"They are thinking of the sound of the words as they say them, not of the meaning of the words, of the sorrow, the longing and the hope, that the words convey,' said the little man who was bossing the recording. Technically it is perfect. But the soul is not there.'

"So they tried it again and again. And still the little man was not satisfied. Finally, it was nearly midnight, and the singers were growing weary now. Their eyes drooped and, as Graham talked to them, one of them began to cry.


"It was then that they began to sing. They kicked off their shoes and threw their heads back, and the melody began to pour from their throats. All the weariness was in it this time, all the anguish, all the longing, all the hope.

"All of us who were listening had heard the spirituals sung a thousand times. But never had we heard them sung like this.


"They sounded as they must have sounded years and years ago, when the glow of the sun in the West was the gateway to heaven, and the tired slaves came home from the fields at eventide pouring out their hearts in golden song."



Westminster's engineering staff was in Atlanta on a recording assignment when they first heard of the Graham Jackson Choir, and the reports were so glowing that they decided that they must hear the group sing. As soon as they heard them they knew that they had made a real "find" and lost no time in getting down to the business of putting the Graham Jackson Choir on tape. The following paragraphs from an article by Harold Martin in *The Atlanta Journal and Constitution* describe the recording session which produced the performances you hear on this disc:

"They were used to singing at parties, where people were milling around, and the background accompaniment to their song was the clink of glasses, and the chatter of voices, and the clatter of waiters clearing away tables. The dead silence in the Hall of Bishops seemed to make them nervous. They sang for an hour, and to those of us who sat there listening, it was beautiful. But something was lacking in it, the recording man said, a quality of spontaneity, of deep feeling.
