

Antigoné embodies a postmodern form of rebellion — a punk spirit reshaped into art.

She may wear her crown like armor, not holy, not royal, but rebellious. May rooms bend around her presence; glass warps, wires twitch, time folds. Each spike on her crown a refusal, a wound turned into a weapon. A weapon they fear.





A new way of experiencing an abstract painting:

The artist created a VR version of the painting itself, revealing what happens inside the artwork — a new way of experiencing abstraction that invites you to step into Antigoné's world.

Within this space, viewers find a deeper connection to the work and the artist's thoughts. Already shown to many at various exhibitions, the fusion of painting and VR has granted audiences rare access to Antigoné's rebellious essence.

A sculpture exploring humanity's need for miracles: Since humans cannot live without miracles, they will provide themselfes with miracles and believe in any kind of deity.

RTFKT³ isn't carved in myth or gold, but born from human-made technology — a modern miracle, abstract yet deeply human. Like a companion, it follows you on your journeys, sometimes in everyday life, sometimes like a guardian.

The six horsemen challenge the notion that church and religion are the ultimate moral authorities in our society. Inspired by the four horsemen of the apocalypse, I introduced two additional figures, suggesting that church and religion themselves are part of the many catastrophes humanity faces. However, I leave it up to you to decide which of the six figures embody which role.













Selection of early acrylic artworks, 2023-2025

The artist's earliest works in acrylic defined his visual language through intricate, abstract patterns that wove together organic forms and flowing voids, balancing chaos and structure. These beginnings, marked by bold contrasts and cellular details, became the foundation of his creative process and the starting point for all later works.

The Fall, 2024

Inspired by Pieter Bruegel's 1562 painting. "The Fall of the Rebel Angels," the artist created his own modern interpretation. This artwork depicts humanity in its primal form, emphasizing our evolutionary lineage from apes. It portrays an androgynous figure, symbolizing the freedom to be and express ~ one-self without the constraints of religious doctrines. Armed angels are shown relinquishing their weapons, acknowledging that institutionalized morality may not outlast humanity itself.





The artist uses virtual reality to deepen the viewer's encounter with his work. Many have experienced this at exhibitions, often falling into quiet immersion before returning to the physical pieces with a renewed sense of depth. The artist sees VR as a contemporary continuation of art history, where artists adopt the tools of their time to reshape perception.









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
