

ANNUAL REPORT 2017

At FDG, we strive to be open to others and seek out our common interests and recognize our differences. In 2017, in the City of Québec, there was a hatefest against the Muslim community gathered at the Great Mosque of Quebec. The outpouring of solidarity that was spontaneously expressed by the people in the national capital toward that injured, grieving community in the cold days of winter following that tragic event also subsequently brought on further expressions of hate and intolerance. One year later, what have we learned from that tragedy?

Everyone is looking for his/her place in this world in order to live and flourish. Immigrant integration is a real issue for our society, and migrations whether chosen or forced result in people movements that we have a responsibility to accept within our communities. It's a known fact that people fear what they are unfamiliar with. Whether or not we agree with the practices brought along by a culture different from ours, better understanding the realities experienced and taking the time to really explain our values and history are critical steps towards a better co-existence. In our own way and within our means, we try to make a difference in the lives of young people and families often marginalized by adverse situations like poverty, an unsuitable social setting, a different ethnic origin, health problems, dependencies, etc. To do that, we turn to community organizations that are well-established in their community, that work with the clients that we target, by boosting their ability to act. Above all, we strongly believe that it's through dialogue that the trust relationship we seek to cultivate can be established.

With nearly eight years of service at FDG, I am happy to note that we have consistently enhanced the reference frame on which we are based. The key word that stays with me from the year 2017 is **meshing**. For some time, we have deliberately chosen to promote stronger ties between people and organizations in the communities we commit to. That approach is paying off. Organizations prove this to us by participating in large numbers in our NRE meetings (Networking, Resourcing, Enhancing), by becoming more financially stable, by promoting increased engagement of their members and/or users, by refocusing their activities and their deployment, networking with organizations related to the mission or complementary organizations in their vicinity. We see enriching dynamics being born, youth and families achieving more independence and fulfillment, playing a role as citizens that enables them to influence their reality.

The FDG considers it important to be informed and to network based on its directions and its strategies with other partners.

The Collectif des Fondations

An open place for work and vigilance, enabling foundations to form alliances among each other to ensure that public policies promote the reduction of inequalities. The Collectif's action plan involves the objective of developing alliances with other players that work to reduce social inequalities. It aims to prepare an initial mapping of players rallied around the fight against social inequalities, and to develop a joint approach within the alliances or linkages among the various workers. By means of an open letter in the print media, it is encouraging the government to factor in the measuring of inequalities when the latter submits its 3rd anti-poverty plan. www.collectifdesfondations.org

The Pathfinders Group of the Fondation Lucie et André Chagnon (FLAC)

The Pathfinders Group is made up of 10 participants from different backgrounds and 5 people from the FLAC, two of whom are observers. All of them are concerned with poverty prevention, educational success of children and families. Every meeting is structured in a way that encourages contemplation and discussions from each participant's reality and expertise: readings to be done prior to or after the meetings, big questions for initiating contemplation, sharing with experts on the agenda topic, are all ways of building knowledge on the proposed topics and encouraging discussions. The FLAC now describes itself as a learning organization. Topics addressed to date: social inequities, educational successes, Indigenous peoples, etc. www.fondationchagnon.org

Research

FDG is also working with the UQAM's Philanthropy Lab and other research laboratories in Canada, led by researcher Jean-Marc Fontan, on some research entitled "Evaluating the role and actions of Canadian granting foundations in response to the issue of social inequalities and environmental challenges". The work program is based on three main axes of endeavour: producing knowledge, leveraging existing or new knowledge, systematizing knowledge in the form of practical tools or theoretical models. A response from the SSHRC about funding for this research is expected in mid-April 2018. If the researchers obtain the anticipated funding, we will be involved for the next six (6) years.



Conferences

Johanne Beauvilliers took part on two panels organized by the Association of Philanthropy Professionals (AFP) with two other foundations (Bombardier Foundation and Jules Dallaire Foundation) to share the practices and philanthropy model advocated by FDG.

