELEBRATING 140 YEARS

December 2020 marked 140 years since UFS Dispensaries was established as a friendly society, with our first ever dispensary opening in 1881.

RELOCATION OF DOVETON STREET SOUTH UFS PHARMACY

September 2020 saw the Doveton Street South UFS Pharmacy relocate across the road from 12 Doveton Street South to a newly fitted out pharmacy at the Block Arcade in central Ballarat.



DISPENSING ROBOT FOR STURT STREET UFS PHARMACY


A significant refurbishment of the Sturt Street UFS Pharmacy was undertaken early in 2021.

This work included replacing flooring and removing some internal walls to allow for the installation of a ROWA medication dispensing robot. The robot adds efficiencies to the operation of the dispensary, as has been the case at the Bridge Mall and Bacchus Marsh Village pharmacies where this dispensing robot is also in operation.

The internal layout of the pharmacy was redesigned to open it up, increase visibility and allow for better traffic flow throughout the store.

The 24 hour nature of this pharmacy presented some challenges in getting this work done with minimal disruption to customers but was achieved with great effort by all involved.

CHARITABLE DONATIONS

Our support for both members and local communities is demonstrated by our commitment to supporting community organisations across all areas where UFS operates. Due to the COVID restrictions, there were significantly less fund-raising community events able to be held during the 20/21 financial year, however, another record donation of \$50,000 was made to emergency relief services to support people in the community most affected by the pandemic. This follows a similar donation of \$50,000 in June of 2020 towards emergency relief support.

As part of our commitment to improve the health of our members and local communities, UFS continued its advocacy for an increase in Jobseeker payments to address a fundamental underlying cause of poor health.

A total of \$108,130 was donated in the 2020/2021 financial year to the organisations listed opposite.

DONATIONS FOR PANDEMIC RELIEF

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

We do this through our pharmacies, our medical practices, our Supercare pharmacy and nursing services and the Peace and Quiet day spa. In response to COVID-19 we maintained our COVID-19 testing clinic and opened a COVID-19 vaccination clinic. Profits generated by UFS are invested back into the business for the benefit of our members, our customers and local community. In responding to the pandemic, it was important to all of us that we do what is right for the communities we operate in and to remain true to our purpose and values. We substantially increased our giving program to provide support from health to food and care packs.

As always, our CEO Lynne McLennan provided the strong leadership and focus required during these difficult times. Further changes were made to the organisation structure to align business services under one person. Central to our success is our people. We have a strong and engaged leadership team and a motivated team of professionals across the organisation. A big thank you to every UFS employee for the great job you have done in trying circumstances and for your continued willingness to step up and do what is right for our members, customers and for each other.

It is clear that COVID-19 will remain with us for some time, but we will continue to deal with the challenges it brings and continue to play a leading role in the interests of our people, our members and customers and the community in which we operate.

I thank my colleagues on the Board for their contribution and commitment to the success of UFS Dispensaries Limited.

CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER'S REPORT



The COVID-19 pandemic appeared to be under control in Victoria at the beginning of the 2020/2021 financial year and there was general optimism about plans to return to businessas-usual. However, just as happened 100 years ago with the Spanish Flu, the virus returned for a 'vicious second wave' and a lengthy lock-down to protect our health ensued in the second half of 2020. During this and subsequent lockdowns all UFS businesses, with the exception of Peace and Quiet, continued to operate as essential health services, with the Melton and Coburg pharmacies operating throughout the extended metro lock-down. The added requirements of increased infection controls added to the complexity of this work due to the need to enforce compliance for customers and patients. Most (but unfortunately not quite all) UFS customers and patients appreciated the extra efforts made by our staff and health practitioners.

Across the board, UFS staff and health practitioners have continued to rise to the multiple challenges of the pandemic; adjusting to regular changes in government regulations and dealing with rising levels of anxiety amongst patients and customers.

In March 2021, in the long tradition of mutual organisations stepping up to meet the needs of their local community, UFS added a Vaccination Clinic to our existing Ballarat GP Respiratory Clinic contract with the Commonwealth Government. There were considerable difficulties in the early months of the vaccination program due to inadequate supplies of vaccines available in Australia, and the expectations created in our community that were not able to be met. UFS staff have worked collaboratively with other healthcare organisations throughout this time to deliver a coherent response to the community – a sometimes challenging task when two levels of government are involved!

There have been several senior staff changes during the year. Our dynamic Business Development Manager Samantha Elshaug left UFS after a long and stellar career to take on a newly created role with the Buninyong Bendigo Community Bank. Samantha left a legacy of significant achievements at UFS, including but not limited to; the design, scope and execution of the original Peace and Quiet Well-being Centre, playing a key role in the introduction of the UFS innovation program, and the establishment of the Ballarat One Voice Choir. Subsequently, David Stevens was appointed to the new position of Director Corporate Services and Business Development, bringing substantial financial, ICT and governance skills to the senior team.

Purchasing and Logistics Manager Greg Harbridge retired in December after seven highly active years improving the purchasing and negotiation skill-set at UFS. Amy Bennett was promoted to this position bringing extensive purchasing experience in the pharmacy sector.

Long-serving and energetic Pharmacy Manager Amanda Rushton left UFS to pursue other career opportunities, leaving a record of achievement including leading a major expansion of our medication packing service at Delacombe. Faramarz Aghdassi and Matthew Chester resigned their management positions to move into leading pharmacist positions and Rachel Friis transferred from Beaufort into the Pharmacy Manager position at Doveton St South. Three new Pharmacy Managers were appointed: Mina Fam at Beaufort, Michael Yazji at Melton South and Sam Palanca at Sebastopol. Cristine Manalo was appointed to the new position of Manager of Medication Packing Services. This position was established to grow this important service to our patients. Due to continued difficult trading conditions in pharmacy, we closed our smallest pharmacy at 616 Sturt Street, Ballarat. Manager Kathryn Fischmann has moved to other responsibilities within UFS utilising her significant experience and expertise for the benefit of members.

The tech-savvy UFS Directors have continued to execute their governance responsibilities capably via Zoom, bravely masking their disappointment about the lack of morning tea during board meetings. The virtual governance environment has not detracted from the quality of the guidance provided by Directors during this exceptionally difficult period.

It has been a pleasure and privilege to work with the dedicated team at UFS over the last twelve months, and I look forward to the coming year as we move slowly towards the post-COVID world.
