

"Das Lied von der Erde" (The Song of the Earth) is a composition by Austrian composer Gustav Mahler. It is a symphonic song cycle for two voices and orchestra, and it is often considered one of Mahler's masterpieces. The work was composed between 1908 and 1909, during a challenging period in Mahler's life, marked by

personal and health struggles.
