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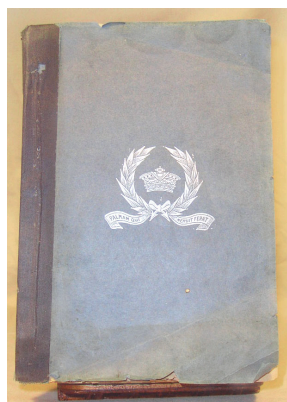

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## ABOUT THIS CD.

The title of this book is a masterly understatement. Certainly it lists every student who attended the school from the school's beginnings in January 1830 until the end of this reporting period in June 1916, but in that listing may also be found such know facts as:

birth date,

date of entering and leaving school,

name of previous and next school

fathers name, location and profession

addresses for "home" and "where found during school term"

and in many cases significant details about the student in latter years such as location and profession or the date and circumstances of their death.

Then there are other lists in the book where the names of "old boys" who took a part in notable events in Canadian (and related) history are recorded.

Nor does the wealth of information end there. Following a fairly detailed account of the school's history and a listing of the school's governors, the names and details of every master who had taught in the school are recorded, some at significant length.

The pupils of Upper Canada College went on to take up positions in all walks of life in Canada, not to mention those who journeyed further afield. They could be found in military and civilian service, in public and private life and in all types of commerce. An enormous number of families are going to find that they had some connection with this most famous and historic Canadian school.

# UPPER CANADA COLLEGE

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Upper Canada College is the oldest residential school for boys to the west of Montreal, having been founded by Sir John Colborne, first Lord Seaton, in 1829. In the Maritime Provinces it is surpassed in age by King's College School, Windsor, N. S., which dates back to 1788, its founder having been the Right Reverend Charles Inglis, U.E.L., first Bishop of Nova Scotia. In the Province of Quebec there is a still older foundation, the *Séminaire de Québec*, which goes back to the 17th century.

All three are alike in having had a close connection with the University situated in the town in which they themselves are respectively located. Out of the *Séminaire* grew Laval, the oldest collegiate institution in the King's Overseas Dominions. From the Collegiate School at Windsor was evolved the University of King's College, which is the most ancient University for English-speaking people in any of the Colonial possessions. As is well known, Upper Canada College was, during nearly sixty years of its history, intimately associated with King's College, Toronto, and its successor, the University of Toronto.

The idea of establishing a University for Upper Canada had been entertained by General Simcoe, the first Lieutenant-Governor, but, like others of his plans for the well-being of the country, it was not carried out till many years after his death. It was only in 1827 that the Royal Charter for King's College at York was issued, but it was not till 1843 that teaching was actually begun. It is not necessary here to go into the sectarian reasons for this delay; but a sufficient one, of a very practical kind, was presented by the fact that there were not enough preparatory schools able to send up students who could profitably attend lectures. Consequently men who could afford to do so were sending their sons to England to college, and even to school. Others were sending them to Nova Scotia and to New Brunswick; others again were sending them to the United States, as witness, among other things, the replies made by Dr. Harris to the Committee on Education, printed in its first Report to "the Honourable the Commons' House of Assembly" in 1832.

In "Mrs. Simcoe's Diary," as published by Mr. John Ross Robertson, it would appear that there was some kind of school in operation at Niagara between 1792 and 1796. From the correspondence of the Reverend John Stuart, M.A., D.D., first Rector of Kingston, it is clear that he himself and, after him, a Mr. Matthew Donovan carried on a school in that town from 1785 onward. His eldest son, George Okill Stuart, also taught in Kingston, between 1795 and 1799, General Simcoe arranging for the salary on his way to Quebec to sail for home. At a very early date, quite as early as 1785, there was a master for the Mohawk Indians, at Deseronto, provided by the London Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in Foreign Parts; and there was one provided by Government for their brethren on the Grand River.

## KEY TO THE ENTRIES.

B. at the beginning of an entry means Boarder; elsewhere it means born. The dates next following are those of entering and leaving the School respectively. The father's address is that which he had when his son was sent to School, unless it is given in square brackets. They in this case, as in others, are indicative of information not contained in the Registers. The schools mentioned before the age, or the date of birth, are those from which the boys entered the School; those following are the schools to which they went on leaving it. The ages, which have been given from Mr. Cockburn's time on, are set down in years and months. Years of birth and death are seldom abbreviated. Addresses within the quotation marks are those at which boys were to be found when they were attending School. Everything following the quotation marks relates to their subsequent careers. Dagger (†) indicates deceased "Old Masters" and "Old Boys" whose deaths have been vouched for. One asterisk (\*) denotes membership in the Old Boys' Association; two (\*\*), life membership; three (\*\*\*), honorary life membership. References are always made from "Old Boys" to their fathers by means of the letters *q. v.*

The abbreviations used are such as are supposed to be easily intelligible. E. stands for Educated; M. for Married; m. for matriculated; C. I. for Collegiate Institute; H. S. for High School; P. S. for Public School; S. S. for Separate School; ordained d., p. for ordained deacon, priest.

"From all I can gather he was of the old school, very strict, but very just. He took part with the boys in all their games, especially cricket, and was a good boxer and fencer, and an expert rower, as one can understand because he was one of the Cambridge Eight in the then proposed race, which I have heard him say was cancelled because of some dispute in regard to the waters upon which the race was to have been rowed. It is said he made the boys FIGHT their own disputes, and stood close by to see that all was fair.

"Old Major Goodwin, an old Crimean veteran taught fencing, and I can remember, as a child, seeing these two fencing in the cellar of the Principal's house at Upper Canada College."
