Oh, no! Lola can't find her library card! Help Lola through the maze to find it.

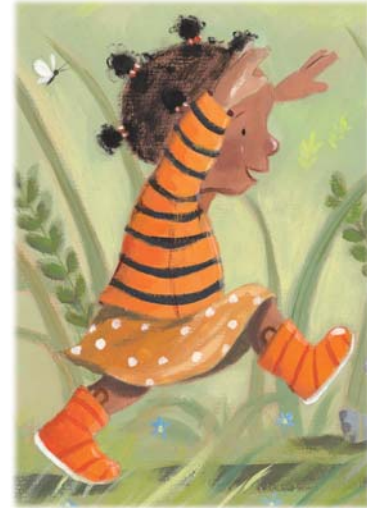


Make Your Own Tiger Mask

In *Lola Loves Stories*, Lola reads a story about a tiger, and the next day, Lola pretends she is one! With the help of an adult, follow the directions below to make your own tiger mask.

What you'll need:

- 1 paper plate
- crayons, markers, or paint
- a hole puncher
- a piece of elastic
- 3 pipe cleaners
- black and orange construction paper
- scissors
- glue or scotch tape



Instructions:

- 1) First you'll need to color your plate orange. To do this, you can use markers, crayons, colored pencils, paint—whatever you'd like! Just remember that if you use paint, you'll need to give the mask time to dry completely before you move on.
- 2) Once your plate is colored and dry, ask an adult to help you cut out holes for the eyes of the tiger.
- 3) Your tiger needs stripes! You can make the stripes either by painting or coloring them on your plate, or by using strips of construction paper that you glue onto your tiger's face.
- 4) Then twist together three pipe cleaners in the middle and glue or tape these to the center of your mask, just under the eye holes.
- 5) Next, have an adult help you cut out a triangle piece of black construction paper for the nose. Glue this triangle over the pipe cleaners, onto the plate. Now your tiger has a nose and whiskers!
- 6) Now cut out two circles of orange construction paper for the ears. Glue these to the top of your mask.
- 7) Finally, ask an adult to punch a hole on either side of the mask. Then loop one piece of elastic through each hole and tie on either end. This will hold the mask on your face.

Voilà! You're a tiger!


Start your own library!

Gather up all of your books and mark them with a Lola bookplate! Ask an adult to help you cut along the dotted lines. Write your name on the line in each bookplate and have an adult help you glue it into your books.

You can also make your own bookplates. Decorate a piece of paper about two inches tall and three inches wide. Use markers, paint, crayons, stickers, glitter to create any kind of decoration you'd like! Ask an adult to help you cut out your bookplates and paste them into your books.




