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

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#### LIST OF VESSELS

#### OWNED IN THE COUNTY OF YARMOUTH, N. S., SINCE ITS SETTLEMENT IN 1761 TO THE PRESENT YEAR.

Those marked (\*) are Vessels purchased from other Ports.

- 1761—Tradition says that the first settlers who came this year brought one Shallop, named the "Pompey," with them, of about 25 tons, and that she continued to be owned at Chebogue.
- 1763-4—John Sollows, soon after his arrival, built a Shallop of about 25 tons, on "Fish Point," Yarmouth harbour. This was the first vessel launched in Yarmouth County.
- 1763-5-David Pearl, Ebenezer Clark and James Allen built a Schooner (supposed to be the "James,") at the mouth of "Broad Brook." The keel of this vessel was the first laid in the County.
- 1765—Amos Hilton and James Kelley, who came about this date, each brought a Shallop with them.

Norre.—The following notes have been gathered from private memoranda and unofficial documents of the time, and may be regarded as authentic. The official register commences in 1787.

- 1762-Seth Barnes owned the Schooner "Elizabeth." Ephraim Cook and George Ring owned a Schooner.
- 1764-There were 4 Schooners owned here, namely:
  - The "Elizabeth," by Seth Barnes;
  - 1 by Ephraim Cook and George Ring;
  - 1 by Peleg Holmes;
  - 1 by Samuel Oates.

### VESSELS LOST

#### BELONGING TO THE COUNTY OF YARMOUTH SINCE 1761.

#### 1777.

Schooner SALLY, —— tons, John Barnard master and owner, sailed from Yarmouth for Quebec, and was not afterwards heard of.

#### 1778.

Schooner JAMES, —— tons, Joseph Allen master, was wrecked off Sambro, N. S. Crew saved. Owned by James Allen.

#### 1781.

Schooner POLLY, —— tons, Nehemiah Patch master and owner, from New England for Yarmouth, was wrecked at Seal Island in the fall. All hands perished.

#### 1783.

Schooner POLLY, —— tons, Seth Barnes master and owner, sailed from Boston for Yarmouth, with a cargo of supplies, and was not afterwards heard of.

#### 1784.

Schooner SLOOP, —— tons, Barney Eldridge master and owner, was wrecked near Seguin, Me. All hands perished.


Sloop ZACHARIAH FOOTE, about 25 tons, Zachariah Foote master and owner, sailed from Yarmouth for Salem, Mass., about the 1st of January, and was not afterwards heard of.

#### 1786.

Schooner —, 18 tons, Samuel Baker master, from Boston, Mass., for Yarmouth, with supplies, was wrecked at Mud Islands. The crew remained on the Island eight days, and had built a boat by which they intended to cross Loss of the Schooner "Jacob and Benjamin."

#### A TOUCHING NARRATIVE OF SUFFERING AND PRIVATION.

Schooner "Jacob and Benjamin," 104 tons, John Cann master, sailed from Yarmouth for Barbadoes, with a cargo of lumber, about the 15th September, 1820, and arrived at her destination in safety. After taking in ballast and raw hides, she sailed for Yarmouth on the 8th November. About the 20th, whilst passing through Sombrero Passage, she was chased and fired into by a suspicious looking craft. but was not overtaken. About the 1st December, in lat. 27 N., she encountered very severe weather, which drove her from her course, and the crew were put on a short allowance of hard bread and water. From the 4th to the 27th December, they experienced a succession of gales from the Westward, during which time they lost the foresail and flying jib, broke the mainboom and jib-boom, and split the topsail. On the 27th December, whilst running before the still raging gale under bare poles, a heavy sea broke upon the quarter, throwing the vessel on her beam ends. The Captain ordered the lanyards of the rigging to be cut, which was done, when the masts went over the side and the All hands went into the hold to shift and vessel righted. secure the ballast. Having now lost her spars, the vessel was left as a log upon the water; drifting at the mercy of the wind and waves to the S.E. for eight or ten days, the crew being left with only three biscuits apiece, and nothing but starvation before them, should they not soon be rescued from their perilous situation. As soon as they were able they were engaged in rigging the vessel with what spars and ropes still remained on board. A sail was made from the hides which comprised the cargo, eight of which were sewed

## PREFACE.

THE present volume is an outgrowth from the publication in the Yarmouth Herald of February 4th, 1875, of a list of the vessels lost out of the County down to that date.

In that, to some extent incomplete and, in places, unavoidably incorrect record, so much interest was generally manifested throughout the County and abroad that the compiler was induced, after no little solicitation, but with much anxiety, to undertake the more elaborate work known as the "Record of the Shipping of Yarmouth." That volume, issued in the spring of the following year, met with a cordial reception. After the lapse of nearly a decade, an Appendix seems to be demanded, in order to complete the remarkable record of casualties to Yarmouth vessels since 1875.

The subscriber therefore places the present volume in the hands of the public, confident that the inherent interest of its varied story will attract attention, and that the kind appreciation which met its predecessor will attend the reception of this later contribution on the same subject.

#### THE "LENNIE" MUTINY.

On Sunday morning, October 31st, 1875, an atrocious conspiracy, ending in a series of the most brutal murders ever recorded, was formed on board the ship "Lennie," of Yarmouth, N. S., which sailed from Antwerp, in ballast, on the 23d of that month, for Sandy Hook for orders.

