Many ads are meant to sell genuine products and services, or share public service announcements and other helpful information. However, not everyone online has the best of intentions. It's important for kids of all ages to learn how to identify ads and avoid dangerous content online.

Educator Prep

Materials:

- Activities on pages 3-8 printed (1 per learner or group)
- Colored pencils, crayons or markers

Prep:

- Read through the game instructions.
- Print out pages 3-8 for each small group of learners. Provide some coloring supplies.
 - Cut out the game cards ahead of time, or provide scissors so your learners can cut them out.
- Print out a copy of the answer sheet for each learner. Or, go over the answers together as a class.

Objective:

Understand that most ads are designed to sell products, but not all ads are legitimate. Learn how to identify common signs of scams.

Key Terms:

- Ad: A message that is shared to get your attention. Most ads sell a product or share knowledge. Some ads lead to dangerous sites or malware.
- **Malware:** Files that cause harm. Malware often steals money or information.
- Scam: A message that tricks people into losing money or personal information.
- Bad Actor: Someone who steals money or information online.

Background Information:

Ads are all around us. Every day, we see billboards on the drive to school, hear ads on the radio, see pop-ups on our phones and watch influencers promote their sponsors. You may even have clicked on an ad to find this freebie.

While most ads are posted by legitimate businesses and organizations, there are many ads out there that lead to dangerous websites or malware. With emerging technology covering more and more of our world with ads, it becomes critical to learn how to spot the fakes.

Read through Ada and Patti's story to set the scene, then practice identifying good and bad ads with this fun game!



Story

Ada: Welcome to the ad team, Patti! Here, we approve or deny ads that businesses want to show on our website.

Patti: Why do we need to approve ads?



Ada: A lot of the ads we receive are good. They come from trusted sources and share products or messages that are useful and safe.

However, some people are not honest online. These people are bad actors that lie to our viewers. Bad actors steal money or personal information. The ads they submit are scams that lead to dangerous sites. These sites might download malware or trick you into buying a fake product.





It's our job to sort through the ads and keep our viewers safe!

Patti: Wow, that sounds important! How do we tell the difference between good ads and scams?

Ada: We'll use red flags to spot scams. Let's learn some common red flags and practice finding them!

Red Flags:

Scams often have at least one of these red flags.



Scams may scare you into acting fast, so you have no time to think.

Free Money

Scams may offer free money or items. These could be real or in-game items.



Personal Info

Scams may ask for details you shouldn't share without help from an adult.



Scams may spell words wrong, use numbers in words, or use weird phrases.






Let's practice! Some of these ads are good, but others have red flags. Color in the red flags. Can you find all four?









Ads & Flags Game:

Help Ada and Patti separate the good ads from the scams.

Steps:

- 1. Split into pairs or small groups.
- 2. Cut out the Ad Cards.
- 3. Turn the Ad Cards face-down and shuffle them into a pile.
- 4. Take turns drawing 1 card.
- 5. Does the card have a red flag? If so, set it in the Scam pile. If not, set it in the Good Ads pile.
- 6. Repeat until you run out of cards.
- 7. Check your work using the answer key.
