

Kid's Town Illness Policy

Children may not attend school with the following symptoms:

- A temperature of 100 F degrees or higher. The child may return to school when the child's verified temperature is below 100F degrees and the child has not had a temperature for a 24 hour period. The child may not be taking aspirin, acetaminophen or ibuprofen to control the fever during that 24 hours.
- Discharge from the eye(s). The child may return to school when a Physician's note is provided stating that the condition is not contagious and that the child may return to school. The Program Director may have the final decision when a green or yellow discharge is present. If eye drops have been prescribed by a physician, the drops must have been used for a minimum of 24 hours and the discharged has stopped.
- Diarrhea (severe, uncontained, or more than one episode). The child may return to school when the diarrhea has stopped for a 24 hour period between day picked up and day returned.
- Vomiting. The child may return to school when the vomiting has stopped for a 24 hour period between the day picked up and the day returned.
- Unidentified or Unusual rash. The child may return to school when the rash is gone and/or a physician's note is provided stating that the rash is not contagious.
- Mouth Sores. The child may return to school when the sores are completely gone or a physician's note is provided stating the diagnosis that the sores are not contagious.
- Untreated green or unusual nasal discharge. The child may return to school when the discharge is no longer green or a physician provides written evidence of treatment or a note stating what the condition is and that it is not contagious. Director may have final decision when discharge is present.
- Untreated or undiagnosed breathing difficulty. Child may return to school when a written medical diagnosis of the condition is provided and the Director approves the child's return to school. If the child is not comfortable the Director may send the child home.
- Signs of severe pain. The child may return to school when the cause of pain is known and the Director approves the child's return to school.
- Unusual lethargy. The child may return to school when the cause of lethargy is known and the Director approves the child's return to school.
- Persistent crying. The child may return to school when the Director approves the child's return to school.
- Prolonged irritability. The child may return to school when the Director approves the child's return to school.