There were on board sixteen persons, viz.: Capt. Stanley Hatfield (son of Mr. James Hatfield, of Riverdale, Yarmouth), master; Joseph Wortley, of Belfast, mate; Richard McDonald, of St. John, N. B., second mate; Constant Von Hoydonck, of Belgium, steward; Henry Trousselot, sixteen years of age, Dutch, cabin boy; and able seamen, Matteo Cargalis, thirty-six; Parosios Leosis, thirty; Pascales Caludis, thirty-three; Giovanni Saros Moros, thirty-one — Greeks: Giovanni Carcaris, twenty-one: George Kaida, twenty-two; Georgios Angelos, nineteen — Turks; Guiseppe Lettes, twenty-two — Austrian; Giovanni Canesso, thirty-four — Italian; Peter Petersen, twenty-six — Dane; Charles Renken — English.

The details of the mutiny are best given in the evidence of Von Hoydonck, the steward, adduced on the trial of the prisoners in London before Sir Thomas Henry. He deposed as follows: -

On the morning of 31st October, I was in my berth about 4 a. m., and I was awoke by a noise on the poop. I then said to the second steward, who slept in the berth below me, "There is a row; turn out, and see what time it is." He went to the fore cabin and looked

# WRECKS ALONG THE WESTERN SHORE.

Among the wrecks recorded in the following pages are several that do not rightly belong to the list embraced as "wrecked on the Nova Scotia shore," but as these exceptions are thrilling in detail and of peculiar interest, the writer has concluded to allow them to remain.

#### 1831.

BRIG BENJAMIN MILLIKEN, of and for St. Andrews, N. B., from Liverpool, G. B., cargo dry goods, hardware and salt, was wrecked at Cape Sable on the 4th December. Crew saved.

BRIG ECLIPSE, of and for Halifax, from New York, with a cargo of flour, beef, pork, etc., was wrecked on the reef between the western head of Cape Sable and Green Island, during the night of the 21st November, and all on board perished. No bodies were recovered.

BRIG EDWARD WALKER, John McKenzie master, from St. John, N. B., for Dublin, was wrecked about four miles above Digby Gut on the 30th November. The captain, four men and a passenger were lost. Mate and one man saved.

BRIG WILLIAM HENRY, of New Brunswick, was wrecked on Seal Island on the 18th November. Crew saved. Cargo and materials lost.

PACKET SCHOONER CAROLINE, Bryan master, plying between St. John and Digby, left Digby on the 17th December, 1831, and difted ashore on the 20th January, 1832, at Baxter's Cove, Cornwallis, with five corpses on board. All hands perished. She had as passenof gentlemen present offered to subscribe and make up the sum in question on the spot, and lodge it in the hands of the Government as security, but being instructed that the Legislature would not, nor could not accept of such surety the project dropped. A committee of seven was appointed to draw up the necessary petition and adopt such means as would secure its success, viz.: Benj. Bingay, John Moody, James Bond, Reuben Clements, Herbert Huntington, Staley Brown and Robert Kelley, Esqs. A Petition was accordingly drawn up and forwarded to the House of Assembly, but on the 2d of April it was rejected by a majority of four. The vote was as follows: For the resolution—Barss, Morse, Young, Forman, Blanchard, Fairbanks, Pool, Homer, C. Roche, Huntington, Chipman, Kavanagh, Lovett, Deblois, Uniacke—15. Against—B. Dewolf, Bliss, Wier, Cochran, Johnston, Delap, Freeman, Budd, Archibald, J. R. Dewolf, Heckman, Smelt, Shey, Rudolf, Stewart, W. H. Roach, Morton, Dickson, Lawson—19.

In the issue of January 13, 1832, it is announced that owing to the arrival of the Sheffield, at New York from Liverpool, we have intelligence from Liverpool up to the *9th November*, and from London to the 8th.

On Friday, January 27th, 1832, was put forth the

THE rise and progress (and temporary decline) of the maritime interests of the county next claim attention.

In order that the early settlers might permanently establish themselves at Chebogue and Yarmouth, it was essential that they should have constant and reliable means of communication with Halifax and ports of New England. Thence were to be drawn such commodities as would for some years be necessary for the maintenance of the infant colony, to be received in exchange for furs and fishery products which were then their only exports.

Halifax, first settled in 1749, had, in 1752, with its suburbs, attained a population of 4,250, which in ten years had increased to about 6,000, and already offered a market which could only be supplied by sea. Shelburne, which claims to have one of the best harbors in America, received, in 1783, at the close of the American war, a large immigration

sons; and all the names of Gardner which appear in the following lists are those of the sons or grandsons of Bartlett Gardner.

William Jenkins, sen., had four sons who were master builders, — Robert, William H., Griffith, and George H. Jenkins; and William Jenkins, son of John, built ships here before he left Yarmouth for New Jersey some thirty years ago.

A tablet inserted in the solid rock at the summit of the Mountain Cemetery, bearing jointly the names of Jacob Tooker, Bartlett Gardner, James, John, and William Jenkins, would appropriately commemorate the influence on succeeding generations of these five pioneer shipbuilders of the last century.


