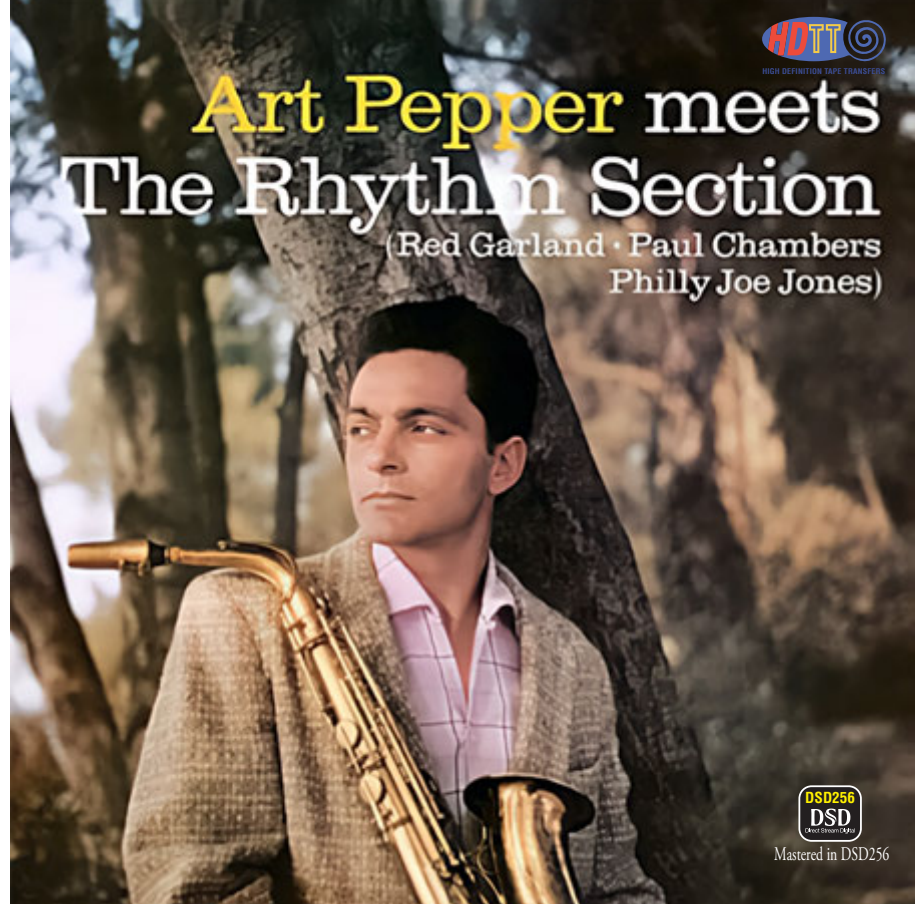


Blues" and "Straight Life" delve into more introspective and bluesy territory.
