Growing up, Robin knew she loved to write, but it wasn’t until after earning a master’s degree in education from Princeton, attending a year of law school, and working as an editor at Walker and Company, that she finally tried it as a career. Working as an editor meant she had to read a lot, and every time she read a good manuscript she’d say to herself, “I should have written that!” For the next two years she wrote picture books that kept returning to her mailbox rejected. So she decided to try writing something else—novels.

In 2000 Robin’s first novel, *How I Survived My Summer Vacation* (Front Street-Cricket Books), was published. Subsequently she has published three more books, *The Silent Witness* (Houghton-Mifflin), *The Girlfriend Project* (Walker and Company), and *Nothing* (Flux/Llewellyn Worldwide).

Robin is currently a newspaper editor in New Jersey, where she lives with her husband, Joel, and their cats, Peppercorn and Peaches.