The FDG draws inspiration from 3 key words for creating activities with its community partners:

NETWORKING • RESOURCING • ENHANCING (NRE)

NRE Days in the City of Québec and Montreal

Over 115 people took part in the NRE Days.

Networking is done through a discussion forum bringing individuals together via a structured program. The Montreal agencies met in the spring and the ones in the City of Québec met in the fall.

Resourcing is an opportunity to deepen understanding and knowledge and get up to speed on new and emerging trends in intervention.

Enhancing is recognizing expertise developed in the field and shared among peers experiencing similar realities.

Those gatherings become anticipated times for indulging in a communal time out. Anyone wishing to speak is free to do so, which enables open questioning. The co-development mode is favoured for building on individuals' strengths and providing a step back for learning.

On the agenda for our NRE days this year, we addressed the topic of story telling, i.e. the different ways of telling our organizations' stories using the favoured communication tool. In the second part, two major topics were brought up: workers were brought together to share their mobilization experiences, while managers were invited to talk about succession in their organizations. By sharing their experiences, some of our partners set the stage for more in-depth discussions, identifying disincentives and incentives for promoting best practices. It's become standard practice: we showcase the work of our partners on our website under the "News" tab and convey great information on the news feed via the social networks, essentially Facebook. We posted 10 articles on just as many organizations. The Facebook page has 222 subscribers.

Tara also represented FDG at *My Identity, My Freedom*, an evening combining fashion and performances by the young people of Maison Richelieu. The event spotlighted the participants in May 2017. The agents of change involved in the FDG agree to be members of a Board of Directors when an organization makes a difference, out of personal conviction and for the strategic role that they are called upon to play.

Here are some of the favoured activities that we financially support in an organization: workshops for pregnant women and young families, drop-in daycare centres, homework assistance and/or recreational activities for young people, attendance at summer camps, youth centres, collective kitchen workshops, community gardens, refuges or shelters for young runaways or marginalized youth, assistance or prevention programs that target atrisk youth, etc \$1.4 million

Our partner

in 2017 organizations are often located in troubled neighbourhoods and work at empowering their users by leveraging their role within their family, their presence within the organization and, ultimately, their role as a citizen in society.

In the Greater National Capital Region, including part of Portneuf and Charlevois, 37 partners are receiving FDG assistance in 2017. In the Greater Montreal Area, 33 organizations are receiving FDG support.

In Mongolia, through the work of Dulmaa Luvsansharav, we partner with 14 organizations that provide support to young people living in particularly difficult circumstances. At an official ceremony in that country in summer 2017, FDG's presence and work in Mongolia were acknowledged by the Ministry of Labour and Social

> Protection, which issued a certificate of honour to the FDG President. Attending the ceremony were most of the leaders of the organizations supported by FDG in Mongolia.

Again in Mongolia, a study on children's living conditions and aspirations conducted in the ger districts identified the key factors for acting on to improve the quality of life for children and families. The results of that study were shared among the organizations and also sent to the nation's government agencies, social workers and boards of governors. 400 copies of the report were printed for distribution. In short, FDG distributed just over **\$1.4 million** in 2017, and over \$11 million since being established in 2001.



Children's fulfilment, human dignity and a strong, suitable and inclusive social fabric are ideals that we are committed to.

The specific expertise of each of our partners and the ties that bind us, ties based on trust, dialogue and respect, are our basic materials, without which we wouldn't be able to carry out our mission. Our philanthropy model has been forged through our experience. It continues to develop through our gatherings, the breadth of our network of commited players, and the generosity and kindness of our donors who continue to be agents of change.

Openness to sharing not only our values and convictions but to extending them to different circles, the path that we have followed to better promote our approach and philanthropy model are still the drivers that motivate us.





Lastly, we also seek to include among our concerns and look for means of action, in order to deal with the difficult reality of First Nations whom we have been ignorant of for too long and for whom we are expressing a desire for reconciliation.
