


# Bugs for Lunch

## CURRICULUM LINKS

*Language Arts:* Poetry, informational text, rhythm and rhyme, interpreting visual images, early literacy  
*Science:* Life (characteristics of organisms, organisms and their environments)

## COMPREHENSION QUESTIONS

Before reading *Bugs for Lunch*, show students the cover. Ask them questions about the book:

- ◆ What do you think the book is about?
- ◆ What animals do you know that eat insects? What insects do those bug-eaters munch on?
  - ◆ See how many creatures from the book students can name.
  - ◆ Create a list of the animals and corresponding insects and check them off the list as you read the book.

After reading *Bugs for Lunch*, ask students these questions:

- ◆ Can you recall some of the different creatures mentioned and the insects that they eat?
- ◆ Can you name some ways that different creatures catch the insects that they eat?
- ◆ Have you ever eaten an insect? Do you know any countries or cultures in which people eat insects as a part of lunch or dinner?
- ◆ Why do you think it is a good thing that insects are food for so many creatures?

## ACTIVITIES

### Rhyme Time!

Let students choose their favorite bug-eating creature or insect mentioned in *Bugs for Lunch* and have them write a short, rhyming poem about it. Ask students to draw a descriptive picture to illustrate their poem.

### Research

Some of the bugs or creatures in *Bugs for Lunch* may be unfamiliar to students. Ask students to research and share five interesting facts about their animal or insect of choice.

### Observation

Have students connect with nature! Ask students to observe the insects outside their home or classroom window. Create a list of bugs local to your area that students can observe, and create a bug scavenger hunt.
